Oilseed Seen as Possible Idaho Crop

Boise--With surpluses and resultint low prices making wheat, barley, potatoes and sugar beets less attractive to Idaho farmers as money-making crops, UI sciences are looking at crop alternatives.

Dr. Harry Guenthner, superintendent, of the University's Research & Extension Centers at Parma and Caldwell told Pacific Northwest entomologists recently that oilseed crops are among the alternatives being studied. Two other crops whose potential is not fully realized in Idaho are legumes and alfalfa, he said.

The primary oilseed crops being studied are sunflower, safflower and winter rape, each of which does best under slightly different growing conditions, Guenthner said. Soy-beans are being considered, also, but their current price makes them unable to compete with other crops.

Guenthner said cultural practices must be developed, herbicides tested and evaluated and the potential for each crop studied before scientists will know whether oilseed crops could replace or supplement crops whose profitability is slipping.

He made his remarks at the meetings of the Pacific Branch of the Entomological Society of America, June 24-26 in Boise.

Many recent-model tractors are equipped with restriction indicators which give an easy-to-read warning when an air cleaner unit should be replaced. The operator should rely on the indicator should rely on the indicator and not on his own visual inspection of the air cleaner, Peterson emphasized.

"When air filters are being check-ed, extreme care should be taken to avoid dumping ash into the carburetor," Peterson said.

To clean a partially clogged air filter, tapping the filter to remove dirt is not recommended since this Peterson said he is optimistic that "common-sense precautions" will enable farmers to minimize equipment damage problems posed by the residue of volcanic ash from Mount St.

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
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
