To Stock Rainbows

Starting next April, Idaho Power Co. will stock American Falls Reservoir with about 32,000 rainbow trout a year under terms of an agreement between the utility and the Fish and Game Commission.

The agreement, announced by Idaho Power vice president Logan Lanham and Jerry M. Conley, commission secretary, is to compensate for turbine mortality losses and supplement the sport fishery in the reservoir and in the Snake River below the company's American Falls power plant.

It is subject to approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), the officials said, and is intended to replace a FERC order calling for a 3-day study to determine the mortality rate of fish mov-

ing downstream through the plant's turbines.

Lanham and Conley said the study started by Idaho Power last year proved to be infeasible.

The plant, built in conjunction with reconstruction of American Falls Dam was completed in 1978.

Idaho Power has agreed to stock 8,000 pounds of hatchery-produced rainbow—at a size of four fish per pound—annually for the duration of its FERC license. The agreement also states that the company will finance a 2-year, \$60,000 Department of Fish and Game study to evaluate the effectiveness of the stocking program.

Should the released fish fail to

benefit the fishery as stipulated in the agreement, the commission "will recommend to FERC and the company changes or modifications" (in the release program).

Calf Scours Problem Surveyed in Idaho

Calwell In a statewide animal health survey, UI researchers are trying to take the measure of cryptosporidiosis a disease which appears to be a predisposing cause of total calf scours.

Dis. Bruce C. Anderson, UI veterinary pathologist and Richard F. Hall extension veterinarian said the fact-finding survey is being conducted with the assistance of dairymen in all sections of the state. Help is also being provided by local veterinarians and UI Cooperative Extension Service agents.

From the statewide survey, the researchers expect to find out how prevalent cryptosporidiosis is in Idaho. They hope to learn not only where the disease is occurring but also how it is transmitted and what control measures may check its spread.

"Although only a few cases of cryptosporidium have been reported from the eastern U. S. states, Canada and Europe, it has been discovered in many Idaho calves. It appears to be prevalent in dairy herds of the state and it also occurs in newborn calves and lambs," said Anderson.

The symptoms of cryptosporidiosis are diarrhea, a fever of 103 to 108 degrees and dehydration. Calves become ill at about 6 to 10 days of age and the illness may last several days or continue for a prolonged period. The calves' chances for recovery are

Moscow A total of 33 outstanding UI senior students have been honored by UI Alumni for their

achievements during nearly 4 years of higher education.

The students, nominated by their various academic colleges, were required to have 93 credits or more, with a 3.5 or better grade point average. They represent a wide variety of fields of study.

Final selections were made from the nominations on the basis of academic achievements and level of participation in campus and community affairs.

Each student was asked to present a professor who has been influential in his or her academic career for good unless they have some other disease causing diarrhea at the same time.

Cryptosporidiosis is more than a research curiosity," said Hall. "It causes diarrhea and may weaken an infected calf to such an extent that secondary opportunistic organisms will kill the calf. We have found that some of these drugs can actually kill normal calves and cryptosporidia-infected calves that probably would have recovered if these drugs had not been given."

The statewide animal health survey will include a representative cross-section of Idaho dairy herds. Dairymen cooperating in the study will provide information about herd management practices and will collect fecal samples from newborn calves.
