

Robert E. Magnuson to Retire as Kendrick Postmaster After Nineteen Years Service



Robert E. Magnuson, the twelfth man to serve as postmaster of Kendrick since the community was established 91 years ago, ends 19 years of service Friday, May 30 with his official retirement. Until the selection of his replacement is made by the Postal Service, Mrs. Eloise Hocking, Deary Postmaster, will serve as officer-in-charge of the Kendrick facility.

A businessman and civic leader since he came to Kendrick in January of 1948, Magnuson will continue to operate his insurance agency and serve as city clerk. His wife, Lucille, who has been the chief clerk at the Kendrick Post Office since 1964, will continue on at her position for a short period of time until a replacement is selected and trained.

Magnuson came to Kendrick January 28, 1948. He had been with the Farm Credit Administration in Idaho Falls from March of 1944 to July

of 1947 when he accepted a position with the Production Credit Association in Walla Walla until moving to Kendrick where he purchased the Antelope Inn which he operated until October of 1951. Until 1953, Magnuson was connected with a frozen food distributorship with Mike Mitchell in Lewiston. In March of '53, Bob purchased the Marvin Long Insurance Agency, which he still maintains, assisted by his son Dana.

He was appointed city clerk of Kendrick May 7, 1956, succeeding the late Ed Long.

Magnuson's tenure as postmaster began April 14, 1961 when he assumed charge of the Kendrick facilities from Fred O. Stedman. Stedman, now retired and living in Lewiston, had been postmaster at Kendrick since 1944, but resigned to become a rural mail carrier. Magnuson was officially confirmed in his position September 11, 1962.

Mrs. Hocking, the Deary postmaster and officer-in-charge at Kendrick will commute between her home and this office. Mrs. Gwen Deobald, who is employed at the Post Office in Lewiston, will become officer-in-charge at Deary. The appointment of a new postmaster for Kendrick will be made by a postal selection board from qualified candidates within the Postal Service within four months from the date of Magnuson's retirement.

Completing 19 years as postmaster at Kendrick, Magnuson has the distinction of having served longer in that position than any of his eleven predecessors. The first postmaster appointed in this community, which was then known as Latah, was Thomas Kirby in May of 1889. The name of Latah was changed to Kendrick on October 18, 1890 and in December of that year Emmett W. Hill was named postmaster. Hill served until April of 1893 when he was succeeded by James M. Pearce who remained until July 3, 1897 when John J. Nutcham was appointed. Nutcham was replaced by Arthur P. Hamley who remained until 1911 when Harry G. Stanton was appointed. In March of 1916 John F. Brown became postmaster, serving until May of 1934 when Hugh D. Stanton was named postmaster. In October of 1929 Edgar Dammarell was named postmaster and served until June of 1934 when Clyde H. Daugherty was appointed. Daugherty was postmaster until the appointment of Stedman in March of 1944 and served until Magnuson was named in 1961.

Morton Resigns As Superintendent Of Kendrick Schools

Richard Morton, superintendent of Schools for J. School District No. 283 for the past five years, submitted his resignation at the May meeting of the Board of Trustees. Morton has accepted the position as superintendent of schools at the Emmett School District and will begin his new position July 1. The local district has called for applications to replace Morton and a decision should be made as to a new superintendent sometime in mid-June.

The Emmett position is an advancement for Morton. Emmett School District encompasses all of Gen County and has a student enrollment of over 2700, compared to the 370 students in the local district.

Three other teachers submitted letters of resignation at the May meeting. They were Ted Mickelson, o-g instructor, special education teacher Lynda Potter and business teacher Paul Hultgren. Their replacements have not yet been hired.

Gale Vallem, who has taught and coached in Kendrick since 1968, was hired as Kendrick High School Principal for next year replacing Tom Pannell. In addition to being principal, Mr. Vallem will coach Jr. High basketball and teach some of the driver education classes.

All the faculty at Juliaetta Elementary School have indicated they will return next year.

At the May meeting the Board adopted a calendar for next year. The first day for students will be Tuesday, Sept. 2.

The Board accepted the insurance bid of the R. E. Magnuson Agency for \$5,611.00 for the bulk of the District's insurance. A bid of \$5,355.00 from Stonebraker Agency of Lewiston was also received.

The Board examined computer bids reserving a decision for later following further considerations.

In final action, the Board announced roofing bids for approximately 220 squares on the high school. Specifications can be obtained at the Superintendent's office. Bids will be opened at 8:00 p. m. on June 12.

The next regular Board meeting will be held at 8:00 p. m. on June 12 at the high school.

Volcano Probably Won't Trigger Longterm Psychological Problems

Moscow—The eruption of Mt. St. Helens isn't the type of situation to cause an increase in suicides or long-term psychological problems for victims of the volcano's ash fallout, according to a University of Idaho counseling psychologist.

"But the subsequent confinement indoors, is causing a variety of tensions which may not be entirely over said Jim Morris, professor of guidance and counseling, and a counseling psychologist at UI. These will be aggravated if confinement is continued because of ash pollution to the air.

Normally, in the spring psychologists see an increase in crisis situations, where persons who have been depressed through the winter realize they are still depressed, even though the weather is nicer and other people are happier. But he doesn't expect the recent natural disaster to cause an increase in persons seeking psychological help.

"In this situation, depressive people aren't comparing themselves to others, since we're all in the same boat," Morris said. "In terms of suicide, it's a big help to potential victims to realize they're not alone."

Although spirits have begun to lift as rains wash away ash and color returns to the landscape, Morris warns that we probably haven't seen the last of the ash.

"Until the ash is completely gone, we may have a certain continued confinement, and some renewed anger," he said. Loss of mobility and of control over the environment are two major causes of anger or frustration in this situation, Morris said. The confinement is perhaps hard-

est on mothers who have to keep children indoors in the face of good weather and on persons whose physical activity is impaired by respiratory problems caused by the ash, he pointed out.

"To handle it, we'll just have to accept the confinement and find something constructive to do.

"It's not all bad," he said. "We can take the opportunity to get to know our families and neighbors better and to do some home-related entertainment activities," Morris

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

 This letter concerns the override levy proposed by the board of the Potlatch Cemetery Maintenance District.
 Last year we were led to believe by some legislators, that an override election would fix a more livable levy with which we could operate the district. We have recently been informed by the Nez Perce County recorder, citing a ruling by the State Attorney General that we must again ask the tax payer's approval to exceed our 1978 levy of \$200.00. That levy was set low in that year in order to use up some extra monies we had from previous years. In 1978, all budgets were frozen as a result of the 1% and many of us who had been trying all along to save the tax-payers money were left without enough money to run the districts we are supposed to care for.
 We are asking for a levy of 1.85 mills which, based on current evaluation would give us about \$1915.00. This, together with the \$200 we would receive anyway, will give us enough to operate on for the next two years (1981-82). We felt that by asking for this amount we could save the approximately \$200 that it would cost to hold an override election again next year.

Potlatch—More Call Backs
 Lewiston—Potlatch Corp. will call back about another 50 sawmill workers May 27 when the Lewiston plant re-activates its night shift on the three main headrigs, Clearwater Unit's Manufacturing Manager Martin Cluserer said today.
 In addition, another 35 will return to fill secondary production slots—such as surfacing—made necessary because of this and previously announced recalls.
 A headrig is a large band-saw used in the primary cutting of whole logs in rough lumber. The Lewiston plant has three, plus two Chip-N-Saws used to make rough lumber and chips. Currently, the headrigs are operating during the day shift only, while the Chip-N-Saws are operating two shifts.
 Meanwhile, heavy layers of volcanic ash from the Mt. St. Helens eruption kept all three potlatch plants outside Lewiston closed, and officials had no estimate of when they could reopen.
 Currently operating are Potlatch mills in Kamiah, Pierce and Post Falls. Plants in the towns of Potlatch, Coeur d'Alene and St. Maries are prepared for at least limited operations as soon as chip trucks, now unable to operate because of the ash are running. Planning machinery at Potlatch operated on a limited basis today to make possible the loading of several long-haul lumber trucks.

 Morris Hemstrom, extension livestock specialist and Dr. Floyd Frank, veterinarian and head of the UI Department of Veterinary Science, say problems from eating dust or from dust on animal's coats should be minimal.
 They do suggest that livestock owners who have a choice keep their animals sheltered from the dust and feed them hay that has not been filled with the ash.
