



One of these chemicals, lindane, is now the subject of hearings by the Environmental Protection Agency. If its use is eliminated, no seed treatments will be available to protect peas, lentil or small grain seed from wireworms.

According to O'Keeffe, affordable alternative chemicals are three to five years off, and resistant varieties might not be available for 15 years. He said the distribution, pest status, biology and population dynamics

known. many be present before growers suffer economic losses nor how great those losses could be once seed treatments were no longer available. Taking fast and accurate population counts of these pests is therefore the first step in their control.

According to O'Keeffe, the 34 inch slender, hard-bodied, yellow-to-brown wireworms are present to most cropland areas of Idaho. They have a wide range of hosts and can destroy seeds and seedlings of small grains, corn, grasses, sugar beets and many They can also revegetable crops duce the quality of potato, root and bulb crops, sometimes leaving them unmarketable. While chemicals are available to protect high unit-value crops such as potatoes, these methods are too expensive to be adapted

to dryland conditions. The machine Moden and O'Keeffe first "dreamed up" four years ago

allows soil sampling and mechanical sifting to be done in one operation It is basically a tractor equipped with a trencher, crossbelt conveyor and rotating cylindrical elevator screens

The trencher lifts the soil out of the ground onto the conveyor, which delivers it to the elevator. The elevator then deposits it into the mid-The middle screen re dle screen. moves particles four millimeters in diameter and larger and deposits them back on the soil surface. The one-to-four millimeter soil particles are collected from the outer screen, while the fines fall through the outer

screen onto the ground.

Because the amount of soil to be searched for wireworms is to much less with the mechanical sampler, the worms can be found more easily and quickly than with the posthole digger technique. In taking each sample, posthole diggers cut a threegallon bucketfull of soil, which must then be screened with a hand sieve or power shaker or floated in water. The sampler will be tested this fall in fields known to be infested with wireworms. Counts collected using the machine will be compared population levels determined with The more sand has escaped from by other means so that the sampler's accuracy can be assessed.

IRS FINAL REPORT ON FILING STATISTICS

Boise-According to Acting Disrict Director Aubry Myrick, Idaho taxpayers filed 346,090 individual returns by June 30, 4,055 fewer than by the same time last year.

Refunds issued totalled 253,356, as opposed to 237,272 last year. This year's total refunds were \$147,599,-770. Last year's were \$117,365,826. Associate Agricultural Editor Ithaca, N. Y.—University of Idaho Researchers have isolated a new protein which may aid detection of early pregnancy in cattle, the Ameri-can Society of Animal Science was

told July 29. J. E. Butler, UI graduate student in animal science, reported on the procedures researchers followed as they isolated two proteins from placental membranes of pregnant cows. One of the proteins, identified as alpha fetaprotein, may prove to be useful for preventing abortions in cattle which are deficient in this pregnancy-associated protein, Butler

suggested. The other protein was apparently isolated for the first time. Butler said further research will be needed to determine if testing for this protein might enable cattlemen to detech pregnancy in cattle soon after conception occurs.




