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F. Marvin Long, 86, Retired Kendrick Businessman, Succumbs June 5

Frank Marvin Long, a veritable Kendrick institution, died early Thursday morning, June 5, at Paradise Villa Nursing Home at Moscow. He was 86. A retired merchant, he owned and operated N. B. Long and Sons, a Kendrick general store until 1967. Mr. Long represented the last of the early day businessmen, having been in the retail trade in this area from 1905.



Former Kendrick Resident Receives Research Grant

Mildred Brammer, Association Professor of Biology at Ithaca College, has received a \$141,000 grant from the National Institutes of Health to support her research in biological clock mechanisms. The grant, administered by Temple University, will provide Brammer with a full-time technician and equipment necessary for the research. She will direct eight of the 12 proposed experiments funded by the grant and will involve undergraduates in Ithaca College's Biology Department in her work.

Marvin was a major part of N. B. Long and Sons and through his association with this business, began by his father and later operated by the sons, he became one of the major merchants in the area, well-known and respected by those whose lives he came into contact with during his association with the firm.

His father, assisted by his sons, Tom, Ed and Marvin ran a meat market in Leland and Southwick from 1905 to 1908. They delivered meats to the farmers, using a "meat wagon." In those days meats sold for: steaks, 10c lb.; roasts 8c and boils 6c.

In the fall of 1908 Mr. Long had accumulated \$1,500 in cash from this business. He came to Kendrick and purchased a meat market, next door to the old Farmers Bank from Walker and Compton, paying \$500 cash. He then purchased a dray line from Andy Hill for \$500 and with the other \$500 made a down payment on a home, the one Marvin and his wife, Martha occupied. That same winter the elder Long purchased the other dray line in Kendrick from Hugh Greenwood. Tom Long ran the meat market, Ed and Marvin operated the dray line.

In 1920, the Long family purchased the Baker Dept. Store, forming a partnership of N. B. Long, Jody Long, Tom Long and Marvin Long. They expanded their building, occupying the store that is now "Phil's Food City."

Jody Long died in 1927, N. B. Long in 1928, and E. T. Long in 1962. For many years the firm did its own butchering, with N. B. Long and Tom Long operating this portion of the business. Tom Long also operated the feed lot for the firm. Marvin had been manager of the dry goods and shoe department since 1920 and of the entire store at the passing of his brother, Tom.

The store sold to Hunter and Erickson of Troy and closed its doors Dec. 23, 1967, ending 63 years of retailing in this area.

Long married Martha Lowery at Pullman on May 20, 1939. She survives him at the family home here. He was a member of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club, the Kendrick Grange and attended the Kendrick Methodist Church. He was active in Latah County Wildlife Association, serving as a president of that group and was also active in the Democratic political party.

Although he could appear gruff at times, there is no doubt that many families would have found the hard times of the depression and seasonal lay-offs much more difficult had it not been for Marvin's understanding and willingness to extend credit to customers. He had a deep interest and appreciation of the community and its people and history and was a "gold mine" of information for anyone wanting to know of the early history of the town and area.

For those who came to know him in his later years, he will remain forever as a friendly, agreeable person always willing to stop and visit and talk of both past and present events. The knowledge that another of our pioneer citizens has been taken from us gives no comfort. What remains is the fact that he did live, did labor, did prosper and helped create the community and its way of life we have today. That Marvin Long is known and appreciated for the good he has done, is a fitting tribute for any man.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a sister, Benah Key of Spokane. Three brothers, Tom, Jody and Ed, and a sister, Anna, preceded him in death.

The funeral was held Monday, June 9, at Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow with the Rev. Steve Caskey officiating. Organist was Dee Morton and vocalists Donna Lohman and Ann Smith sang, "The Lord's Prayer" and "How Great Thou Art." Pallbearers were Gerald Ingle, George Brocke, Robt. Watts, Richard Blewett, John Deobald and Frank Abrams. Honorary pallbearers were Dr. D. A. Christensen, Norla Callison, Lester Crocker, Rufus Fairfield, Marvin Vincent, Harley Eichner, Robert Magnuson, Frank Benschoter, A. O. Kanikkeberg and Ben Cook. Burial was at the Kendrick City Cemetery.

Emma F. Kent, 87, Passes June 5

Emma Florence Kent, a lifelong resident of this area and a well-known and respected member of the community died Thursday, June 5, at the Latah County Convalescent Center, where she had been a resident since December of 1978. She was 87 years old.

Mrs. Kent was born to Gip and Ella Morgan near Troy on August 10, 1892. She moved to Kendrick with her family in 1906 and married Edgar Kent at Moscow on October 5, 1910. He survives her at Moscow.

Emma was very well known in this area, having lived on both Cedar Creek and American Ridge. She was a good and agreeable neighbor as well as a willing and helpful worker in any organization to which she belonged and these included the American Ridge Red Cross Society which later drifted into the "Hi Hope" Home Demonstration Club after the need for the garments, pillows, bandages and other hospital supplies decreased following the war years.

In Grange she held several stations and friends recall she was always on hand, whether called upon for cooking, helping at singing or acting in a skit or chording on the piano for dancing after Grange meetings.

She was also a member of the Methodist Church and the Hill and Valley Garden Club.

A lovely person who truly enjoyed life and her role as wife, mother and good, hospitable neighbor, Emma has been missed the past few years as her health started to fail. And, though her passing may well be viewed as the blessed movement from the dark shadow into eternal life, her friends cannot help but feel a sense of sadness in the knowledge that their friend is no longer among them.

The community conveys its sympathy to her husband, Ed, and the entire family.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by two daughters, Kathryn Morey of Moscow and Flo Lyons of Kendrick; two sons, George of Baldwin Park, Calif., and Roy of Boise; a brother, Archie, of Lewiston, and two sisters, Olive Nichols of Clarkston and Fannie Gardner of Tacoma.

She is also survived by 10 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. Funeral services were held Tuesday, at 2 p. m. from Short's Funeral Chapel at Moscow with the Rev. Ron Palmer officiating. Burial followed at American Ridge Cemetery near Kendrick.

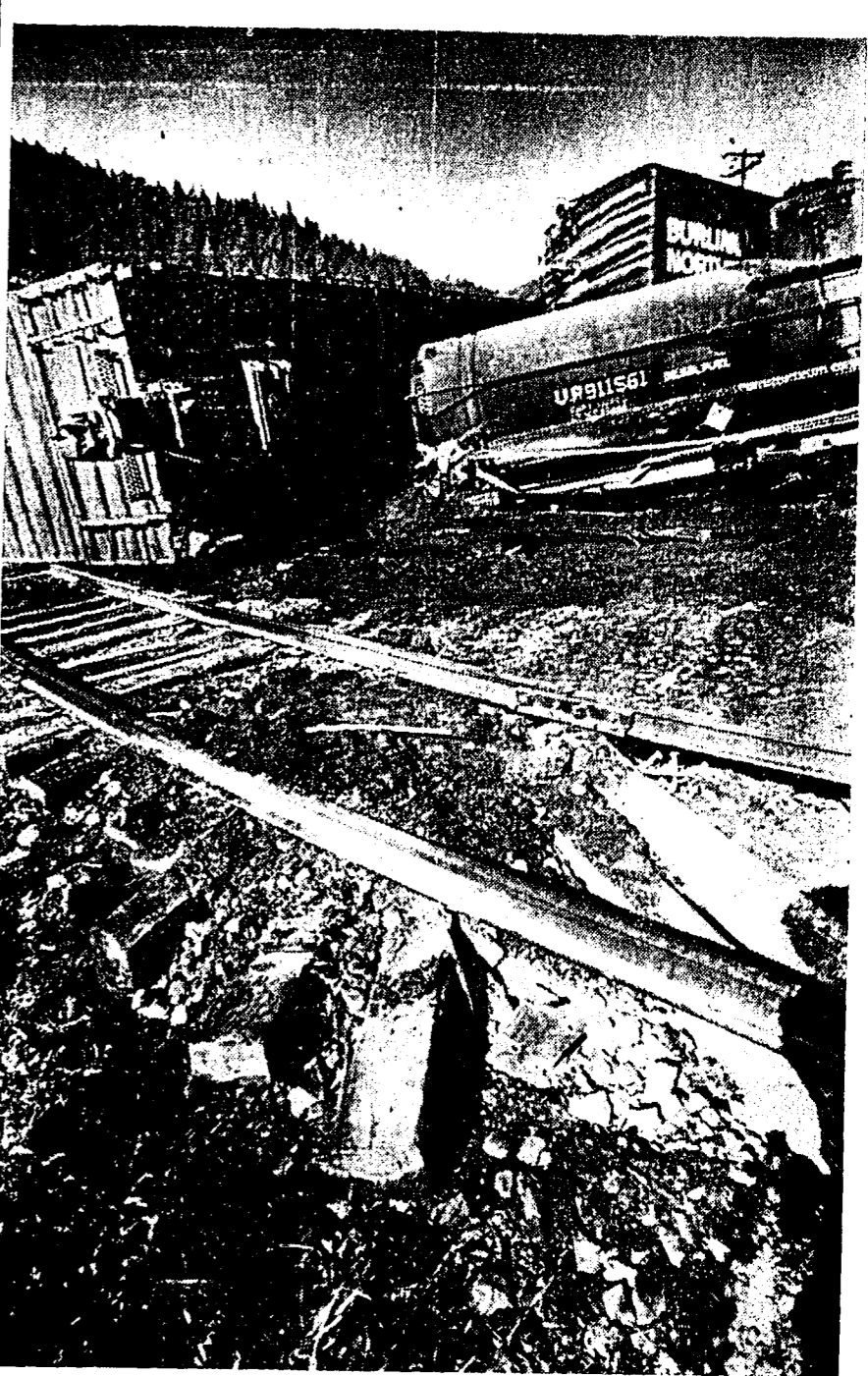
Diet Club News

Burlington Northern Cars Derailed



Three of the six railroad cars that derailed last Wednesday night on the Burlington Northern tracks in East Kendrick are shown here in this picture by Gazette photographer Bob Bain. The six cars of the thirteen car train left the tracks about 10:30 last Wednesday in about the same place a similar accident occurred six weeks ago.

No one was injured in either this or the previous accident and the exact cause of the accident was not known at this time. The train had left Pullman around 9 p. m. for Lewiston. All of the cars were empty when they left the track except for a flat car with some farm machinery on it and a tanker loaded with 12,000 gallons of diesel fuel. A committee was formed and charged with reviewing rates-charges for water and sewer services and recommending the user fees and other matters to the Council for final decisions.

Ordinance No. 256 was adopted and will take effect after publication. This Ordinance deals with removal of parked vehicles.

Latah Sanitation has red tagged all oil drums that are being used for garbage. This condemnation will give notice that starting on Wed., June 25th, garbage stored in oil drums will not be picked up. City Ordinance on Solid Waste Chapter 4, Section 3-4-7 in re: Refuse Containers states: "It shall be the duty of every owner or occupant where garbage is created or accumulated to at all times keep or cause to be kept, portable approved metal or plastic containers for the deposit therein of rubbish and garbage."

All containers shall be water-tight and not easily corrodible, rodent and flyproof; shall be equipped with handles and a close fitting lid. Such containers shall be not less than (20) twenty gallons capacity, nor more than (32) thirty-two gallons capacity and limited to sixty (60) pounds in weight. The metal containers shall be of not less than twenty-eight (28) gauge metal or the equivalent, and be hot-dipped after fabrication to assure nonleaking cans and so labeled to be leak-proof.

Containers shall be kept in sanitary condition, with the inside and outside thereof washed as needed to keep the same free and clean of all accumulating grease and decomposing material and so that no odor nuisance shall exist.

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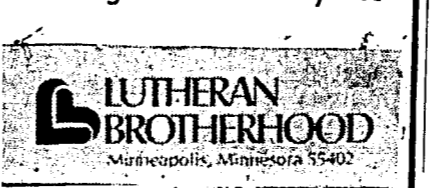

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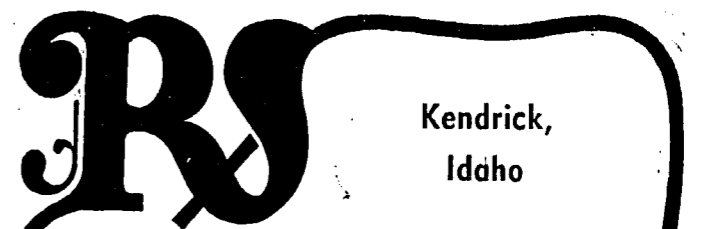
