Tigers Blank Kamiah; Bulldogs Top Loggers In Kibbie Dome

The Kendrick Tigers ended the football season with an impressive 10-0 shutout over the Kamiah Kubs. The game was played in the Kibbie Dome on the University of Idaho campus in Moscow.

Kendrick implemented a swarming defense and a ball-control offense to completely dominate the game. The defense, led by Fritz Fliger and Dale Wolff, held Kamiah's vaunted wishbone attack to a paltry 31 yards. In the second half the Kubs didn't even get a first down as they could pick up only 1 yard of offensive ground.

Meanwhile, the Kendrick offense marched for 290 yards, and ate up big chunks of time off the clock.

Junior running back Terry Hudson and Mitch Cuddy combined for 230 yards. Hudson carried 23 times for 121 yards, and set up Kendrick's only touchdown when he gathered in a pitch off on an option, turned the corner and scooted down the sideline to the 1-foot line. Quarterback Darren Clemenhagen slipped over on a keeper for the touchdown and added the conversion on a 3-yard run.

With his performance, Hudson ended the season with 1520 yards, more than any back in the region. Cuddy slashed for 109 yards on 21 carries. Most of Mitch's yardage came on off-tackle dives as he proved to be the Tiger's "Mr. Inside", while Hudson was "Mr. Outside".

In the 4th quarter Cuddy jumped above 2 Kamiah defenders to make what appeared to be a 20 yard touchdown reception, but the officials ruled he came down out of play.

The Tiger defense pushed Kamiah back into the shadows of their goal-line for much of the game. With 3 minutes remaining in the contest, Fritz Fliger grabbed the quarterback and dumped him in the end zone for a safety, giving Kendrick a 10-0 lead, icing the victory.

The shutout was Kendrick's third of the year and upped their season record to 6-3. This was the final game for ten KHS seniors—Dale Wolff, Darren Clemenhagen, Brian VonBargen, Fritz Fliger, Kevin Fliger, Roger Warner, Carl Ware, James Downs, Tony Mael and Danny Lohman. Keith Ingle earned a letter this year, but he was unable to play because of a hand injury.

The Tigers were coached this year by Daren Munden and Greg DeHart and thanks go to Brent Monroe and Brian Pendleton who helped out during Mr. Munden's illness.

Goetz held a slim 16 vote lead over challenger Dave Wilson, a Kendrick native, in the contest for sheriff.

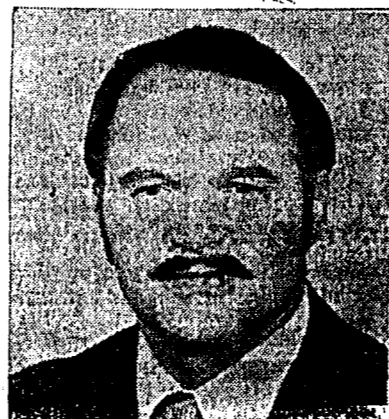

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Survey Shows Readers Like Wildlife Magazine

Readers of "Idaho Wildlife" are being asked to say what they like—and dislike—about the Department of Fish and Game's bimonthly magazine.

And preliminary results from the survey show a great many more likes than dislikes, according to editor Royce Williams.

The partial tabulation of responses also indicates that the readers: —Rate their top three types of articles as ones that describe hunting and fishing, wildlife management

and points of interest in Idaho. —Say fishing is their favorite outdoor activity, followed by hunting and camping. "We were somewhat surprised, though, to find that many persons consider woodcutting as a recreation activity," Williams says.

"Look for some woodcutting stories in future issues," he adds.

In 1979, the Association of Conservation Information rated the magazine as 8th best among such publications in the U. S. and Canada. Idaho Wildlife also received the Conservation Communication of the Year Award from the Idaho Wildlife Federation in 1980.

Skyline Yarding Demonstration Scheduled November 13

Small skyline timber yarding techniques will be demonstrated for interested persons Nov. 13 at North-South Ski area 19 miles northwest of Pocatello on State Highway 6.

The demonstration, which will begin at 12:30 p. m. and last most of the afternoon is being conducted by crews from Forest Engineering, Inc. of Corvallis, Ore. and the Koller Sell-Kranbau Co. of Kufstein, Austria.

Representatives of the Western Equipment Co. of Eugene, Oregon will also be on hand to discuss details about the equipment used.

The machine to be demonstrated is a Koller K-300 trailer-mounted yarder. It is powered by a standard Ford V-6 engine with automatic transmission. The trailer can be towed behind a pickup truck or skidder.

The Palouse demonstration is one of six being conducted in North Idaho and Western Montana to acquaint logging contractors with small skyline techniques and equipment. The demonstration is sponsored by the Forest Service, Region 1 State and Private Forestry Office at Missoula and by the Palouse Ranger District, Clearwater National Forest.

CAMPING LIMIT ON PUBLIC LAND

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
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Commission Oks New Format For Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Game Commission has approved fishing regulations for next year that should make it easier for the angler to make sure about "when, where and how many?"

General fishing in 1981 will open as usual on the Memorial Day weekend—May 23.

Season time frames, bag and possession limits and other rules generally follow the 1980 pattern. But the Commission agreed during its recent meeting in Twin Falls to simplify and streamline the printed folder and install uniform regulatory signs where waters are posted.

The folder will carry information to help with fish identification and explain regulations according to Herb Pollard, state fisheries manager, Department of Fish and Game.

Anglers also should have less trouble with special regulations, Pollard added, if they become acquainted with definitions for catch-and-release, wild trout water and no motors water.

Here are the definitions to look for under "1981 General Fishing Regulations."

Catch-and-release—all trout caught in catch-and-release waters must be released immediately, unharmed, back to the water. Only artificial flies or lures with single barbless hooks may be used when fishing in waters designated catch-and-release. (Example in area 2: "Crooked Fork Creek, from mouth upstream to Brushy Fork, May 23—September 10—Catch-and-Release.")

Wild trout water—only artificial flies or lures with single barbless hooks may be used when fishing waters are designated as wild trout water. Bag limit, 3 trout over 13 inches; all other must immediately be returned to the water unharmed. (Example in Area 4: "Boise River, South Fork, from Arrowrock Reservoir upstream to Anderson Ranch Dam—Wild Trout Water.")

No motors water—It shall be unlawful to fish from a raft or boat with motor attached in any water designated no motors water. (Example in Area 2: "Spring Valley Reservoir, January 1—February 15 and May 3—October 31—No Motors Water.")

"Through this group, we will try to identify the needs of nonverbal persons in the area and raise some questions. We have botten enthusiastic responses about this group from teachers and other professionals in northern Idaho and Eastern Washington who work with verbally impaired persons" she said.

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
