Olivia J. Anderson, a nearly life-long resident of the Genesee area, passed away Wednesday, April 16 at the Paradise Villa Nursing Home at Moscow where she had been a resident since 1974. She was 86.



Mrs. Anderson was born to Sven and Laurine Tidemann at Baltic, South Dakota on Jan. 9, 1894. She moved with her family to Genesee at the age of 10.

She attended school at Genesee and at the Lewiston Normal School at Lewiston. She was granted a teaching certificate at Lewiston in 1914.

Mrs. Anderson taught at country schools in Park and Lemhi county. On Dec. 29, 1921, she married Joseph Anderson at Genesee. They farmed land north of Genesee until moving into town in 1956. He died in 1961.

She was a member of the Genesee Valley Lutheran Church and the World War I Barracks Auxiliary. She is survived by two sons, Lawrence of Genesee and J. D. of West Berlin, Germany; two sisters, Anna Walter of Winthrop, Minn., and Selma Dibble of Omak, Wa.; a brother, Olaf of Twisp, Wa., and three grandchildren.

The funeral was held at 10 a. m. Thursday at Gilbert's Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Randal Hunt, pastor of the Orofino United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was at Riverside Cemetery.

The continuing sharp decline in construction activity in Idaho was clearly evident in March said James Hoogland, Jr. and Stan Merrill, bank managers quoting the March Idaho Construction Report, a publication of the First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by

Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation will be distributed this week.

With the prime interest rate of 20 percent and the average cost of conventional mortgage funds on the March 31 FNMA auction at 17.5 percent, the demand and supply for construction and permanent mortgage financing has been sharply curtailed. Residential permits issued in Boise City were near year-earlier levels, but most other areas of the March were \$29,414,759 or 54.2 percent from present conditions is anticipated in the second quarter.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in March was \$29,414,759 or 54.2 percent below 1979.

New residential construction for 429 dwelling units totaling \$15,178,350, a decrease of 49.8 percent in number and 51.7 percent in value compared with a year ago. Non-residential construction valued at \$7,481,315 was down 51.6 percent below last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$6,755,004 were down 61.1 percent.

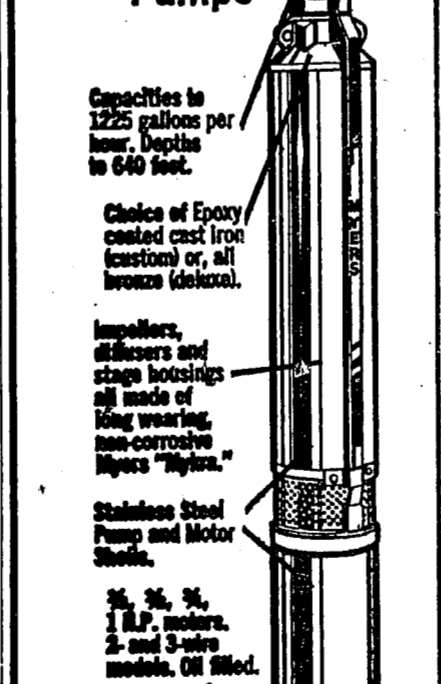
