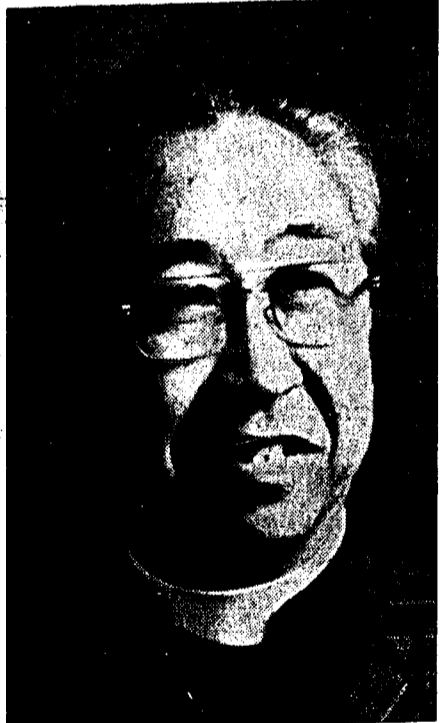

Methodist Bishop Choy To Visit Area Churches

Bishop Wilbur W. Y. Choy will visit the Cavendish and Kendrick United Methodist churches this coming Sunday morning, May 11th. He will preach during both worship services. The Cavendish service will start at 8:30 a. m., instead of the usual time of 9:00 a. m., and the Kendrick service will start at 11:00 a. m.



Bishop Choy is the Resident Bishop of the Seattle Area and the United Methodist church which includes approximately 100,000 members and some 285 churches in 7 districts of Washington and the panhandle of Idaho, making up the Pacific Northwest Annual Conference. Bishop Choy was elected Bishop in 1972 and assigned to the Seattle Area. He is the third Resident Bishop since the area was designated in 1960 and he is the first Asian-American to be elected to the episcopacy of the denomination.

Early in the 1960's Bishop Palmer visited Kendrick, so it is not very often that a Bishop comes to Cavendish or Kendrick. Members and friends of both churches are invited to come out and greet Bishop Choy.

May 20 Date for School Bond Vote

Tuesday, May 20th, Kendrick School District residents will have an opportunity to vote on a school building bond issue.

The School Board and Administration are submitting this bond proposal to finance an addition to the elementary school at Juliaetta. Besides new locker rooms and lavatory facilities, the addition will house a multi-purpose room. The main use of the multi-purpose room will be elementary students during recesses, noon hour and P. E. classes. It is anticipated that the room would share the load of the many community meetings and activities currently being held at the high school or not held for lack of an adequate facility. The room will be equipped with a movable stage for use in meetings, concerts, pageants and similar events.

Included in the bond proposal is money, ear-marked for complete remodeling of the present basement. The kitchen will be enlarged and equipment updated. The cafeteria will be larger and will have much better noise deadening characteristics. The music room will be nearly doubled in size and quieted in addition to having an instrument storage room for security and cleanliness. The boys' lavatory will be totally remodeled; the girls' will be located in the proposed addition. Due to the lack of room in the school as it presently stands, the kindergarten is housed in rented space. The remodeling proposed will remedy this expensive by providing room for the class.

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City Seeks Land Swap for Swim Pool Improvement

Unless there are serious objections at a public meeting on Tuesday, May 20, the City of Kendrick will trade a small parcel of land with Nellie Millard in order to improve facilities at the War Memorial Swimming Pool, it was learned this week.

What the city desires to do is trade Mrs. Millard a 14 foot by 100 foot strip of land just east of the pool for another small parcel of city property directly in back of the city hall. The land now owned by Millard would then be used by the Recreation District to construct new dressing rooms and showers for the pool users.

If the proposed land trade is approved, the Recreation District hopes to begin construction as quickly as possible. The city will discuss the opening of the pool and hiring of pool personnel at the May 20 meeting, Mayor Wayne Harris said Tuesday.

Bids to be Opened
Mayor Harris also said the city will open bids on the construction of a well, pump station, and reservoir for the city at the May 20 council meeting. If the bids are accepted approved the issuance of \$175,000 in municipal bonds for drilling a new well, constructing a pump station and increasing the size of the city reservoir. If the bids are accepted Harris said it is hoped work would be underway quickly.

Family Farm Survives Says Idaho Official

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor

Moscow, Idaho—The family farm is surviving in Idaho a U. of I. audience was told by Max Hanson, state

director of agriculture. Hanson said a large farm can be efficiently operated by a family unit with the seasonal help of one hired hand.

"In Idaho, our farm numbers have declined from 29,500 in 1968 to 23,500 in 1978—a 20 percent decline.

At the same time, farm size has increased 25 percent—from 524 acres to 658 acres," the state official told members of Gamma Sigma Delta, the honor society of agriculture. To preserve family ownership in

farms, it would be advisable to expand the size of the typical Idaho farm so that it could support two families, Hanson said.

"If we are going to transfer the family farm from one generation to the next, we should have a two-family farm. Otherwise, the son or daughter has to leave the farm until the father is willing to step down," he explained.

The dream of owning a farm some times clouds the vision of would-be farmers, preventing them from seeing the practical advantages of leasing farmland, Hanson said.

"Often a young man buys a small farm because this is the only sort of unit for which he has the right down payment. Beginning farmers tend to put a heavy proportion of their very limited capital into land purchases, with the result that they are starved for working capital," he pointed out.

Large self-propelled farm equipment will become less popular as farmers react to high energy costs, Hanson said. He predicted farmers will find it advantageous to "utilize a tractor, preferably diesel for more farm jobs."

Hanson said "high interest rates and run-away energy costs" will encourage farmers to divert land from crop production to use as pasture forage acreage.

Farmers are hurt by inflation, although there is a continuing escalation in land prices, Hanson said. "Farmers live poor and die rich. They are the wealthiest folks in the cemetery," he quipped.

Idaho's water resources are needed for irrigation, industrial use and energy production within the state, Hanson said. He said the government sponsored development of oil shale deposits in the West poses the "potential threat of Snake River water being diverted to the Green River and down the Colorado."

By the 1990's American farmers will be in the driver's seat. America cause the entire world will want to purchase food produced by the United States, Hanson said.

"Our next generation of farmers will be in the driver's seat. Americans will use food power such as oil power is being used today," he stated.

Beamish, his wife Kum Ok, and two children are residing in Lewiston with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. Earle Beamish, while looking for a house.



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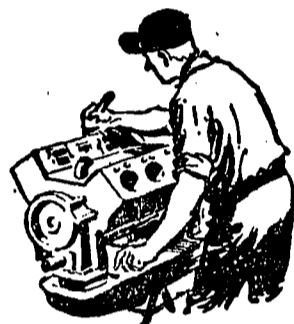

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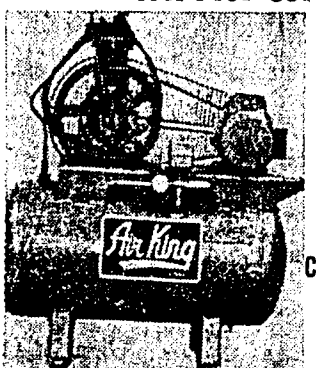
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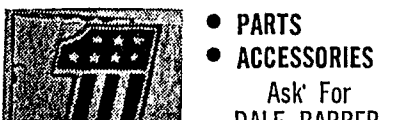
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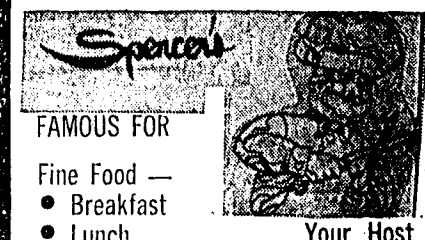
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Law Protects Archaeological Resources

As the weather warms up, individuals will again engage in the collection and excavation of Indian artifacts and historic cultural resources in northern Idaho. Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Cottonwood Resource Area Manager Dick Harms in a move to help prevent these resources from being destroyed and to save some individuals from possible stiff legal penalties, is cautioning people that this activity, without a permit, is illegal on public lands.

Harms explained that on October 31, 1979 the Archaeological Resources Protection Act was passed by Congress which strengthened the Antiquities Act of 1906 and the policy of the United States to protect archaeological resources and sites on public lands by providing stiff penalties to those found guilty of excavation, removing, transporting, or selling these resources without a permit. The Act gives the Bureau and other Federal land managers a strong legal position from which to curtail the illegal removal and excavation of cultural resources from public land.

Criminal penalties include a fine not to exceed \$10,000 or one year imprisonment for the first conviction. In the case of the second or subsequent convictions, the penalty increases to \$100,000 or five years imprisonment. In addition, a civil penalty may be assessed by the Federal land manager concerned.

Persons should be aware that any equipment used into the connection with a violation of this law, including vehicles, cameras, etc., are subject to confiscation by the United States Government.

Harms said he was prompted to warn people of the possible penalties due to an accident that occurred a few weeks ago when BLM officials discovered two men illegally conducting an archaeological dig on public land in the Salmon River area. Both men claimed they were not aware of the law and didn't know they were doing anything wrong.

According to BLM Cultural Resource Specialist Dave Sisson, "The collection of excavation of cultural resources, especially by untrained individuals, is an extremely serious problem and has caused the destruction of great numbers of prehistoric and historic cultural properties. Cultural remains help exemplify past human ways of life and are vitally important for a greater understanding of our ancestors."

"Archaeologists use artifacts recovered from past human endeavors to reconstruct the lifeways of the resident people. Unfortunately, each time an old bottle or arrowhead is removed; a skeleton unearthed and scattered; a pictograph or historic trail, obscured; or a stone structure or lithic tool destroyed, another link to our past is lost forever. For this reason, collection and excavation should only be conducted by qualified personnel working under a properly issued permit."

Anyone interested in learning more about cultural resources on public land in N. Idaho is urged to contact the local BLM office in Cottonwood. Officials can supply individuals with archaeological information of the area as well as information of Federal and state cultural resource laws.

SPRING TURKEY SEASON OPENS SOON— BUT IT WON'T BE EASY

The spring season for wild turkeys open April 26, but don't expect those cagy gobblers to be handing out invitations for an easy hunt.

Eight management units will be open through May 4—Units 11, 13, 14, 19A, 22, 23, 23A and 39. Department of Fish and Game regulations for the spring hunt specify a bag and season limit on one wild bearded-tom—turkey and shotguns and long-bows are allowed in the spring. Unused tags are good for the fall season.

Skill and a fair amount of luck are unofficial requirements according to Dick Norell, state game bird manager. The hunter should also display a fair amount of talent with a turkey call—one false gobble and those birds are gone.

A good call may entice the tom, although he can sneak in on the hunter's blind side without a sound, Norell says.

Experienced hunters scout likely areas in advance and they usually camouflage themselves and their gear. They know too, that they should expect a long, patient wait before they get a shot.

But though it can be a long, frustrating day, Norell says he has yet to talk to a dissatisfied spring turkey hunter. A spring day in turkey country, he explains, brings rewards from watching other wildlife and enjoying the surroundings.

Wild turkeys are most apt to be found near tall trees, usually ponderosa pines where they roost at night for protection. Seeds, nuts, grass and berries are favorite foods, Norell says.

And turkey sign is easy to spot. Hunters look for those good-sized tracks, feathers, droppings and scratchings under trees.

Unit 18 is usually included in the spring season, but Fish and Game Commission approved a closure this year to protect a new flock of Merriams turkeys brought in from South Dakota. Idaho has agreed to eventually send 40 pine martens to the South Dakota Department of Wildlife, Parks and Forestry in exchange for 120 turkeys.

The Idaho department's policy plan estimates the turkey population at 2,000. The long-range objective is to double the number in 10 years, both by transporting turkeys and by relocating birds from Idaho flocks, Norell says.

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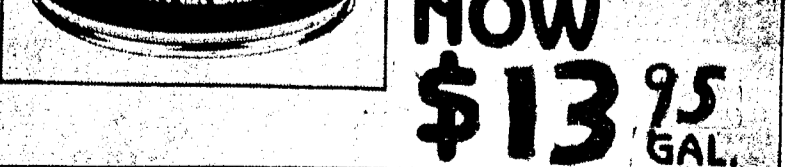
