



The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of de-termining eligibility. Applications termining e ligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of 'n come and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the informa-tion provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals (and milk) for them, they should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy Crawford, Superintendent George will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dis atisfied with the ruling of the offical, he may wish to discuss the deci-sion with the determining offical on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Jack Spangler, Chairman Board of Trustees, Route 1, Genesee, 285-1555 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing

procedure. If a family member becomes un-employed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced-price meals or for additional benefits such as free meals (and milk) if the family income falls at or below the levels shown on the preceding page. In the operation of school nutri-

tion programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be re-viewed by any interested party.
