

Voters Narrowly Approve School District Rezoning

With a surprisingly large turn-out by patrons of Joint School District No. 283, a proposed rezoning issue was narrowly approved Tuesday. The rezoning issue was brought before school district voters after a petition was presented to the present school board by over 100 persons. The final count of votes indicated that 224 voters approved the rezoning change while 202 ballots were cast against the change. A simple majority vote was all that was needed to carry the issue.

She was a member of the Genesee Community Church and loved to work with young people. She was a member of the Genesee Rim Riders Club. Nelle will be greatly missed, not only in the family circle, but by the host of friends and neighbors who deeply mourn her passing.

Howard Broemeling, Genesee Farmer, Passes January 17

Howard J. (Howdie) Broemeling, 58, a farmer and Genesee native died Saturday, January 17 of a pulmonary embolism while he was on vacation in Reno, Nevada.

Broemeling worked as a mechanic at Genesee Motors for 15 years, and then ran his own service station in Genesee from 1959 to 1965. He had farmed at Genesee since then.



Broemeling was a member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge and the Genesee American Legion and was an honorary Genesee fireman. He also was an avid fisherman and hunter.

He was born April 30, 1922, at Genesee, to Joseph and Amanda Broemeling. He grew up in Genesee and then worked for Consolidated Air Craft at San Diego, Calif. for a year before joining the Navy in 1942. He served on the U. S. S. New Orleans in the Pacific during World War II.

Broemeling married Betty Olson Vestal on January 9, 1958 at Coeur d'Alene. She survives at the family home.

Other survivors include a son, Howard E. Bates of Denver, Colorado; a daughter, Lucinda Jo Thaler of Boise; a stepson, Larry Vestal of Genesee; a brother, Richard Broemeling of Victoria, B. C.; three sisters, Evelyn Holliday of Post Falls, Betty Howell of Veradale, Wa., and Marjorie Tyler of Genesee, and four grandchildren. He was preceded in death by an infant son.

The funeral was held Wednesday at 11:00 a. m. at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Edward J. Cope officiating. Graveside services will be conducted by Bielenberg-Schuler American Legion Post of Genesee at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

Request for Rezoning On American Ridge Grade For Mobile Home Park

Lloyd Farrington, Kendrick, has made a request for a zoning change and also an application for a conditional use permit to the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission, which if approved, would permit him to begin work to construct a mobile home park just below his home on the American Ridge grade (State Highway 99). A public hearing on the request and application will be considered at the regular meeting of the Planning and Zoning commission Monday evening, Jan. 26, at 8:00 p. m. in Room 2-B of the Latah County Courthouse.

The request for rezoning would change the site from its present agriculture-forestry (A-F) status to multifamily residential (RM). Farrington's proposed park would contain five spaces and be located 3/4 miles from Kendrick east of and adjacent to State Highway 99. Approximately three acres are involved.

Farrington said Monday night that he was not too optimistic about his requests being approved because construction of the park would involve putting drain fields in to service the mobile homes spaces and it is understood that authorities were concerned that adding these drain fields and putting them into use could conceivably cause a potential slide problem. "But I'm going to go ahead and give it a try anyway," Farrington said, referring to the requests.

Complaints Registered Over Genesee Postal Changes

A decision by the Spokane Office of the Postal Service to eliminate the clerk hours at the Genesee Post Office has led to a number of complaints by Genesee postal patrons over mail service in that town, both in the city and rural services. By taking the three hours per day clerk help from Genesee, Postmaster Leslie Wilson must now perform all the duties without assistance, except during emergencies or periods of especially heavy mail volume.

Mrs. Bernice Wagar will remain with the Genesee Post Office staff as a postmaster replacement, meaning she will work on Saturdays, or when Mrs. Wilson is unable to be present.

As a result of this loss of help, Postmaster Wilson was forced to delay the opening of Post Office window service and sorting of lockbox mail from the previous 9:00 a. m. time to approximately 10:30 a. m. The lack of help also will delay the

working of rural mail forcing an hour to 2 hours delay average for rural patrons.

Mrs. Wilson told the Gazette Monday that since Jan. 10 when the change occurred, there have been over 20 customer complaints filed through her office. A majority of these, Mrs. Wilson said, were from rural patrons dissatisfied because they were getting their mail, especially the daily newspapers at a later time.

Since the decision to make these changes came from Spokane, the Gazette-News contacted the Post Office's Management Section Center (MSC) in that city to find the reason for the elimination of clerk hours at Genesee. A. C. Shimizu, a supervisor at Spokane said the change was made strictly as an economy move and was not to the detriment of the people." He told the Gazette that a recent inspection at Genesee found the Genesee rural carriers coming in each morning prior to the receipt of the daily mail truck. Once the mail comes in it must then be unsorted and worked by the clerk and postmaster before the rural carriers receive what is addressed for their routes. It was this idle period of the carriers that resulted in an inspector's recommendation that the rural carriers come in at a later time.

Mr. Shimizu also stated that it was further determined by the inspectors that the volume of mail coming into the Genesee Post Office did not appear to warrant the three hours of clerk time allowed for that town.

In response to the question whether other small town Post Offices such as Troy, Kendrick and Juliaetta might also be facing this same treatment Mr. Shimizu said while there are no immediate plans to eliminate clerk hours elsewhere, all post offices are under continuing inspection and appraisals to make certain they are operating in the most efficient manner.

Both Post Master Wilson in Genesee and Mr. Shimizu in Spokane indicated that this change is on an experimental basis. "And, so far it looks good," the Spokane supervisor said. Post Master Wilson declined comment or opinion at the present time, saying she has been asked to write her comments and recommendations for the Spokane office after a two-week period. Mrs. Wilson did indicate that she would probably request that at least a portion of her clerk hours be returned.

Any Genesee postal patrons, either city or rural who are dissatisfied with the present arrangement may file a complaint by contacting the Post Office in Genesee.

Genesee Woman Hospitalized After Accident on Valley Road

A Genesee woman is reported to be in satisfactory condition at a Spokane Hospital this week following an auto accident on the Genesee Valley road last Thursday evening.

Mrs. Arnie (Jeannie) Broberg was driving a van-type vehicle in heavy fog conditions when she collided with a pickup truck parked on the roadway between the Jerry Johnson and Murray Myers farm homes in Genesee Valley just outside Genesee. Because of fog, Mrs. Broberg could not see the other vehicle in time to avoid it, sliding into it head-on. She received a deep laceration in front of her left ear and a deep cut in the calf of her leg, which occurred when the van's seat came forward and the bar across the seat jabbed into her leg, tearing nerves and blood vessels. She was taken by Moscow Fire Department ambulance to Gritman Hospital and then was transferred to Deaconess Hospital for observation which indicated that micro-surgery was necessary to repair some of the injuries. Her husband reported Monday evening that she was really "banged up," but seemingly in good spirits, he added that her leg was to be placed in a cast Tuesday.

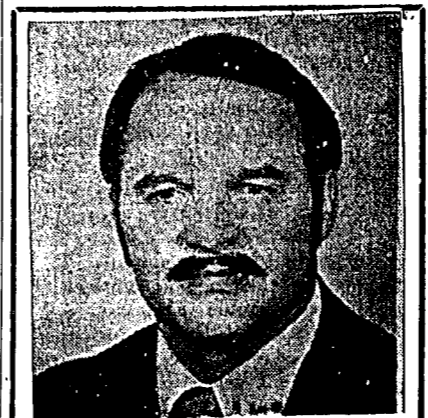

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MEMORIAL SERVICES CONDUCTED FOR OFFICERS POGUE AND ELMS

Friends and comrades gathered in Boise's Municipal Park Saturday, (January 17) for their tribute to Bill Pogue and Conley Elms, senior conservation officers who were victims of a fatal shooting in the performance of their duties or the Department of Fish and Game.

Their supervisor, regional conservation officer, Ray Lyon, conducted the memorial services. Standing near the bereaved families were their fellow officers, wearing the green and gray field uniforms.

Other uniformed officers came from fish and game departments in neighboring states, along with representatives of state, county and city law enforcement agencies in Idaho.

Pogue 50, and Elms, 34, went to the remote southwestern corner of Owyhee County January 5 to investigate reported illegal trapping activity and an eyewitness reported that they were shot while they were investigating the suspect and his camp.

The younger officer's body was recovered January 7, but the first week of an intensive search had failed to locate Pogue.

"Bill and Conley have made the ultimate sacrifice for the cause to which they dedicating their working careers," department director Jerry M. Conley commented. "These men were truly among the finest of the 'thin gray line' of officers who work so hard to ensure wildlife survival in Idaho."

Conley and assistant director Robert L. Salter participated in the memorial services. Jerry Theissen, state big game manager, and Jeff Lundy Caldwell, eulogized their close friends.

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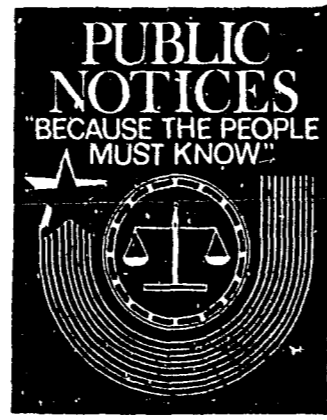
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ORDINANCE 264

AN ORDINANCE granting to THE WASHINGTON WATER POWER COMPANY, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Washington, and its successors and assigns, a franchise to construct, erect, maintain, operate, remove and use wires, poles and facilities for transmitting and distributing electricity for heat, light and power to the City of Genesee and its inhabitants, and to erect, construct, maintain, operate, remove and use wires and facilities for telephone purposes in its private business, and to construct, install, maintain and remove conduits on, over, along, under and across the streets, alleys, and ways within the corporate limits of the City of Genesee as they now exist or as they may hereafter be changed, and granting the use of the streets, alleys and ways therefore within the corporate limits of the City of Genesee.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Genesee:

1. That the WASHINGTON WATER POWER COMPANY, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Washington, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee", be and it is hereby granted, for the term of twenty-five (25) years from and after passage of this Ordinance, the right, privilege and franchise to construct, erect, maintain, operate, remove and use wires, poles, plant and all necessary or desirable appurtenances thereto for transmitting and distributing electricity for electric light, heat, and power, and also to use its wires, poles, and properties for telephone purposes in its private business; and to install, construct, maintain, and remove conduits on, over, along, under and across the streets, alleys, and ways within the incorporated limits as they now exist, or as they may hereafter be changed, of the City of Genesee.

2. There is further given in connection herewith, unto the Grantee, its successors and assigns, the right during the life of this franchise, to cut and trim any and all trees growing in, on or over the streets or alleys of the City of Genesee that might or may interfere with any wires, poles, conduits or their apparatus of the Grantee, its successors and assigns.

3. The poles, wires, and other apparatus mentioned herein shall be constructed, erected and maintained in accordance with the laws of the City of Genesee and the State of Idaho relating to electrical construction, and any rules or regulations adopted by any agency of the State of Idaho having jurisdiction over electrical construction in the City of Genesee and also said construction shall be in such manner as to prevent and guard against accidents or damages as nearly as possible to any persons who may be properly using said streets and alleys.

4. The said Grantee herein shall have and is hereby given the right and privilege to make any and all necessary or proper excavations and obstructions in any of the streets, alleys, and properties of the City of Genesee for the purpose of building, erecting, repairing, removing, maintaining or changing any of the poles, wires, conduits, crossarms, or other appliances or apparatus used or to be used in connection with the above purposes. Whenever the Grantee, its successors or assigns, shall excavate in or obstruct any of the streets, alleys or ways of the City of Genesee for the purposes aforesaid, it shall return the same to the order and condition that they were in before they were excavated or obstructed, as soon as practical and within a reasonable time after such excavation or obstruction, and that the Grantee herein, its successors and assigns, shall at all times hold the City free from any and all damages that may result to any person, persons, firm or firms, corporation or corporations, or to any property of the same, by reason of any excavation, construction, maintenance or operation of any of the things herein authorized to be constructed and maintained by it.

5. The City reserves the right to remove any such wires, poles, or apparatus herein provided for in case of general conflagration and necessity therefor, or in other cases of emergency. The City in such cases shall not be held liable for any damages to the Grantee, its successors and assigns, on account of any cutting away or removal of any poles, wires, or other appliances under the last-named circumstances; provided however, that the City shall indemnify and hold harmless the Grantee, its successors and assigns, against any and all property damage, personal injury, death, or other liability to third parties sustained as a result of the negligent exercise of such reserved emergency powers.

6. The Grantee, on request of the Council of the City shall remove or raise its wires so as to permit the removal of any house or building when the same may be necessary to permit the removal of said building on, over, and along the streets, alleys or public highways of the said City to the point of destination; provided, that the party to whom a permit has been granted to remove any such building on, over, and along any of the streets or alleys of the City shall pay to the Grantee hereunder the cost incurred in removing or changing its wires and facilities so as to permit the removal of said building as aforesaid.

7. That in consideration of the rights, privileges and power herein granted to the Grantee herein, its successors and assigns, it, the said Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall at all times keep and maintain a plant of sufficient size and capacity to supply the City and the inhabitants thereof with such an amount of electricity as they may reasonably require, and shall, in the absence of accident or misfortune from some cause beyond its control, furnish a continuous twenty-four (24) hour service, and should the said plant, or any part thereof, become broken, injured or destroyed, the same shall be replaced as soon as it is reasonably practical. The Grantee shall also furnish to the City under applicable rate schedules to be used within the incorporated limits of the City as many street lights and of such candle power as may be designated by the authorities of the City.

8. The Grantee shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations pertaining to the conduct of the Grantee's business and to prescribe the forms for application for service and contracts to be executed by applicants. Service shall be supplied to the City and its inhabitants in accordance with the Grantee's rules and regulations filed or hereafter filed with the regulatory body of the State of Idaho having jurisdiction over the Grantee.

9. The Grantee may be directed to install its wires underground upon request of the City and those property owners to be specially benefited thereby after a public hearing and finding by the City Council that the area wherein underground facilities are requested is a feasible and practical area for underground installation and the installation is required in the public safety, interest or convenience. In the event underground electric facilities are to be installed, the difference between the cost of constructing and installing the wires and related facilities above ground, and the cost of constructing and installing the wires and related facilities underground, shall be borne proportionately by each property owner in the area, public or private, specially benefited thereby. Whenever the Grantee determines to place its wires underground in any portion of the City, permission to do so is hereby granted. The Grantee, its successors or assigns shall file with the City Engineer a complete set of plans and specifications for such work and shall lay the necessary pipes or conduits for the same in such manner as not to interfere with any existing pipes in such streets. Such work shall be done subject to the supervision of the proper authorities of said City.

10. The rates and charges applicable for electric service furnished by the Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall be as filed with the regulatory body of the State of Idaho having jurisdiction and in effect during the term of this franchise.

11. The Grantee, its agents and employees, shall have the right and power to ingress and egress upon its customers' properties for the purpose of installing, servicing, and maintaining its facilities, and for the purpose of maintaining, testing, and reading its meters.

12. It is understood that this franchise is not an exclusive franchise, and the said City of Genesee reserves unto itself the right to grant other franchises for the purpose for which this one was granted.

13. This franchise and all of its provisions shall be void, inoperative, and of no force or effect whatsoever, unless the said Grantee named herein shall, within thirty (30) days after the passage and publication thereof, file with the Clerk of the City of Genesee its acceptance thereof in writing.

14. The franchise hereby granted may be revoked by the City by a duly enacted Ordinance in the event the Grantee shall fail after thirty (30) days' written notice to comply with any of the terms, conditions or obligations imposed upon the Grantee hereunder.

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POLITICS MAY BE FARMERS' MAJOR CHALLENGE IN 1981
Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor, Moscow—An Oregon State University economist believes the political know-how of American farmers will be put to a severe test when Congress rewrites U. S. farm legislation in 1981.

J. B. Wyckoff, OUS extension economist, said farmers will be dealing with senators and representatives whose political strength is drawn chiefly from urban constituencies.

"Only 100 of the 435 members of the House of Representatives have farm voters in their districts while each has consumers. This necessitates mixing consumers' and farmers' interests for successful legislation," he said.

Wyckoff was the author of one section of the 1981 Pacific Northwest

Agricultural Outlook report, prepared jointly by staff members of the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University. Copies of the report will be available in mid-January at Cooperative Extension offices in the three states.

Food and agricultural policy will spark lively debate in 1981 as Congress prepares new legislation to replace the soon-to-expire Food and Agricultural Act of 1977, the OSU economist predicted. He noted these controversial questions:

—Should farmland set-aside programs be revised? Is it moral to limit U. S. agricultural production when one of every eight persons in the world is hungry?

—Is it possible to protect the "family farmer" from competition by large, highly efficient agricultural operations?

—In government agricultural programs, how are target prices to be set? Would it be good policy to regional target prices and thus reflect regional production costs?

—Will food reserves in the commodity loan program continue to be farmer-owned? Should the reserves be government-owned or internationally coordinated?

—Why should the food stamp program be continued? Might it be replaced by a cash aid program?


—What is the best way to encourage farmers to conserve soil and water? In its conservation programs, should the government emphasize tax incentives, cost-sharing help or punitive action?

—How can the loss of agricultural land to urban development and other non-farming uses be checked?

—During an energy crisis, will farmers be given high priority in fuel allocations?

—How may U. S. agriculture gain improved access to foreign markets? Farmers and farm groups need to develop good relations in Washington, D. C. so they will be able to influence congressional action on agricultural issues, Wyckoff emphasized.

"The legislative environment is the key. With less than four percent of the population now involved in farming, the political power base of U. S. farmers is not overwhelming," he said.

Dear Editor: Jan. 14, 1981

I am writing this letter before the election and after reading Werner Brammer's letter to the Editor in the Jan. 14 Gazette. I have spent more than one Wednesday before an election just like I am spending this one, mad at Mr. Brammer and his political technique. Always before, as is true tonight, there is not time to refute his obvious misquoted facts and figures. This letter is as much to make people more aware of the technique, so they can watch for it next time, as it is to rebut his statements about the school board election. But, something must be said about equal representation: my version and Mr. Brammer's version.

Mr. Brammer says he favors a plan that has "equal representation without giving Kendrick or Juliaetta more than one board member." My addition does not work out that way. Using the school board population figures, they have proposed Zone 1 with 357, Zone 2 with 340, Zone 3 with 343, Zone 4 with 352, and Zone 5 with 344, for a total of 1736. According to census figures, published in the Lewiston Morning Tribune, Juliaetta has 510 and Kendrick 401, for a total of 911. I presume Mr. Brammer would like to have 2 board members represent these 911 people. That would be 455.5 persons per board member. That would leave 3 board members to represent 825 persons. That's 275 persons per board member

is that what Mr. Brammer calls "equal representation?" Perhaps, Mr. Brammer is not talking about city limit inclusive districts, perhaps he is talking of dividing up the towns so that the rural vote can always out-vote the city vote. That practice is also known as Gerrymandering.

I think maybe Mr. Brammer's real purpose is to split the town vote. By town vote I don't mean Juliaetta or Kendrick, I mean Juliaetta and Kendrick. If Mr. Brammer would stop trying to cause trouble and keep the different factions apart in this area and look out his front window, he would see (from his viewpoint along the highway between the two towns) that the cooperation and friendliness overflow, apparently right past him. Count to yourself the number of organizations that serve both towns and their surrounding areas. (Ambulance and EMT's, Lions Club, J-C's, Masons, VFW, Boy Scouting, Cub Scouts, several churches, the school itself may even be counted. Also, while maybe not as visible, there is cooperation between the city governments.) Before anyone labels me "Pro-town" and "Anti-Farm", I must also point out that the rural population also belong to and support the same organizations. There is also cooperation between the cities and the rural representatives, the county commissioners.

Mr. Brammer will have us believe that there is more to fear when the town vote controls 3 board members, the majority, than when the rural vote has control of 3 board members. Mr. Brammer would have us believe that the town vote having 3 board members that the issues and ideas would no longer be heard or dealt

with fairly. With the new zoning somehow all issues would be dealt with on a regional basis. Come on, Mr. Brammer, it is only 3 miles from Kendrick to Juliaetta. It is only 20 to 30 miles from one end of this district to the other. Just how geographically different can we all be? Individual differences and opinions do not follow along artificially set geographical lines. These differences and opinions will be found within all districts and form the basis for future races for school board seats. Mr. Brammer, you forgot, or just plain omitted, that in the past, Mr. Charles Taylor, a rural resident, represented our town district. I think he did a good job, he was re-elected.

I have not attended a lot of school board meetings, so I cannot comment on the stability or the board that Mr. Brammer wants to keep, but a comment on human nature might be in order. Taxation without representation caused the Boston Tea Party. Perhaps unfair (unequal) representation on one of the largest taxing entities in our area caused some of the ill feelings Mr. Brammer alluded to. No matter how you jockey the zones, the fact remains that the city residents are in the majority, maybe it is about time they got equal representation on the school board. It might surprise you, Mr. Brammer, but all of the city residents are not "tax-you-to-death" liberals. They, we, all live in the same economic situation. A tax levy hits everyone the same.

A statement was made in a letter to the editor several months ago. It was that a farmer with a \$50,000 farm paid much more in taxes than a home owner, in town, with a \$50,000 home. This is just not true. I will admit that most farmers pay more taxes, however, their farms are worth a lot more than my house. The assessments on their farms continues to rise along with all their other expenses. The farmer cannot be blamed for not wanting unnecessary expenses. The other side of the situation is that my home and the taxes on that home are a significant drain on my salary. I am not going to support any irresponsible additions to that drain.

The answer to the tax problem is different than the zoning problem. The zone problem, as I have stated, is a matter of rezoning as required by Idaho state law. The tax problem is different. Each bond issue is voted on by the population, one vote per person. Everyone the same. Each issue should be viewed and reviewed on the merits of the particular issue, not whether it helps or hurts any particular part of our district. The sacred trust, to do right by our schools, placed on the adult voters by the children of this district, is too special to be broken by continued rivalry and jealousy which is kept alive by such acts as this last letter submitted by Mr. Brammer.
