Kendrick Jt. School District 283 today announced its policy for deter-mining eligibility of children who may receive free and reduced price meals and free milk under the Na-tional School Lunch and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income cri-teria for determining eligibility:

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs higher than 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental and physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

The in-formation provided on the application is confidential and will be used tion is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. 

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Luther Parks, Chairman of the Board, Kendrick, Idaho 83537 (289-3607) for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such chan-ges may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of school nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be re-viewed by any interested party.




