ORDINANCE NO. 260

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWO, SECTION TWO, BY ADDING A DEFINITION OF CHILD DAY CARE CENTER, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FOUR, SECTION ONE (B) BY ADDING CHILD DAY CARE CENTER TO THE PERMITTED USES IN COMMERCIAL DISTRICT C1 AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. That Section 10-2-2 of the City Code of Genesee be and the same hereby is, amended by adding thereto immediately following the definition of "Certificate of Occupancy" the following: **DAY CARE CENTER:** A child care service in which children of various age groups, receive care, maintenance and supervision for less than twenty-four (24) hours per day.

SECTION 2. That Section 10-4-1 (B) of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by adding, at the end of the Schedule of District Land Uses for the Commercial District C1, the following: (46) Child Day Care Center.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law of the State of Idaho.

**Historical Society
Receives Two Grants**

The Association for the Humanities in Idaho, the state-based committee of the National Endowment for the Humanities, has announced that the Latah County Historical Society has been awarded two grants

One is a renewal grant that will enable the Society to complete its survey of historical and genealogical records in the county. This project was begun last summer and was expected to be completed in 3 months. Because of the wealth of material uncovered, an extension was needed. The Society has thus far surveyed records at churches, town halls, businesses, clubs, schools and so forth in all Latah County towns except Moscow. In the next 6 months Moscow will be surveyed. When the project is completed, the Society will publish a Guide to Historical & Genealogical Records in Latah County which will assist researchers in finding what types of public records are available in the area, the dates of the records and where the records can be viewed. The Guide is scheduled to be published in the fall of 1981.

The second grant received by the Society is the second phase of a project to produce a readers' theatre presentation based on the Latah Co. Oral History Collection. Rob M-ore, who began the Society's oral history project in 1973 with Sam Schrage, this past summer wrote a script about homesteading in the area, based on the reminiscences of area pioneers. The second phase of this project will allow the hiring of actors to perform the script in 20 locations and to produce a slide-tape show of the play which will be available for circulation through the Society and the Moscow-Latah County Library System. Jointly sponsoring this project with the Society are the Library and Two Magpie Press.

The Society's oral history collection consists of over 600 hours of taped interviews with county residents, making it one of the largest collections in the Northwest. The production of the readers' theatre program will enable the Society to make part of this extensive collec-

**N CENTRAL DISTRICT
HEALTH DEPARTMENT**

The North Central District Health Department is proposing to implement fees for various services in their environmental health program within the Health Department's jurisdiction of Nez Perce, Latah, Lewis, Clearwater and Idaho Counties.

Due to increasing costs and the limiting of property taxes and contracts it is no longer possible for the Department to provide a full range of services to the public without going to fees as a new source of revenue. The Department as well as all of the other six health districts in the State of Idaho are therefore proposing new regulations for the collection of fees for services. The Idaho Legislature last year passed implementing legislation which made it possible for health districts to collect fees for services.

Services for which fees will be required include individual sewage disposal system permits and inspections permits for installers and pumpers of sewage systems, inspections for home loan approvals, subdivision reviews, inspection of food establishments, Grade A milk producers, haulers and processing plants, and permits for certain types of public swimming pools.

A final public hearing will be conducted by the North Central District Health Department on January 7, 1981, in the basement conference room of the Nez Perce County Court house in Lewiston for the purpose of obtaining testimony on the proposed fee regulations.

**GARBANZO BEANS SEEN AS
KEY CROP FOR NORTHWEST**

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor, Moscow, Garbanzo beans—also known as chick peas—may become an important cash crop for farmers of northern Idaho and eastern Washington.

Dick Auld, UI agronomist and plant breeder said the legume crop's adaptability to the Palouse region is

being studied by researchers at the UI and WSU.

Although garbanzo bean production is now centered in California, some varieties appear to grow well in northern regions.

"In Canada, an active program is under way to promote production of garbanzo beans," Auld said.

In northern Idaho and eastern Washington garbanzo beans might fill the place that green peas have occupied in crop rotation.

"To raise garbanzo beans, a farmer uses about the same cultural practices as with peas or lentils. The crop matures in late August or early September. Yields are similar to those of green peas and the market

price has been more favorable," Auld said.

The UI scientist said adaptation trials for garbanzo beans will be conducted in 1981 with the cooperation of northern Idaho farmers. "Select-

ed growers will be asked to plant 5-acre pilot fields, to see if garbanzo beans are adopted to commercial production in our area," Auld said.
