Changes In Reduced Price, Free Milk and School Lunch Policy at Genesee School

Genesee Jt. School District today announced its policy for determining eligibility of children who may receive and reduced-price meals (and free milk) served under the National School Lunch Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals (and free milk).

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals (and milk) for them, they should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy George Crawford, Superintendent will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Jack Spangler, Chairman Board of Trustees, Route 1, Genesee, 285-1655 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced-price meals or for additional benefits such as free meals (and milk) if the family income falls at or below the levels shown on the preceding page.

In the operation of school nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

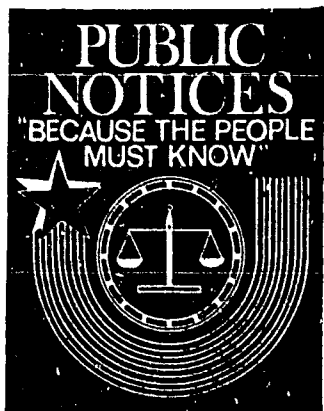

ORDINANCE NO. 594

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, OF LATAH COUNTY, RATIFYING, ADOPTING AND CONFIRMING CERTAIN ACTIONS HERETOFORE TAKEN BY THE CITY COUNCIL RELATIVE TO THE ISSUANCE OF THE PARITY LIEN WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BOND OF 1980; PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS PROPERLY RELATING THERETO

Latah County, Idaho

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, of Latah County, Idaho, as follows:

WHEREAS, the City of Kendrick, (herein sometimes designated the "City"), in the County of Latah, State of Idaho, is a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Idaho;

WHEREAS, the City Council of said City, (herein sometimes designated the "Council"), on September 8, 1980, adopted Ordinance No. 589, authorizing the issuance of a Water Revenue Bond, the proceeds of which are to be used for construction of improvements and betterments to the water system;

WHEREAS, said Council on December 19, 1980, adopted Ordinance No. 593 at a special meeting held for that purpose which modified and amended certain provisions of Ordinance No. 589; and

WHEREAS, the Council now desires to ratify, adopt and confirm all actions heretofore taken by said Council with regard to the issuance of the Parity Lien Water and Sewer Revenue Bond of 1980;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ORDAINED as follows:

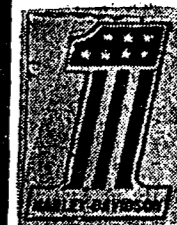
