First you'd hear the siren piercing through the trees. Then Old Number 9 would heave into sight, wallowing down the street and galumphing toward her destination like a dinosaur with flat feet.

She wasn't your sleek, classic beauty, but the Chief and his boys kept her shined up and as spiffy as possible for an aging lady who had put out a lot of fires in her time.

I loved that fire engine. And my grandfather knew it. When he gave me my first Savings Bond, he smiled and said, "Save enough of these, boy, and someday you can buy your own fire engine."

Idaho Women For Agriculture held a luncheon meeting at the home of outgoing President, Mrs. Kent (Mary) Meacham, for installation of officers elected at the annual meeting in November at the University Inn. Procedure for establishing local chapters throughout the state were adopted.

The new officers are: Mrs. Heidi Linehan, Pres.; Mrs. Betty McGreggor, Vice Pres.; Mrs. Ruby Butler was re-elected Recording Secty.; Mrs. Barbara Heimgartner was re-elected Treasurer-Historian; Mrs. Linehan retained her office of Librarian.

The organization forwarded to President-Elect Reagan and Idaho's Representatives and Senators a set of guidelines for selection of personnel in the Department of Agriculture. Selection of a Secretary with experience in production and marketing of agricultural commodities who is not associated with the trade; personnel with producer-oriented attitudes who will work for the development of adequate transportation systems and will evaluate the use of agricultural chemicals on the basis of experience, reason and objectivity; individuals who will understand the importance of purity to the economic well-being of our country.

SPRING STEELHEAD SEASON OPENS JANUARY 17

Spring steelhead fishing in Idaho begins January 17 on most of the main Salmon River and portions of the lower Snake and the Clearwater River systems with a daily bag limit of two, possession limit of two and a season limit of four.

The Fish and Game Commission approved the season during its December meeting in Boise. Fisheries bureau chief Stacy Gebhardt, Department of Fish and Game told commissioners that the projected count at Lower Granite would be enough to allow consumptive fishing.

Further the organization supports inclusion of an escalator clause, adjusted semi-annually, in the 1981 farm bill to insure that loan rates, release level or reserves, call level on reserves, reflects the cost of production and inflation; it strongly advocates the inclusion of farm women in all levels of agricultural products as a foreign policy tool. There are many other areas of concern for the survival of the family farm which will demand attention when the Dept. of Ag. have been selected, further action by the I. W. A. will be taken at that time.

On the main Salmon, the season is from the river's mouth upstream to Mackay Bar bridge. From Mackay Bar bridge upstream to 400 yards below the mouth of the Pahsimeroi River, the season is January 17 through March 29.


Another stretch open to fishing will be from 100 yards above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi to the mouth of the East Fork of the Salmon, from January 17 through April 12. Other seasons are:

Clearwater River: Including the Clearwater River arm of Lower Granite Reservoir upstream to the Clearwater River bridge at Orofino, January 17 through April 12. Fishing from the shoreline around Dworshak National Fish Hatchery is closed for all species.

Clearwater River, North Fork: From Ahsahka highway bridge upstream to 300 feet below Dworshak Dam and the west shoreline between the mouth and Ahsahka bridge, January 17 through April 12. Boat fishing prohibited between the mouth and Ahsahka bridge.

Snake River: From Dug Bar, about 8 miles upstream from the mouth of the Salmon River, to 400 feet below Hills Canyon Dam, January 17 through April 12.

Fall steelhead regulations are in effect through December 31.



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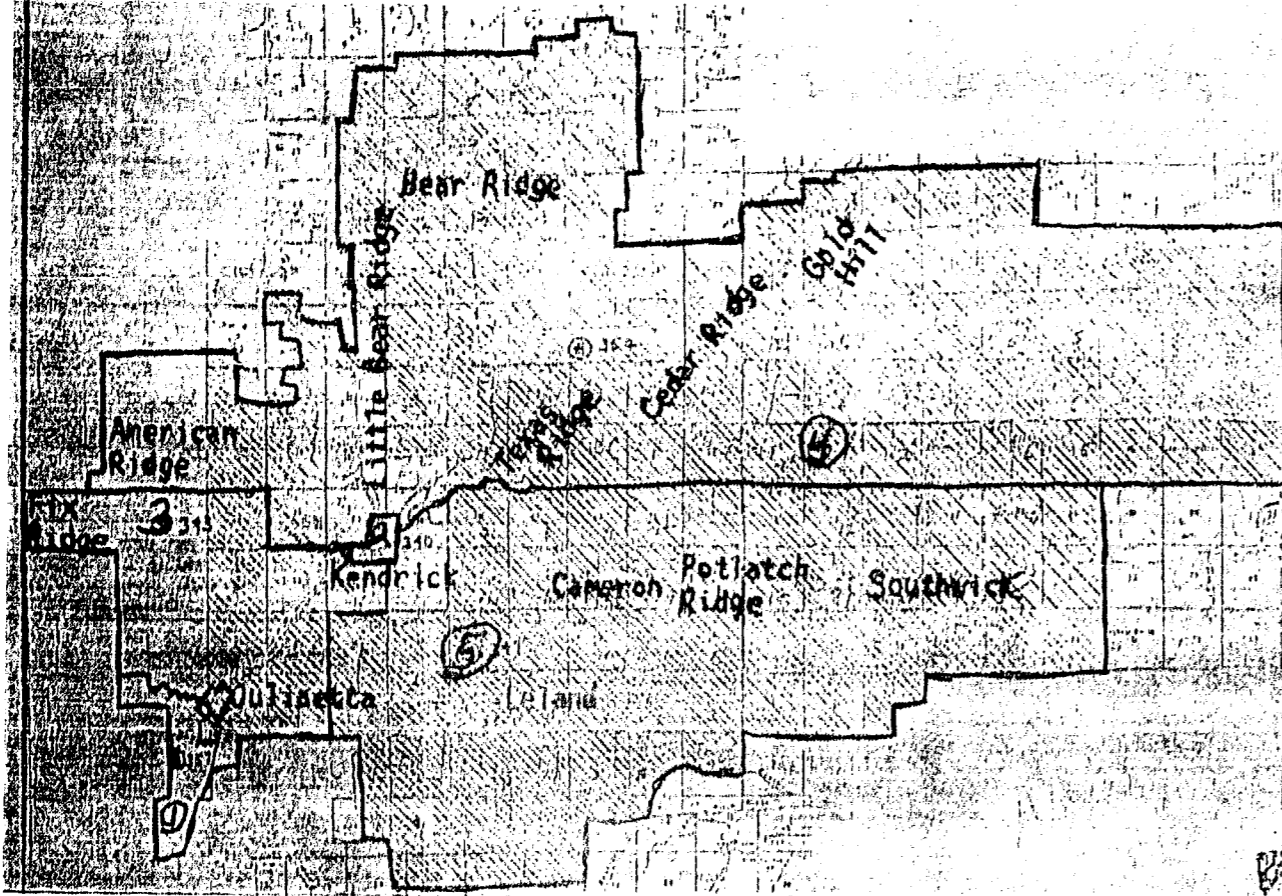

PROPOSITION
Shall the Board of Trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, Latah, Nez Perce and Clearwater Counties, State of Idaho, be authorized to redraw the school zone boundaries to more evenly distribute the population within pursuant to and consistent with Idaho Code 33-313?

Each qualified elector of the district shall vote by secret and separate ballot, which shall contain the words "REZONE YES" and the words "REZONE NO", and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of the question submitted by marking of a cross (X) opposite the group of words on his ballot which expresses his choice.

- All Nez Perce County residents will vote at:
The Cameron Lutheran Church, Cameron, Idaho.

- All Latah County residents in Trustee Zone One (1) will vote at:
The Juliaetta Firehouse, Juliaetta, Idaho.

- All Latah County residents in Trustee Zones Two (2), Three (3), and Four (4) will vote at:
The Kendrick Firehall, Kendrick, Idaho.

The polls for the reception of ballots shall be opened at the hour of 12:00 P. M. (noon) on said day and will remain continuously open until 8:00 o'clock P. M. of said day, when they shall be closed.

No person shall vote at said special election who is not at the time of election:

- A qualified elector of the District, eighteen (18) years of age or older, within the meaning of Article 6, Section 2 of the Idaho Constitution; and
- A bona fide resident of the District.

No person shall vote who shall not first sign an elector's oath attesting to such qualifications.

The Board of Trustees will canvass the returns of said election at a public meeting to be held for that purpose at the regular meeting place of the Board at 8:00 o'clock P. M. on January 20, 1981.

Except as herein otherwise provided, such special election shall be conducted as other school elections.

IDAHO REAPS GOOD HAY HARVEST

Moscow, Idaho Although the hay and forage situation was bleak in much of the nation in 1980, the Pacific Northwest had high-yielding hay crops and good-quality pastures and ranges.

In an agricultural outlook report, faculty members of the UI, WSU, and Oregon State University say Idaho continued to lead the Pacific Northwest in production of hay.

Idaho farmers harvested 4.8 million tons of hay in 1980, for a 16 percent gain over 1979 according to the report.

Oregon's hay production was 7 million, a gain of 13 percent over 1979. Washington's harvest of 2.5 million tons represented a year-to-year gain of only one percent.

"The quality of the 1980 hay crop in Washington was adversely affected by volcanic ash and weather problems," the report said.

"A slightly larger inventory of livestock should contribute to increased feed demand" in 1981 and is likely to provide support for "continued high hay prices," the report said.

Idaho fishing regulations for 1981 will show that fees have increased by two dollars for either a resident combination license or fishing license effective next January 1.

Other resident fishing licenses, including senior combination, junior combination and junior fishing, each go up one dollar.

A nonresident season fishing license will cost \$25.50 instead of \$20.50 and the price of a 7-day nonresident license will be \$10.50, up three dollars. The fee for a 1-day license is a dollar more, to \$1.50 from \$0.50.

Fees for all hunting licenses and tags also are increased. Here are some examples of 1981 changes.

Resident combination license, \$12.50; hunting, \$6.50; fishing, \$8.50. Resident deer tag, \$5.50, and elk, \$10.50. Nonresident hunting, \$60.50; nonresident deer tag, \$45.50, and elk, \$12.50.

Nonresident tag fees for bighorn sheep and mountain goat will each be \$25.50. Resident tags for moose, sheep and goat will be \$50.50 each and an antelope tag is \$15.50.

The schedule approved by the 1980 legislature is expected to bring in approximately \$150,000 in added revenue for the last half of fiscal year 1981 and \$150,000 for a full fiscal year about 40 percent of what the Department of Fish and Game proposed.

Legislators will be asked in 1981 to approve the balance of the 1980 request. Department director Jerry Conley has pointed out that the added funds will only maintain current services.

Another department funding proposal would tie the fees to a national cost-of-living index to provide for moderate adjustments up or down each year according to the economic indicator and set a funding base for needed long-range planning.

Indexing if approved would not become effective until the 1984 license year. Idaho fees in 1981 continue to compare favorably with those in the 11 western states, ranking eighth, for example, in the amount charged for a resident fishing or hunting license.

A nonresident will pay \$186 to hunt elk in 1981, which ranks Idaho fifth from the top among the 11 states.

The new fishing regulations have been distributed to most license vendors and department regional offices.

WASHINGTON WATER POWER COMPANY RATES GOING UP

Washington Water Power Company's Idaho electric rates are going up 3.98 and natural gas rates are going up .3% according to a decision of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. This means an additional \$180,301 in annual revenue from gas customers.

The decision is the result of a rehearing granted to WWP by the IPUC following an August 11 commission order that allowed the company a 17.7% increase in electric rates and a .5% increase in gas rates. Water Power said the August 11 order was unfair and asked the commission to rehear several aspects of the case. The IPUC agreed to hear testimony on only one issue, the cost of capital. After taking testimony at an Oct. 29 hearing, the commission decided that because WWP is paying higher interest rates, the utility is entitled to a greater increase than was granted August 11. By that time, as the IPUC order said, the prime interest rate was at 11%. By late October, it was climbing and by Nov. 21, it was up to 17%.

WWP originally requested a 41% increase in electric rates and a 1.7% increase in natural gas rates. The combination of the August 11 order and today's decision means the company is receiving a total of 21.6% electric increase and a .8% natural gas increase.

The new rates will be effective as soon as WWP files new tariffs that conform to the IPUC order.

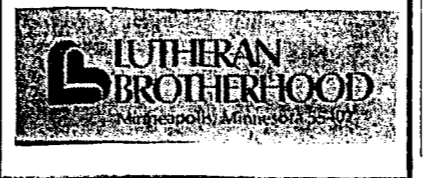

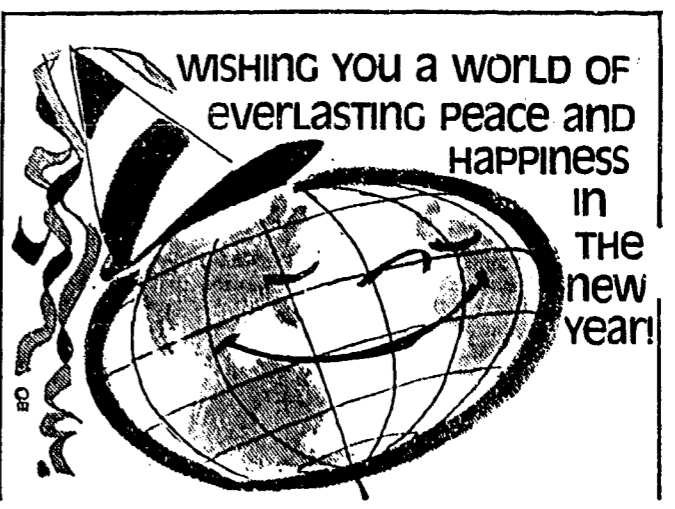

TUBERCULOSIS TODAY
Tuberculosis still exists. In the United States, as well as many other areas of the world, according to the American Lung Association.

Yet, TB is a curable, preventable disease. Particularly in the United States, where knowledge exists to wipe out the ancient White Plague once and for all. But there are intermittent outbreaks of tuberculosis across the country.
Only a few months ago, 100 of the 400 students and faculty members of a high school in the Pittsburgh area were found to be infected with tuberculosis germs. An 11th grade boy was diagnosed as having tuberculosis disease and being a contagious case.
Having tuberculosis germs in the body does not mean having tuberculosis disease, says the American Lung Association. Some 15 million Americans harbor these germs; only 27,669 had tuberculosis disease in 1979. But no one should have it. Drugs cure tuberculosis. Drugs prevent the germs from breaking out into disease.

A patient dedicated to getting well can feel fine in short order. He or she becomes noncontagious shortly after starting medication. Drugs should be taken faithfully for nine months to a year, and the patient can live at home, continue work, go to school, lead a normal life.
Tuberculosis, the disease that still exists, but shouldn't, is just one of the many lung diseases fought by the Idaho Lung Association, the Christmas Seal people. It's a matter of life and breath.

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**COMMISSION SETS
BIG GAME OPENERS**

Tentative opening dates for 1981 big game season will generally follow the pattern of recent years with the first starts—for early archery and trophy species hunts—scheduled for September 5, the Saturday before Labor Day.

General and controlled elk seasons and some deer seasons in north central Idaho open September 30 and general and controlled deer seasons in southern Idaho begin on October 14, the Fish and Game Commission decided during its annual meeting in Boise.

The commission will take final action on the opening dates, season lengths and other regulations for general and controlled hunts when it meets in late April or early May.

Other dates approved by the commission: backcountry deer and elk, September 16; Panhandle elk, September 25; controlled antelope hunts, September 26; and northern Idaho deer, November 4.

The Department of Fish and Game's wildlife bureau had proposed some revisions in the schedule of opening dates. Most would have started 3 days later and they were designed to fit species management plans being prepared for 1981-85, according to bureau chief Roger Williams.

Commissioners agreed however, to withhold action on the new openers pending public hearings on the species management plans next year.

COMMISSION SETS BIG GAME OPENERS

Tentative opening dates for 1981 big game season will generally follow the pattern of recent years with the first starts—for early archery and trophy species hunts—scheduled for September 5, the Saturday before Labor Day.

General and controlled elk seasons and some deer seasons in north central Idaho open September 30 and general and controlled deer seasons in southern Idaho begin on October 14, the Fish and Game Commission decided during its annual meeting in Boise.

The commission will take final action on the opening dates, season lengths and other regulations for general and controlled hunts when it meets in late April or early May.

Other dates approved by the commission: backcountry deer and elk, September 16; Panhandle elk, September 25; controlled antelope hunts, September 26; and northern Idaho deer, November 4.

The Department of Fish and Game wildlife bureau had proposed some revisions in the schedule of opening dates. Most would have started 3 days later and they were designed to fit species management plans being prepared for 1981-85, according to bureau chief Roger Williams.

Commissioners agreed however, to withhold action on the new opening dates pending public hearings on the species management plans next year.
