Juliaetta School Repair Issue, Issue Vote Set for May 20

On May 10th the voters of the Kendrick School District will again be asked to consider passing a school bond issue. If passed, the money would be used to build an addition to the Juliaetta Elementary School, as well as complete remodeling of the present school's basement.

On year ago the issue received a 59% favorable vote which fell short of the 66 2/3% yes vote needed for passage. Supt. Morton stated that the issue was being run again because of the public interest shown in the project. He stated the project proposed is virtually the same as proposed last year except the cost estimate has increased the bond request from \$660,000.00 to \$730,000.00.

Jordan Kanikkeberg Survives Hostage Ordeal In California

The former Foothill High School student who held Principal Jordan Kanikkeberg at knife-point for 70 minutes was known to sheriff's deputies as a "crusader type" who often complained about public officials.

During the ordeal, Kanikkeberg, 52, was bound with wire and his own necktie and threatened with a butcher knife. He was not harmed but was visibly shaken.

Ralph Vasquez, 22, of 1022 Smith St. was arrested after releasing Kanikkeberg Wednesday. He was arrested on suspicion of kidnapping, assault with a deadly weapon and threatening injury to a school official. Bail was set at \$15,000.

"He (the suspect) was always wanting to know what's going on about this and that and what's being done," said Capt. Gary Baker.

The drama unfolded shortly after school let out, according to Capt. Bob Crafton of the Kern County Sheriff's Department.

"He came into the office, apparently brandished a knife at Kanikkeberg and held his hostage for an hour and 10 minutes," Crafton said.

Kanikkeberg talked Vasquez into surrendering, deputies said. Deputies were standing next to the office wall listening while Kanikkeberg was being held.

Kanikkeberg, who was quickly driven away by District Superintendent Gerald DeGraw said "He just talked about what God had told him to do and that he had bombs all over Bakersfield."

DeGraw said later that Vasquez was a student at Foothill High about six years ago. He said Kanikkeberg "knew him—he knew him well."

While Vasquez's 1974 Thunderbird has personalized license plates saying "Class 76" it was not immediately known if Vasquez graduated from Foothill High.

Witnesses said the suspect walked into the administration building at 2:10 p. m. He walked past the main desk and headed down the corridor lined with several offices.

Terri Logan, Kanikkeberg's secretary, said she and the principal left a meeting in another part of the building separately. She got back to her office which adjoins Kanikkeberg's at 2:15.

"A few minutes Dr. Kanikkeberg went through my office and right in to his," she explained. "Within a few seconds, we heard screaming and scuffling and someone yelling." Mrs. Logan said. "Then Dr. Kanikkeberg yelled out at me to clear the office."

"This guy was waiting for him," Mrs. Logan called the Sheriff's Department and evacuated the building.

Mrs. Logan said the suspect was hiding in the private bathroom in Kanikkeberg's office when the principal walked in. Meanwhile, students had already left the school grounds, and most of the teachers on campus didn't know what was going on.

"Nobody knew too much while this was happening," said counselor George Winkler. "Most of the teachers were still in their classrooms. The only way I found out was I happened to walk into the office while it was going on."

Administration secretaries continued to answer the office telephone while deputies fled through the office and surrounded the building. While Kanikkeberg was being held, deputies didn't know whether the suspect was armed. However, Vasquez's car, which was parked right in front of the building, contained several weapons. Two loaded .22 caliber rifles were on the front seat and floorboards. Two double-bladed swords were found in the back of the car. A set of nunchakus, which are short wood clubs connected with a chain, were found in a tool box. Deputies swarmed around the office and tried to telephone in, but the line had been cut.

Kanikkeberg was released at 3:40 p. m., Crafton said.

Iona Silflow, 83, Claimed by Cancer

Mrs. Iona Silflow, a well-known and respected member of the community for over 75 years, lost her gallant fight against cancer at 1:15 a. m. Tuesday, April 29 and slipped quietly away at her home in Kendrick. She had been ill for the past five months and although her passing was not unexpected, the word of it cast a spell of sorrow over the community.



She was born September 12, 1897 at Black Diamond, Washington, the daughter of Emil and Marie Larson. She lived at Black Diamond until 1904 when she moved with her family to Cameron, Idaho. She married Fred W. Silflow May 3, 1917. He preceded her in death in April of 1976. The two farmed at Cameron until 1946 when they retired and moved to Kendrick. They later moved to Juliaetta and then returned to Kendrick in 1952 and made the family home here since that time.

Survivors include 3 sons, Marvin, Emil, and Harold, all of Kendrick; 1 daughter, Ida Felton, Spokane; 1 sister, Alva Fleishman, Othello, Washington; 11 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. Two brothers preceded her in death.

While her health permitted Mrs. Silflow took an active part in the Cameron and Juliaetta A. L. C. W. and the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens group. But while both she and her husband, Fred, were active in church and community affairs, it was her home and family to whom she was most devoted. Her interest and love of gardening and sewing helped fill her days and much of her work ended by being shared with family, friends and neighbors, which often seemed to be the main reason for her efforts. While her children will remember her as a most devoted mother, it was her grandchildren and her great-grandchildren on whom she lavished both love and attention in later years, and, in turn, received back the same love and caring she gave. And, as so often happens, it was the love of her family and her deep Christian faith that allowed her to accept the final burden of her illness with calm understanding and courage.

Funeral services will be held Friday, May 2, from Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church with the Rev. Theo Meske officiating assisted by Rev. Michael Dicks. Pallbearers will be Dale Silflow, Fred Silflow, Gary Silflow, Ron Silflow, Greg Felton, Gary Garland and Rick Chase.

The family suggests that any memorials wished may be made to the Cameron Church or the American Cancer Society.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to Resolution No. 1-80 dated March 4, 1980, of the Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, of Latah, Nez Perce, and Clearwater Counties, Idaho, a special bond election will be held in said District on May 20, 1980, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the following question:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, Latah, Nez Perce, and Clearwater Counties, State of Idaho, be authorized to issue and sell its general obligation negotiable coupon bonds in the principal amount of \$730,000 to become due in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees, with the final installment to fall due twenty (20) years from the date of the bonds, for the purpose of adding to, remodeling or repairing the Juliaetta Elementary School and furnishing and equipping said school building including certain lighting, heating, ventilation and sanitation facilities and appliances necessary to maintain and operate the Juliaetta Elementary School, within and for said district?

Each qualified elector of the district shall vote upon said question by secret and separate ballot, which shall contain the words "BONDS YES" and the words "BONDS NO", and shall indicate his approval or dis-

approval of the question submitted by the marking of a cross (X) opposite the group of words on his ballot which expresses his choice.

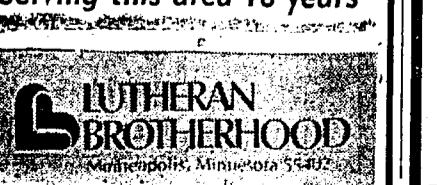


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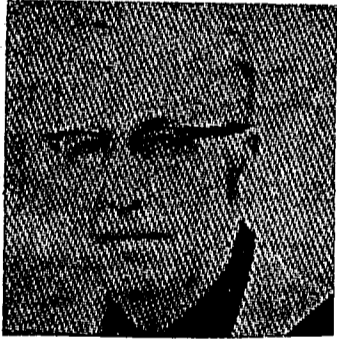
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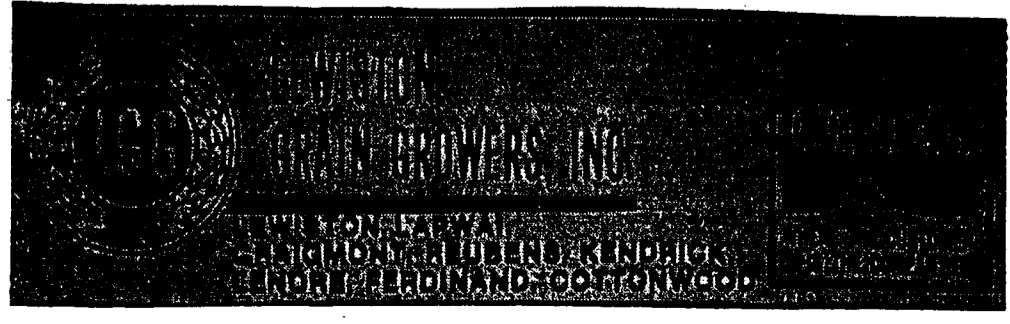
