Women's health care needs have been the focus of a great deal of interest by citizens, officials and representatives of Idaho. Actions by our State's government could greatly affect the quality of health care in Latah County.

The Center for Human Resource Development has received a grant to do a Women's Health Needs Assessment. We have undertaken this study because of the belief that women's opinions should be taken into account in the formation of public policies for the planning and development of health care delivery in





For Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Game Commission has approved fishing regulations for next year that should make it easier for the angler to make sure about "when, where and how many?"

General fishing in 1981 will open as usual on the Memorial Day weekend-May 23.

Season time frames, bag and possession limits and other rules generally follow the 1980 pattern. the Commission agreed during its recent meeting in Twin Falls to simplify and streamlne the printed folder

and install uniform regulatory signs where waters are posted.

The folder will carry information to help with fish identification and explain regulations according to Herb Pollard, state fisheries manager, Department of Fish and Game.

Anglers also should have less trouble with special regulations, Pollard if they become acquainted with definitions for catch-and-release, wild trout water and no motors water.

Here are the definitions to look

in catch-and-release waters must be released immediately, unharmed, back to the water. Only artificial flies or lures with single barbless hooks may be used when fishing in waters designated catch-and-release. (Example in area 2: "Crooked Fork Creek, from mouth upstream to Brushy Fork, May 23—Senter".

Catch-and-Release). flies or lures with single barbless ter are designated as wild trout water. Bag limit, 3 trout over 13 inches; all other must immediately be returned to the water unharmed.) paired persons" she said. (Example in Area 4: "Boise River, Dam-Wild Trout Water.")
