## Two Trustees to be **Elected May 20**

The Kendrick School Board held its regular April meeting last Thurs-day. June 12th was set for the anday. June 12th was set for the annual budget meeting. The hearing is open to the public and will commence at 8:00 p. m. in the High School. May 20th was set for election of Trustees from Zones 3 and 4; Doug Harris and Jack Parsley presently represent these zones. The Board voted to renew its contract with the North Central District with the North Central District Health Department for school health services for next year. Superintendent Morton briefly reviewed reven-ue projections for next year. The Board concluded there was no need for a maintenance and operations tax

Superintendent Morton reported that over the past 5 years there has been a decrease in student grade averages; that is, fewer A's and B's. Five years ago the average semester grade was slightly above B (3.1) and now it is closer to C plus (2.4). This has resulted in fewer students on the honor roll and fewer members in honor societies. However, Morton pointed out that during this same time the District's achievement test time the District's achievement test scores have increased by more than 15 percent. He thinks this indicates that grading now more realistically describes the student's achievement. He cautioned the Board that the High Schools share in the achievement improvement is only slight. Further improvement in the High School achievement scores should be expected. However, such improve-ment will take place only when there is greater student interest in academic achievements. Mr. Morton believes that parents and teachers are becoming less willing to accept inferior work from the High School student. He said that only parents' demand for higher levels of achievement will bring about the student effort necessary for improved achieve-

The next regular Board meeting will be at 8 p. m. in the High School on May 8th.

## Kendrick Grange Of American Farms

(Delayed from Last Week) By Frank Jacobson

Speaking from carefully researched data, Latah County Extension Agent Gordon Dailey last week traced the growing size of American farms from an historical perspective and led his Grange audience to speculate on what the future may hold. Pointing out that farmers and their families once constituted 90 percent of the American population, Dailey said that today 8 million of them represent less than 4 percent of the population. And the census figures for 1980 may reveal an even further erosion in that already small figure.

Despite the decrease in farm population, Dailey said, both the productivity and size of American farms has grown rapidly in the last forty years. The average size of a farm grew from 167 acres in 1940 to 213 in 1950. The decades of the 50's and 60's saw that figure grow to 374. The most recent figures available show the average size to be 401 acres. And during this same period. America lost 100 million acres of farm land

to non-agricultural development. Parallel to the growth in size is the decrease in the number of farms. In Latah County, for example, there were 1,457 farms in 1950. By 1959 there were only 1,045. And where there were 768 farms in the county a decade later, there were only 625 in 1979. That's a 57% decrease in some twenty-nine years!






Pointing out one irony revealed by the statistics, Dailey noted that while the farm population has steadily declined, the numbers of those Americans living out in the county increased from 31½ million in 1940 to nearly 381/2 million in 1950. By 1970 there were 44 million, and today there are some 49 million folks living in a rural setting. That's an increase of 551/2% in forty years, a percentage that roughly equals the decline in the number of Latah County farms since

Despite these changes, Dailey said, agricultural production has leaped during the last quarter century because of soil, climate ,technology, relatively cheap energy—and lots of hard work. Pointing out the problems caused by the energy crunch and dou-ble-digit finance today, Dailey said the American farmer—particularly the young man wanting to make a career of farming—faces difficult decisions. An option not open to him, however, is that of going back, for where, asked Dailey, would we get need to do the job?

The time may soon be with us Dailey concluded, when America export more of its agricultural technology and less of its farm products. Dailey, who is a member of Moscow Grange, spoke at the first of this year's Grange Issues Forums held April 1 at Kendrick Grange.






