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### Sugar Beet Harvest Gives Sweet Return

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor, says that the 1980 sugar beet crop for some Pacific Northwest growers in 1980 and sugar prices should remain at a high level in 1981, faculty members of the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University said in their annual agricultural outlook report.

Wilson Gray, UI extension economist, said world sugar stocks have dwindled to 24 million tons, the lowest tonnage since 1975, as a result of below-normal sugar harvests in many areas of the world.

"Given the continued world growth in demand for sugar and the good prices paid to growers, acreage for the 1981-82 crop probably will increase in the Pacific Northwest and in other areas of the United States," Gray said.

"Idaho production was up 108 percent in 1980 while Oregon growers increased beet production seven percent. Grower returns for the 1980-81 crop are expected to be \$42 to \$48 per ton. With continued worldwide demand for sugar, prices for the 1981-82 crop could be at least \$42 to \$50 per ton," the extension economist pointed out.

Looking ahead four to five years, Gray said fodder beets may become an important crop for alcohol production. "Fodder beets may compete for acreage with sugarbeets," he said. "This would enhance the growers' flexibility in selecting crops, especially growers operating within reasonable transportation distance of an alcohol production facility."

### REAP BIG CROP OF BLUEGRASS SEED

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor, says that the 1980-81 Kentucky Bluegrass seed in 1980, "Some downward pressure in prices" was noted by faculty members at the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University, writing in their annual agricultural outlook report.

Seed of fine-leaved fescues commanded high prices in 1980 because "carry-over stocks were down and the Canadian and European fescue crops were reduced," the report said.

"The national economy will continue to have a strong influence on grass seed markets in the months ahead. A further slowdown in housing starts would have a dampening effect on sales of turfgrass seed," the report said.

### BEWARE OF SNOWMAN'S BUTTONS; GINGERBREAD MAN'S EYES

Moscow—Those little silver balls that decorate cookies and cakes aren't meant to be eaten, says a UI Cooperative Extension Service home economist.

Marilyn Swanson, a specialist in foods and nutrition, says they contain sugar, cornstarch, gelatin and silver. While silver has relatively low toxicity, there is a potential problem of silver buildup in humans who consume considerable quantities of it, she said.

"The body has no known mechanism for removing silver so individuals have a problem," she said.

Swanson noted that warning labels on the package say as a decoration, not as a confection. Because of this label the Food and Drug Administration does not consider them a food item.

However, Swanson said they are generally sold right next to edible decorations, and a buyer could easily make a mistake. "Even if the home maker knows, how is a little child to know?" she asked.

The silver balls are frequently found on cookies as snowman's buttons and gingerbread man's eyes and on wedding and anniversary cakes. Swanson recommends that they not be used.

### ONION PRODUCTION DIPS

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor, says that the 1980-81 United States produced eight percent less onions than in 1980. Production rose 4 percent in western Oregon but declined in other Pacific Northwest production areas, according to an agricultural outlook report issued jointly by the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University.

"Washington's onion production was down in both acreage and yield from the 156 million pounds in 1979 to 114 million pounds in 1980—a drop of 27 percent.

"The Idaho and eastern Oregon onion crop was 551 million pounds in 1980, down eight percent from 597 million pounds in 1979," the report said.

"The demand for jumbo onions should remain strong during the 1981 marketing season," the report noted.

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**Season Limit Increased for Spring Steelhead**

The Fish and Game Commission has increased the season limit for spring steelhead to six fish from four based on revised estimates of the upstream run.

Seasons open January 17 on most of the main Salmon River, portions of the Clearwater system and a stretch of the Snake River below Hells Canyon Dam. The daily bag and possession limits remain at two, respectively, as authorized by the commission during its early December meeting in Boise.

Fall steelhead regulations are in effect through December 31.

Commissioners were told December 24 that the total fall-spring count at Lower Granite Dam should be at least 37,000 compared to 26,000 in 1978-79.

Based on the minimum count, the Salmon River run is now estimated at 24,000 steelhead, plus 13,000 in the Clearwater River, according to Dave Ortman, anadromous fishery manager, Department of Fish and Game.

On the main Salmon, the season is January 17 through March 15 from the river's mouth upstream to Mackay Bar bridge. From Mackay Bar bridge upstream to 400 yards below the mouth of the Pahsimeroi River, the season is January 17 through March 29.

Another stretch open to fishing will be from 100 yards above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi to the mouth of the East Fork of the Salmon,

from January 17 through April 12. Other seasons are:

Clearwater River—Including the Clearwater River arm of Lower Granite Reservoir upstream to the Clearwater River bridge at Orofino, January 17 through April 12. Fishing from the shoreline around Dworshak National Fish Hatchery is closed to all species.

Clearwater River, North Fork—From Ahsahka highway bridge upstream to 300 feet below Dworshak Dam and the west shoreline between the mouth and Ahsahka bridge January 17 through April 12. Boat fishing prohibited between the mouth and Ahsahka bridge.

Snake River—From Dug Bar, about

8 miles upstream from the mouth of the Salmon River, to 400 feet below Hells Canyon Dam, January 17 through April 12.



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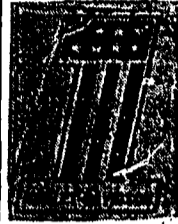
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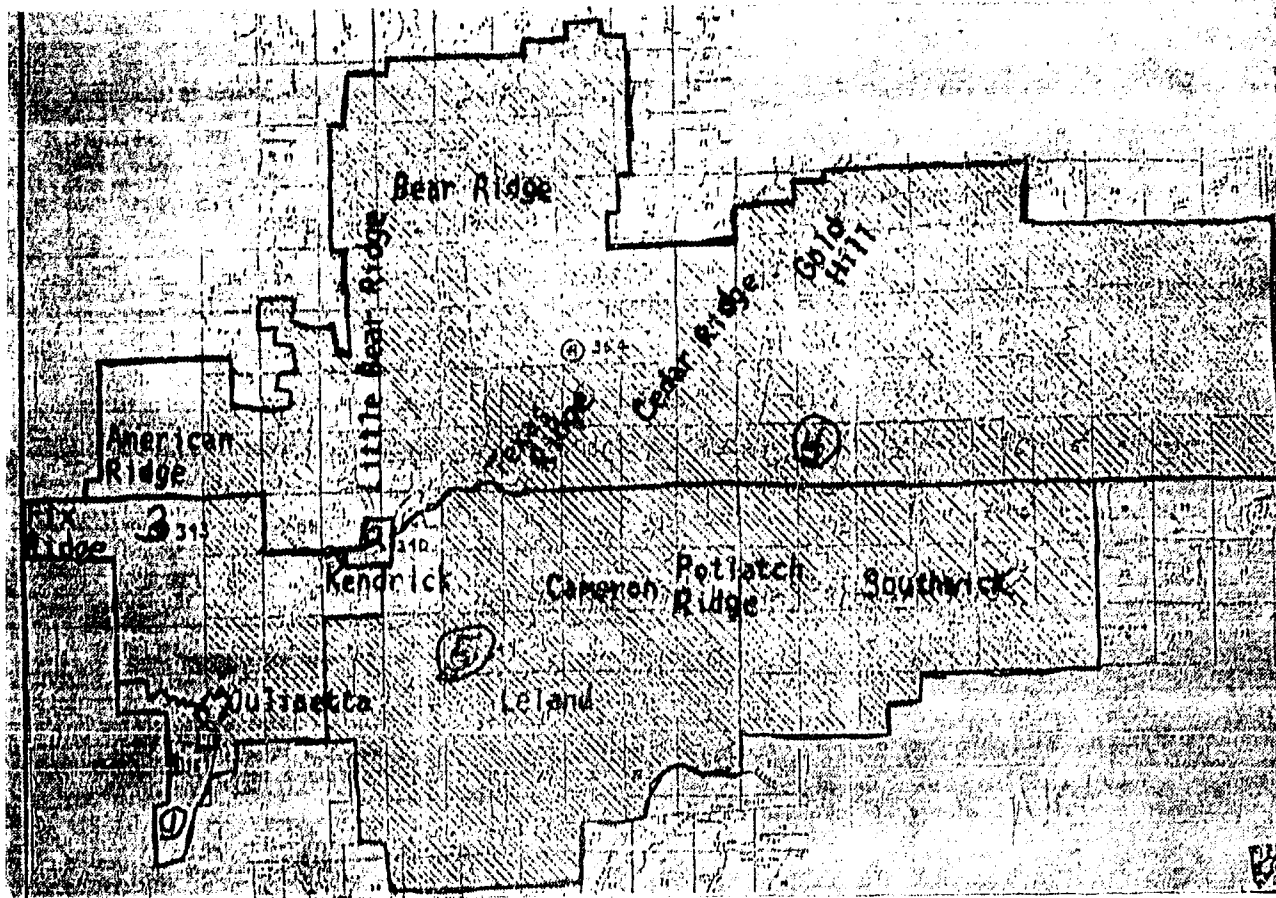

3. All Latah County residents in Trustee Zone One (1) will vote at:  
The Juliaetta Firehouse, Juliaetta, Idaho.

4. All Latah County residents in Trustee Zones Two (2), Three (3), and Four (4) will vote at:  
The Kendrick Firehall, Kendrick, Idaho.

The polls for the reception of ballots shall be opened at the hour of 12:00 P. M. (noon) on said day and will remain continuously open until 8:00 o'clock P. M. of said day, when they shall be closed.

No person shall vote at said special election who is not at the time of election:

1. A qualified elector of the District, eighteen (18) years of age or older, within the meaning of Article 6, Section 2 of the Idaho Constitution; and
2. A bona fide resident of the District.

No person shall vote who shall not first sign an elector's oath attesting to such qualifications.

The Board of trustees will canvass the returns of said election at a public meeting to be held for that purpose at the regular meeting place of the Board at 8:00 o'clock P. M. on January 20, 1981.

Except as herein otherwise provided, such special election shall be conducted as other school elections.

Penalties. Any person who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or who, having obtained a permit here- under, shall willfully fail to continue to comply with the conditions as herein set forth, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punish- able by a fine not to exceed \$300.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90 days), or both such fine and im- prisonment.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE TWO, CHAPTER THREE OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESEE, IDAHO, SECTION FOUR, BY ESTABLISHING THAT THE PROP- erty OWNER SHALL PAY THE COST OF A WATER METER AND THE COST OF INSTALLING A WATER METER BEFORE THE WATER METER IS INSTALLED; BY PROVIDING A "TAPPING FEE" IN THE AMOUNT OF \$500.00; BY ESTABLISHING TYPES OF WATER USER FEES; BY ESTABLISHING WATER RATES AND BY PROVIDING FOR SUBSEQUENT CHANGES IN WATER CHARGES BY RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL; REPEALING SECTION FIVE REGARDING DEPOSITS FOR WATER SERVICE BY TENANTS; AMENDING SECTION EIGHT BY PROVIDING THAT A RESTRICT- OR BE PLACED IN THE WATER SERVICE LINE OF DELINQUENT WATER USERS; AMENDING SEC- TION ELEVEN BY PROVIDING FOR ONLY ONE WATER CHARGE FOR TWO OR MORE TENANTS OF ONE DWELLING UNIT BY PROV- IDING THAT WASTING WATER SHALL BE UNLAWFUL; BY PROV- IDING A CHARGE OF THE RE- MOVAL OF A WATER RESTRICT- OR; AND BY PROVIDING A CH- ARGE TO TURN ON WATER AFTER THE WATER HAS BEEN TURNED OFF AT THE USER'S REQUEST; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINAN- CES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN E- FECTIVE DATE.  
The specific provision establishing a water user fee and water rates provides as follows:  
2. Rates inside and outside the City:  
User Fee: A user fee in the amount of nine dollars (\$9.00) per month is hereby fixed for each and every use as listed herein.  
Minimum Rate: The minimum rate for water supplied by the city is hereby established and fixed at the sum of five dollars (\$5.00) per month for the first one thousand (1000) gallons or less.  
The next four thousand gallons (1001-5000) of water twenty cents (\$.20) per thousand gallons.  
From five thousand one gallons to and including ten thousand gal- lons (5001-10,000) of water per month, twenty-five cents (\$.25) per thousand gallons.  
From ten thousand one gallons to and including thirty thousand gal- lons (10,001-30,000) of water per month, thirty cents (\$.30) per thousand gallons.  
In excess of thirty thousand gallons (30,000) of water per month, forty cents (\$.40) per thousand gallons.

Multiple Residence-per unit \$4.00 per month  
Dwelling Unit located in Single

Residence or in Commercial Business Establishments-per unit \$4.00 per month  
Commercial Business Establish- ments - per unit \$4.00 per month  
Public and Private Schools per 100 pupils \$8.00 per month  
The minimum monthly rate for sewer service outside of the City of Gene- see shall be fixed at double the City rate. Extension of service outside the City Limits shall be at the Council's dis- cretion, and the fixing of rates for service outside the City of Gene- see is not to be construed as imposing a duty upon the City of Gene- see to extend such sewer service.  
No sewer fee shall be charged for any period of time during which a rental dwelling unit, space, or busi- ness property is vacant, provided no- tice of such vacancy is given in ac- cordance with Section 4 (e) of Chap- ter 3 of Title 2 (designated 2-3-1 (5) of the City Code of Gene-see.  
The amount of the sewer connection fee is changed from \$175.00 to \$200.00.

**Stony Point Friendship Club—** Weather permitting, club will be held on Jan. 15, at the home of Delores Heimgartner. A busy day of quilting is planned.

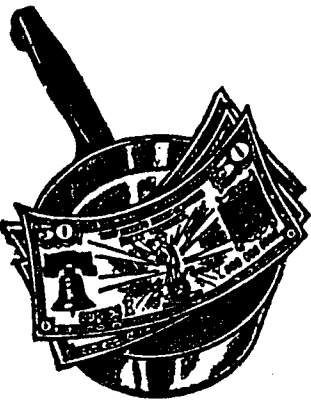

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**Farm Exports Again Heading for Record**

 Moscow — American agricultural exports are expected to reach a record-high total of \$18.5 billion in fiscal year 1981, faculty members of the University of Idaho, Oregon State University and Washington State University said in an agricultural outlook report.  
 "Early indications suggest that 1981 will be the 12th consecutive year of record agricultural exports," the report said.  
 Surveying the 1981 export outlook for farm products, the authors of the reports made these forecasts:  
 —U. S. wheat exports should reach 37 million metric tons, up four percent from 1980.  
 —Export volume of U. S. feed grain is likely to show continued growth.  
 —Sales abroad of U. S. fruits, nuts and vegetables should total \$3 billion surpassing the 1980 total of \$2.5 billion. A high volume of sales is expected for apples, cherries and other Pacific Northwest fruits.  
 —Exports of beef will increase 10 to 15 percent.  
 —Foreign market will show a strong demand for U. S. eggs and poultry products.  
 During 1980, U. S. exports of white wheat totaled 225 million bushels—an increase of 26 percent over 1979 exports.  
 The tri-state economic report said white wheat exports to Indonesia and Japan increased in 1980, offsetting reductions in sales to South Korea

**PRICES OF FEED GRAINS WILL CONTINUE STRONG**

 Moscow — Feed grains will continue to command high prices in 1981 and possibly in 1982 also, faculty members of the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University predicted in their annual agricultural outlook report.  
 "Feed grain prices are likely to remain strong, at least until good estimates are available on the size of the 1981 crop. As present, it appears corn plantings may be down as a result of Midwestern farmers opting to double-crop winter wheat and soybeans," the report said.  
 Exports of feed grains reached record levels in 1980, boosting prices of corn and other feed grains, authors of the report said. U. S. production of feed grains declined 18 percent in 1980.  
 "Worldwide feed grain production is expected to be down for the third year in a row. Utilization, however, continues to rise. As a consequence, carry-over stocks at the end of the current marketing year are projected to be the lowest in 20 years," the report said.  
 Year-end stocks of feed grains will represent only an eight-week supply, the report emphasized.


