CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Two amendments to the Idaho Constitution will appear on the general election ballot. These have been proposed to the people for ratification following action by the legislature. The amendment proposals, the Legislative Council's statements of meaning and purpose, and the statements for and against are listed as follows:

S.J.R. No. 112

Section 1, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is amended to read as follows:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE POWER — ENACTING CLAUSE

REFERENDUM — INITIATIVE. The legislative power of the state shall be vested in a senate and house of representatives. The enacting clause of every bill shall be as follows: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho."

The people reserve to themselves the power to approve or reject at the polls any act or measure passed by the legislature. This power is known as the referendum, and legal voters may, under such conditions and in such manner as may be provided by acts of the legislature, demand a referendum vote on any act or measure passed by the legislature and cause the same to be submitted to a vote of the people for their approval or rejection.

The people reserve to themselves the power to propose laws, and enact the same at the polls independent of the legislature. This power is known as the initiative, and legal voters may, under such conditions and in such manner as may be provided by acts of the legislature, initiate any desired legislation and cause the same to be submitted to the vote of the people at a general election for their approval or rejection provided that legislation thus submitted shall require the approval of a number of voters equal to a majority of the aggregate vote cast for the office of governor at such general election to be adopted.

The question to be submitted to the electors of the State of Idaho at the next general election shall be as follows:

"Shall Section 1 of Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to strike the requirement that an initiative be approved by a majority equal to a majority of the votes cast for governor and to allow an initiative measure to be placed on the ballot at any general election?"

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

S.J.R. 112

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 1, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to remove reference to the number of votes cast at a gubernatorial election for determination of the majority necessary to pass an initiative measure.

Effect of Adoption
If adopted, this amendment would revise procedures relating to submission

of initiative measures. Because the present language requires that an initiative be adopted by a majority equal to the majority of votes cast for governor, it is uncertain whether initiative measures may be placed on the ballot in non-gubernatorial general election years. With adoption of this amendment, this uncertainty would be removed and initiatives could be submitted in any general election year.

Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. The original language of Section 1, Article III, was adopted when the governor was elected every two years. However, the governor is now elected to a four year term; consequently this amendment is necessary to return to the original intent that initiatives could be submitted in any general election year.

Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:
1. The language which is struck by the proposed amendment deletes the extraordinary majority required for approval of an initiative, but does not state the majority which is to be required. There are two possible consequences of this deletion. First, the majority to be required may be determined by the legislature which might exercise its option to enact an excessive majority thereby impeding the exercise of the initiative power. Alternatively, only a simple majority may be required and the intent of the original authors to require a specified extraordinary majority is lost.

2. Adoption of this amendment could lead to a proliferation of initiatives because issues of the moment would result in ballot submissions, whereas the present waiting period assures that only issues of enduring importance result in initiative action.

H.J.R. 12

Section 5, Article IX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is amended to read as follows:

SECTION 5. SECTARIAN APPROPRIATIONS PROHIBITED.

Neither the legislature nor any county, city, town, township, school district, or other public corporation, shall ever make any appropriation, or pay from any public fund or moneys whatever, anything in aid of any church or sectarian or religious society, or for any sectarian or religious purpose, or to help support or sustain any school, academy, seminary, college, university or other literary or scientific institution, controlled by any church, sectarian or religious denomination whatsoever; nor shall any grant or donation of land, money or other personal property ever be made by the state, or any such public corporation, to any church or for any sectarian or religious purpose; provided, however, that a health facilities authority, as specifically authorized and empowered by law, may finance or refinance any private, not for profit, health facilities owned or operated by any church or sectarian religious

society, through loans, leases, or other transactions.

The question to be submitted to the electors of the State of Idaho at the next general election shall be as follows:

"Shall Section 5, Article IX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to empower a health facilities authority, as specifically authorized by the Legislature, to finance or refinance private nonprofit health facilities owned or operated by a church or religious society?"

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

H.J.R. 12

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 5, Article IX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to allow a health facilities authority, when specifically authorized by law, to finance or refinance health facilities owned or operated by a church or religious society.

Effect of Adoption
If adopted, this amendment would clarify the constitutional and statutory powers of a health facilities authority, by allowing the authority to provide loans for religiously affiliated health facilities, in the same manner as such loans are now available to other private, non-profit institutions.

Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. The United States Constitution contains no similar barrier to this kind of financing proposal as does the Idaho Constitution; adoption of the amendment would make the Idaho Constitution consistent with the United States Constitution on this matter.

2. The state of Idaho makes no tax dollars available to a health facilities authority; all the money available to a health facilities authority comes from private sources. Thus, loans by a health facilities authority to non-profit health facilities do not constitute lending the credit of the state.

3. All non-profit hospitals, whether religiously affiliated or not, have the same basic philosophy of providing quality health care to people in need; this amendment will provide the necessary legal mechanism for an important group of religiously affiliated hospitals to receive financial assistance through loans or leases.

4. The interest costs of capital expenditures for religiously affiliated health facilities could be reduced because of loans made by a health facilities authority; this reduction would help contain the rising cost of health care to patients.

Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:
1. There is no guarantee in this proposed amendment that facilities financed by loans from a health facilities authority would be open to the general public; however, open admissions and requirements of indigent care have historically been mandatory by applicable governmental standards.

Aspiring MD's Begin Medical Education

Moscow—The University of Idaho welcomed 19 first-year medical students this fall as they began their medical school studies through the Washington, Alaska, Montana, Idaho (WAMI) cooperative regional program in medical education.

The students will study this year at UI and move to the University of Washington campus for the second, third and fourth years of study. However, during the last two years of medical studies, WAMI students may spend nearly a year working and studying in several of the 18 WAMI Community Clinical Units situated throughout the four-state area.

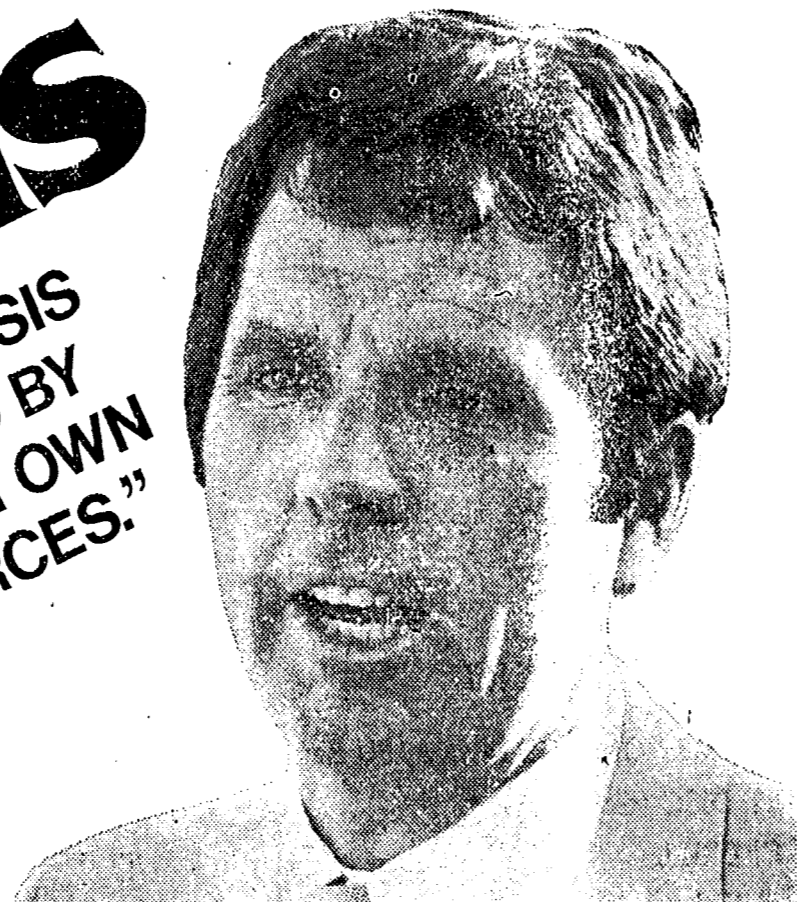

Long-Range Plan Would Double Salmon, Steelhead

Production of Columbia River Basin salmon and steelhead could be restored to early 1950 numbers—about double those of today—if proposed guidelines fall into place during the next 20 years.

Some of the depleted river runs could start an uptick as early as the spring of 1981 with 'modest' alterations at storage and hydroelectric dams to reduce mortalities when the fish migrate downstream.

So states the public review of a "Comprehensive Plan for Production and Management of Columbia River Basin Anadromous Salmon and Steelhead" prepared by the Columbia River Fisheries Council.

A public hearing of the draft plan will be held in the Brammer building, 1225 Idaho Street, Lewiston, October 21, starting at 7 p. m. Copies of the plan are available from the Columbia River Fisheries Council, Lloyd Building, Suite 1240, 700 NE Multnomah, Portland, Oregon 97232. CRFC also invites written comment addressed to its office by October 22.

The draft plan sees its most realistic alternative as one that would increase the current annual level of about 880,000 Columbia River basin salmon to more than 2 million, "even with (estimated) unacceptably high ocean harvest rates."

Implementing necessary reductions in ocean harvest rates would yield more than river fish and this, in turn, would add substantially more salmon to ocean fisheries, according to the plan.

CRFC states that the plan assumes, in part, that ocean fishery managers will make adjustments needed for in-river objectives even though in-river managers have no jurisdiction over ocean fisheries.

Steelhead returning annually to Basin waters would increase from about 350,000 now to more than 800,000 by the year 2000, if the long range plan works out. Steelhead and fall, spring and summer chinook salmon in the Basin include those in Idaho migratory runs.

Production goals in the draft plan are tied to a production potential of:

—The remaining natural habitat.

CLEARWATER FOREST MAP AVAILABLE

—Hatchery programs planned and in use.
 —Compensation due for salmon and steelhead losses at hydroelectric projects.
 —Rehabilitation of once-productive natural habitat.

The plan concedes that salmon and steelhead management is an uncertain business at best, and goals and strategies are apt to change time and again, "in response to the dynamic nature of the resource, experience and the vagaries of the political process."

"Over the long term, the needs of the resource will be best served by an orderly, businesslike accounting of how production potentials will be realized."

National forests must annually review their travel plan which governs vehicle use in the forest. The plan must be updated and new maps prepared at least every two years. The public is involved in decisions regarding the travel plan.

Latah County Comprehensive Plan For '79 Published

After a delay of over one year the Latah Co. Comprehensive Plan of 1979 has been published. This plan was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners in March of last year. Based upon information and comments gathered in a county-wide survey many meetings with county residents and public hearings, the plan was prepared by the County Planning Commission to update the 1971 Comprehensive Plan. Disruption in the Department of General Services resulted in the delay in publication. The published plan includes amendments passed in March of this year.

Growing out of the 1964 referendum establishing a planning commission for the county, the Comprehensive Plan is an official document of the county. Local land use regulations, such as zoning and subdivision ordinances, are based on the goals and policies of the Plan. In addition the Planning and Zoning Commission and the Board use this "flexible constitution" as a guide in making individual decisions affecting the county's future.

The Plan includes a history of Planning in Latah County. Background information, goals and policies are contained in chapters dealing with population and housing, economic development, natural resources, special areas, public services, transportation, recreation, community design and land use. The final chapter points out method of implementing the Plan.

Copies of the Plan are being distributed to all local libraries and city clerks offices within Latah County. Individuals may obtain copies of the 114 page book by contacting the Planning and Building Department in the County Courthouse. There is a three dollar charge to cover printing costs (\$3.50 by mail). The county Future Land Use Map is one dollar extra, but portions of the map are included in the published book.

There is presently one opening on the Latah Planning and Zoning Commission. This volunteer body, appointed by the Board, meets at least once per month. Anyone interested in serving on this Commission and being involved in county planning is encouraged to contact a County Commissioner or the Department of Planning and Building.

Fall Salmon Run Starts On North Fork of Clearwater

The annual fall run of kokanee salmon is in full swing on the North Fork of the Clearwater River.

Thousands of salmon have been observed during the past two weeks by Forest Service biologists along the main river and its tributaries on the Clearwater National Forest's Canyon District. Large numbers of the bright-red-bodied and green-headed fish can easily be seen from the North Fork road at the mouths of Isabella, Beaver, Skull, Quartz and Washington Creeks. Many of the fish can also be seen at submerged gravel bars along the main river.

Kokanee salmon, the freshwater form of the sockeye salmon, were first introduced into Dworshak Reservoir in 1972. A large kokanee population developed rapidly. The kokanee completes its life cycle entirely in fresh water. Spawning occurs in late August, September and early October. Mature adults begin migrating up the reservoir and into the river and its tributaries in early August.

Kokanee build redds (nests) in suitable gravel, and the female lays from 250 to 1800 eggs depending upon the size of the fish. The eggs hatch in three to five months and the fry emerge from the gravel and migrate to the reservoir. They remain there until they mature in about four years. When mature they will migrate during the fall run and spawn in the same streams in which they were hatched. All kokanee die after spawning.

An important sport fishery for kokanee has developed in Dworshak. The fish are tasty and provide good sport and are easy to catch at certain times of the year on bait, flies and artificial lures. They range from nine to 16 inches long.

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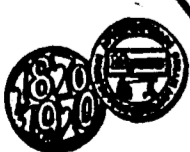
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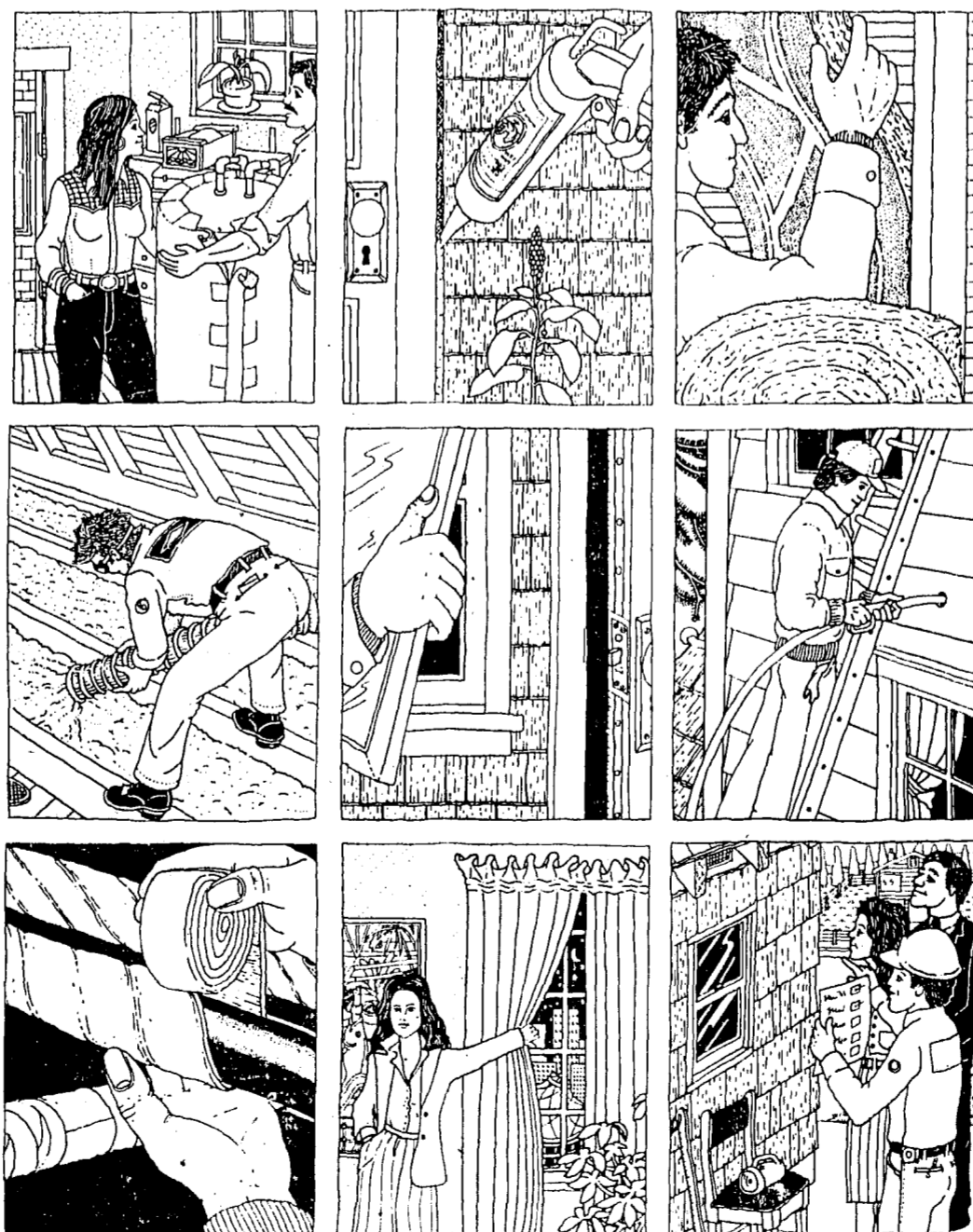

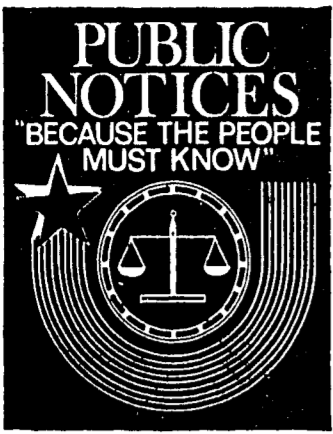
