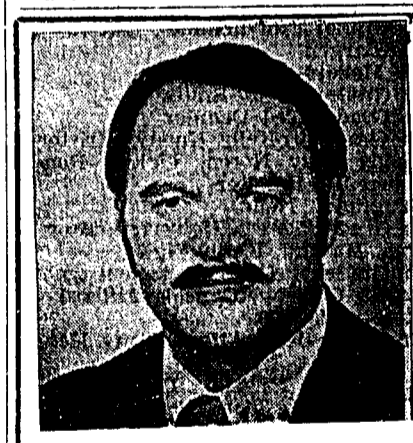

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**"Wilderness Concert"
Set for February 13**

Moscow A "wilderness concert" a photographic slide presentation on wilderness scenery using big screens and music, will be presented Friday, February 13 at the University of Idaho.

Collectively titled "Mountain Visions" the presentation is produced by Katy Flanagan and Gary Grimm, who have given elaborate slide presentations on wilderness at UI in recent years. The show begins at 7:30 p. m. in the SUB ballroom, and admission is 75 cents for children 12 and under, \$2 for students and \$3 for others. It is sponsored by the UI Outdoor Program.

The show will include the award-winning production "Eclipse," which has been called contemporary folktale. The story, written by Northwest author Gino Stry, tells about the animal characters coyote, eagle and water ouzel who lives and values are changed after viewing a solar eclipse. The presentation uses 3-screen panorama and multiple projectors, and many of the images were taken during the February 1979 solar eclipse in the Judith Mountains in Montana.

Another presentation, "South of Denali, Ski Trek in the Alaska Range," will give the viewer a look at winter in an Alaskan bush cabin and preparation for a four-week cross country ski trip near Denali, or Mount McKinley. 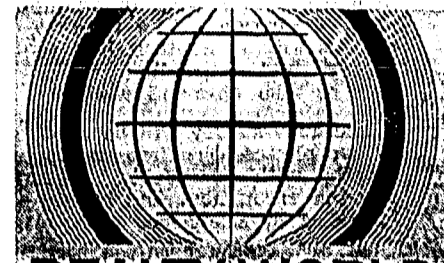

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1980 Survey to Measure Fishing, Hunting Activities

More than 100,000 households will get telephone calls and about 40,000 individuals will be interviewed this year during a national survey of fishing, hunting and wildlife-associated activities.

The survey has been conducted every five years since 1955 by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to gather information about participation in hunting and fishing activities.

According to Lynn Greenwalt, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service director the results of the study will help federal and state resource managers meet the growing demand for fishing, hunting and other similar recreational opportunities.

He said the 1975 survey showed that almost 96 million Americans in

9 years of age or older were involved in one or more types of wildlife-related recreation. The total included 20.6 million hunters, 53.9 million anglers and more than 40 million persons who observed wildlife.

The 1980 survey will be conducted in two phases—the first starting this month with households, randomly selected throughout the nation, will be polled by telephone.

Phase two starts in March and April, when individuals will be interviewed by the U. S. Census Bureau.

The survey is financed with proceeds from excise taxes on sporting arms, ammunition, archery equipment and fishing tackle as authorized by the Federal Aid in Fish and Wildlife Restoration Acts. The report is scheduled for release early that almost 96 million Americans in

POACHERS GET STIFF PENALTIES FOR ILLEGAL DEER KILLS

Senior conservation officer Eldon Anglen made the arrests of illegal deer kills when he was returning home from the memorial service for his fellow officers (January 17).

It was, indeed, a good day for poaching. All Department of Fish and Game Conservation officers had come to Boise to pay tribute to their fallen comrades, Bill Pope and Conley Elms, victims of a shooting while they investigated a report of illegal activity in Owyhee County. Poachers, however, aren't particular about time if they think they can

get away with a violation of fish and game laws, according to Dale Baird, chief of the department's bureau of enforcement.

"These people are little more than thieves who steal fish and wildlife from law-abiding citizens," he said. The two men arrested by Anglen paid a stiff price—the maximum \$300 fine was levied against each, along with a \$200 civil penalty for each illegally killed deer.

In addition, their hunting privileges were revoked for three years and they were each given 30-day suspended jail sentences with 3 years probation. Here are other examples of recent

fish and game law violations: Regional conservation officer Ray Lyon said his officers have verified the illegal killing of 55 elk, 59 deer, and one moose in the department's Region 3. All of the elk were killed after seasons had closed and 25 of the elk and 20 of the deer were identified as females.

"Many of these animals were left to rot and in other cases we could only find the spot where an animal had been field dressed or dragged away," Lyon said. Arrests were made in connection with 25 of the incidents he added and most of the illegal kills were reported by concerned citizens. In another incident, senior conser-

vation officer Brent Hyde was told that a deer had been illegally killed and wasted in the South Fork Salmon River area.

Hyde's investigation, however, showed that two nonresident hunters had killed a large bull elk and had taken away only the antlers. They had also killed a small bull elk and two buck deer without tagging any of the animals and one of the deer was wasted. Eight complaints were filed which resulted in \$800 in fines and \$400 in civil penalties.

Dear Editor:

Mr. Brammer, I am not looking for a long term pen-pal. However, I wish the opportunity to discuss or debate a topic before or after an election. Debate, either in person, or through the letter to the editor column, is a historically accepted method for persons to express different views publicly so that voters can decide for themselves which side of an issue to vote on.

I did not quote exactly Mr. Brammer, because I did not at that time have a copy of his letter and I certainly don't want to put words in his mouth. He did write a letter and he did infer that farmers paid more property tax than city dwellers. The way his original letter, published in the May 15, 1980 Gazette, was worded it gave me the impression that approximately equal land values paid unequal taxes. My point was, and is, approximately equal valued land holdings pay approximately equal taxes.

Let us examine Mr. Brammer's statement. This time I quote Mr. Brammer in a letter to the editor published May 15, 1980 in the Gazette-News. "If the present system and 14 mills are used then it would cost a \$40,000 home owner about

\$110.00 a year and a farmer with a \$50,000 assessed valuation about \$700.00 a year." Please follow through this statement with me. The only way this statement is true is if we take the \$40,000 home value as market value. Using the county formula of assessed value (at 19% of market value) we multiply by 19% to get an assessed value of \$7,600. Then multiply by 14 mills and you get \$106.40 in taxes. The \$50,000 in his statement is already an assessed value so we multiply by 14 mills to get \$700.00 in taxes. The key is he is comparing market value on the house to assessed value on the farm. Perhaps a small chart would clear up the issue.

Town House:
Market Value—\$40,000
Assessed Value—\$7,600
Taxes—\$106.40

Farm:
Market Value—\$263,158
Assessed Value—\$50,000
Taxes—\$700.00

(*this figure is arrived at using the formula of assessed value at 19% of market value).

You can easily see Mr. Brammer is not comparing 2 approximately equal land holdings. He either does not know the difference between assessed value and market value, or he deliberately compared apples (market value), to oranges (assessed value), to get pears (misinformed voters). To deliberately not label your terms and deliberately mix those terms is the same as lying, and Mr. Brammer's letters must be suspect in that regard.

Mr. Brammer takes exception to my statement that "a tax levy hits everyone the same". I know and so does everyone else, that if my house is worth more than my neighbor's, I will pay more tax. It is my private choice to support as fancy a house as I want. However, the mills of the past, or the percentage points of the future are the same for everybody. Barring discrepancies in assessment, equal land holdings pay equal taxes. Mr. Brammer also attempts to bring personal income into the property tax issue. Where he got that
