Kendrick Voters To Decide on Bond Issue Tues., May 20

The Kendrick School District voters will vote next Tuesday, the 20th, on a 20-year \$730,000 bond issue for major renovation of the Juliaetta Elementary School. The original building was constructed in about 1936 with a two-room addition made in 1963. Supt. Morton estimates that the total expense of the \$730,000 bonds and the interest paid over the next 20 years would be about \$1,300,000. Such bonds are paid over the 20-year period by taxes levied against the property in the District. Due to changes in assessment procedures and taxing laws, it becomes impossible to precisely determine the effect on the property owner. However, a close estimate is that for each \$1,000 assessed value of the property, the owner would have to pay about \$.91 per month or \$11.00 per year in additional taxes. Therefore, to get an estimate of his tax increase, the property owner should take the assessed valuation as it appears on his most recent tax statement and multiply that figure by .011. The answer will be the owners estimated tax increase due to the building bond.

If the bond issue is passed Tuesday, the bonds must be sold to interested parties within the next 2 years. Therefore, if for some reason such as high interest rates, the School Board does not want to sell the bonds right away, they can wait up to two years to do so. Frequently, there are a number of citizens who wish to invest in them due to the fact that revenue gained from them is tax free and the interest rate is fixed for the duration of the bond.

Final Plans Progress For Locust Blossom Festival May 31

Final preparations were in the process of being completed this week as Kendrick volunteer workers and organizations looked forward to the 20th Annual Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival scheduled for Saturday, May 31.

With the theme, "A Day to Remember," the day begins with the running of the 3rd Annual Festival Run, a 6-mile event starting from Browning Cut Stock outside of Juliaetta and ending at the Kendrick High School. There will also be a 2-mile "fun run" for those athletes who aren't quite up to the longer race. Steve Caskey and Jeff Sowles are co-chairmen of this event.

Following the run, the Festival will get underway with the parade. The kiddie parade will lead off at 9:30 (see separate article) and will be followed by the main parade that begins at 10:00 a. m. The V. F. W. Color Guard will lead the parade followed by this year's Grand Marshalls Lester and Lillie Wallace. The parade committee reports that a number of interesting floats are expected and prizes will be given in both commercial and non-commercial categories, plus a grand prize. Gerald Ingle learned this week that among the dignitaries in this year's parade will be the Honorable Frank Church, Democratic Senator.

Following the parade there will be races in the park for children, concessions, a tennis tournament at the High School (see separate article), a Sweet Adeline Concert, a Flower Show at the Fraternal Temple, an old time Fiddlers contest, an Arts and Craft Show at the Methodist Church and a logging contest which will begin in the afternoon.

The highlight of the day will be serving of the barbecue beef dinner at the park at noon. There will be a special reserve section in the park for pioneers. The menu includes barbecued beef, baked beans, cole slaw, pickles, punch and coffee. The admission is a Festival Button which are now on sale at various business firms in town.

Four Engineering Students Build Electrified Renault

Moscow—An electric Renault may be touring between Moscow and Genesee soon, thanks to the curiosity and sponsorship of a Genesee man.

Four electrical engineering students at the University of Idaho are adapting a red 1963 Renault into an electric car which should be ready to drive soon. The project is being sponsored by Dan Aherin, a farmer from Genesee.

"Dan Aherin came to me a couple of years ago and said he was interested in building an electric car and wanted some technical advice," said George Hespelt, associate professor of electrical engineering, who is directing the project. "The electrical engineering department said that if he'd fund the project, the department would build the car. It makes a good project for my senior design class in electrical engineering."

The car, which Hespelt termed "quite responsive," has two electric motors which give it about 20 horsepower. "The car is designed to have a lot of 'zap' so that it can take off quickly from a standstill, although its power might peak at higher speeds," he said.

It is powered by 10 six-volt batteries. One 12-volt battery supplies energy to the headlights and other auxiliaries. It has a regular transmission, but no clutch, since the stu-

dents have found that none is needed with an electric car, Hespelt said. "The car has a range of 60-70 miles at 50-55 miles per hour before the batteries used to be recharged," Hespelt said.

However, the batteries operate best in the top 10 percent of their range meaning that the batteries should be recharged frequently even if the car has only been driven six miles, he explained.

A drive from Genesee to Moscow and back—about 28 miles—probably would use 50 percent of the battery capabilities. The lower the batteries get, the more the battery life is diminished and the sooner you need new batteries, Hespelt said.

Although an electric car should be plugged in frequently for recharging, the high cost is in buying new batteries rather than in the recharging, he said.

The senior electrical engineering majors who are working on the project include Ron Halverson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ron Halverson, 611 E. Dewey Lane, Caldwell; Jack Stamper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill M. Stamper, 1214 Coeur d'Alene; Coeur d'Alene; Jim Poxleitner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Poxleitner, Box 56, Keuterville, and Kirk Quirl, son of Mr. and Mrs. Brent Quirl, Box 152, Teton.

The students have compared the cost per mile of driving a gasoline-powered car to an electric car as 3.1 cents per mile for a car using gas, and 1 cent per mile for an electric car, Hespelt said.

Still there is no market yet for electric cars because of their short range and high cost of batteries, he said.

He said that Aherin, who obtained

Uniform Fishing Regulations on Tri-State Meeting Agenda

Uniform fishing regulations on Snake River boundary waters will be one of the subjects for discussion when members of the Idaho Fish & Game commission meet with their counterparts from Oregon and Washington in Lewiston May 16.

The tri-state session follows a 2-day meeting of the Idaho Commission in Lewiston.

Robert L. Salter, acting director of the Idaho Department of Fish & Game, said the agenda also includes a review of big game management techniques in the three states, a progress report on the Columbia River Salmon Management Plan and the status of energy legislation affecting the Pacific Northwest.

The annual Shikar-Safari Award will be presented to the District Conservation Officer Andy Ogden of Roberts, recognizing him as Idaho's outstanding conservation officer of 1979.

Legislative Change Affects Hunter Education Law

The Department of Fish and Game has instituted some new rules affecting certain young hunters, following legislative action to amend the hunter education law.

Under the amendment, resident children who previously held a valid license are not required to show a hunter education certificate before obtaining a current license to hunt.

The new legislation took effect March 5. The department's bureau of administration says a resident combination license or hunting license will be issued to boys and girls under the age of 15 only if:

1. A previous valid Idaho combination or hunting license is presented
2. A notarized statement from the child's parents or guardian is provided affirming that the individual previously held a valid combination or hunting license.
3. An accepted hunter education certificate is produced.

a bachelor of science degree in agriculture from UI in 1955, will probably drive the electric car on his farm near Genesee as well as on trips to Moscow. Meanwhile, students in the electrical engineering department will be monitoring the car's performance, Hespelt said.

One of the students is building a generator for the car, using a transformer donated by Idaho Power Co. All other funds needed for building the car are being provided by Aherin. Hespelt said he estimated the final cost for building the car to be around \$1,900.

A project a future class might undertake could be to build a "hybrid car"—an electric car using a gasoline engine to drive a generator to keep the batteries charged, Hespelt said.

"With such a car, you could drive to Boise and back, if you wanted to," he said. He added that Aherin had indicated some interest in this project and that Washington Water Power which has long had an interest in the development of electric cars, might also be interested in seeing a hybrid car developed here.

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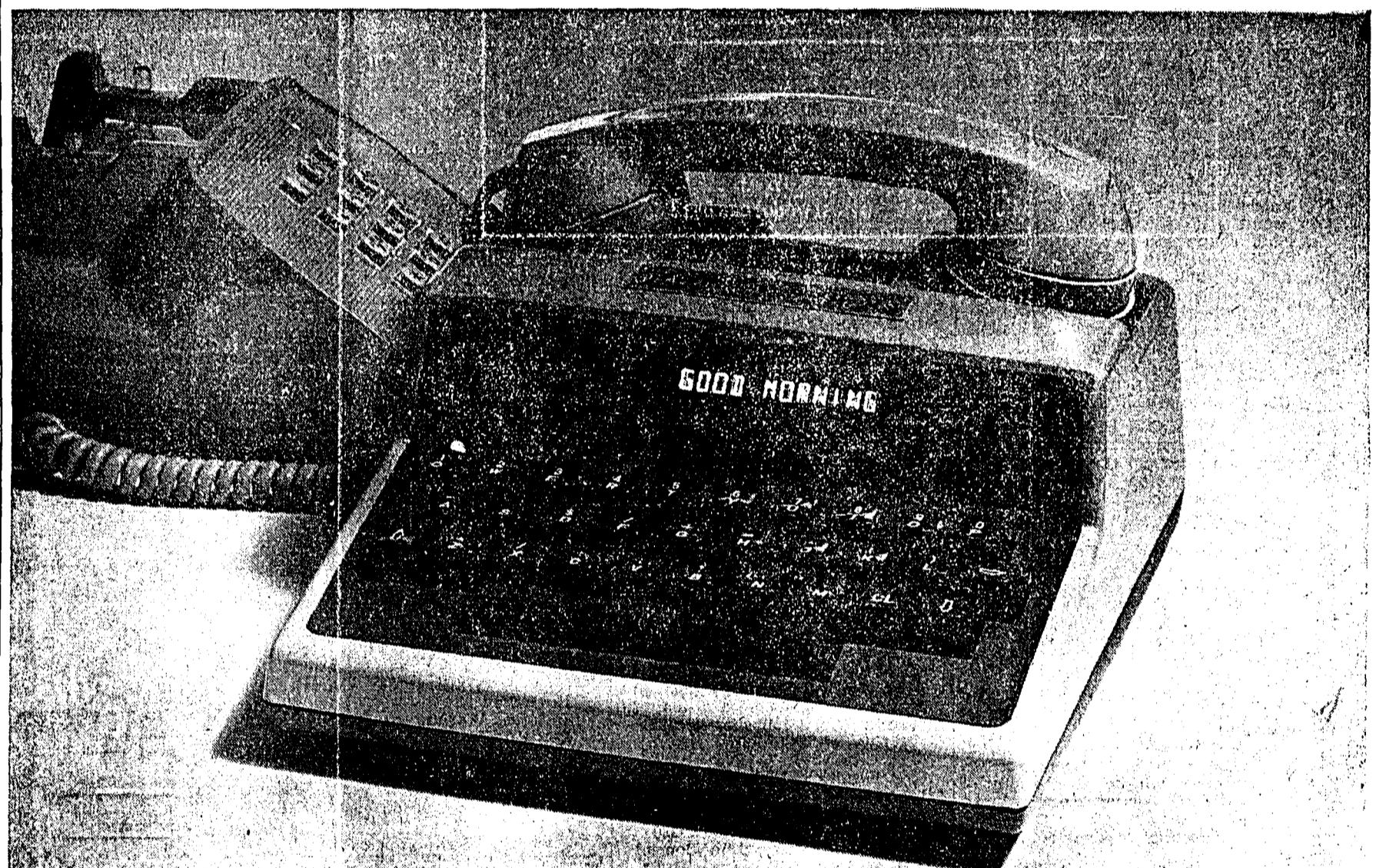

The reader must see it to believe it. A somewhat befuddled black bear being backpacked to her den by a gent apparently unconcerned about those jaws just overhead.



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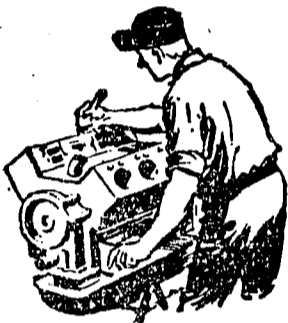

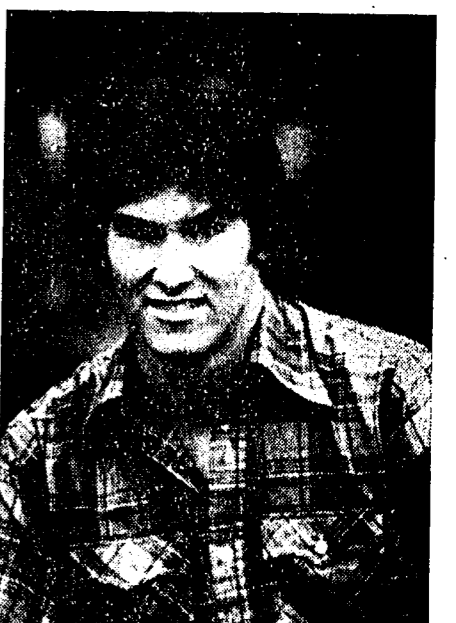

Immunization Requirements For School Age Children
The 1980-81 school year will see changes in the immunization requirements for some school children. The immunization law reads that any child in kindergarten through the 5th grade shall have proof of immunization provided to the school.

The proof of immunization shall be a statement which gives the month, day and year of the immunization. The required immunizations are: DPT: 4 or more; Polio: 4 or more; Measles: 1 given after the child in 12 months of age; Mumps: 1 given after the child in 12 months of age; Rubella, 1 given after the child in 10 months of age.

Exceptions are available for personal, religious and health reasons.

Parents may sign an exemption form by contacting the school.

Immunizations are available free from the Latah County Office of the North Central District Health Department. The clinics are held in Room 206 of the County Courthouse from 1:30 to 4:30 on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month. No appointment is necessary. Next clinic is May 21, 1980.

Letters to the editor . . .

We are again facing a bond problem. The problems that existed last year did not get solved in the Legislature. The reason was that the education people including school trustees refused to support an optional tax to replace the property tax. We will never get the support of the education people for an optional tax if bond issues continue to pass.

Before the voters go to the polls and vote upon themselves a supposedly \$730,000.00 bond they better understand what it will really cost them.

This \$730,000.00 bond will cost the taxpayers over \$2,000,000.00 in twenty years.

With the present system of assessed valuation the bond will cost about 14 mills and it could cost more depending on the interest rate on the bond.

If the present system and 14 mills are used then it would cost a \$10,000.00 home owner about \$110.00 a year and a farmer with \$50,000.00 assessed valuation about \$700.00 a year. This is above the taxes you are paying now.

But now listen to this—with the new appraisal coming out in June—I do not know how much Latah County will increase—but it will go up—but Nez Perce County buildings will go up about 300% and farm land at Southwick will go up from \$200.00 an acre to \$500.00 an acre—probably a larger increase in the Cameron, Leland area.

What effect the new appraisals will have on the overall tax increase no one really knows at this time because the budgets are now frozen by the legislature.

What will happen when the legislature unfreezes the budgets? Only God knows.

Another disastrous fact is that this 14 mills will be above the 1% tax limitation on property.

We have so many unknowns as of now—what will the new appraisals have on future tax increases? Will all property be taxed at 1% of market value when the legislature unfreezes the budgets?

Will we lose the 2% limitation on property values next year? The education people were leading the fight for eliminating it last session—I know, I was there. If this happens the property tax increase will curl your hair.

How much more will farm prices slump?

With all these uncertainties, I think it is very unfair for any taxing district to ask its voters to pass a \$2,000,000.00 expenditure outside the 1% limitation at this time.

In many cases the renters of farm land vote yes on bond issues—or they have no interest to vote—because they do not pay the land tax.

I'm sure if this bond issue passes—then many landlords will pass the property tax onto the renter.

So if you renters cannot afford the property tax—you better get out and vote no.
