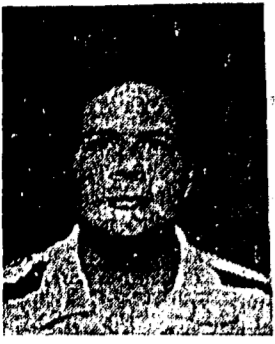


Paul Jelinek Joins Genesee Insurance Agency

First Security Bank Earnings Set Record

FIRST SECURITY NEWSLETTER Salt Lake City—First Security Corporation, bank holding company headquartered here, Tuesday announced 1980 operating figures which show record high earnings, assets and deposits.

At the regular quarterly directors meeting, George S. Eccles, chairman and chief executive officer of the financial services firm, told directors that at year-end 1980, combined resources of First Security Corporation, its banks and subsidiaries, totaled \$3.6 billion, an all-time high. This figure represents a 5.1 percent increase over the \$3.4 billion in resources on December 31, 1979.

Corporation affiliate banks reported total deposits at year-end of \$2.7 billion, compared with \$2.6 billion reported at year-end 1979. This year's deposits outdistanced last year's by 4.7 percent.

First Security Corporation previously reported a 10.5 percent increase for 1980 in unaudited consolidated income for shareholders before securities transactions, \$40.9 million compared with \$37.0 million. On a per share basis, the \$3.41 per share figures for 1980 compares with 1979's \$3.13.

Unaudited income for 1980 after securities transactions was \$37.7 million, or \$3.18 per share, compared with \$35.1 million, or \$2.97 per share for the year 1979. At the year end, the corporation had 11,980,639 shares of common stock outstanding.

Earnings for 1980 were achieved in the face of a total expense of \$331.4 million compared with \$200.0 million in 1979, a 14.3 percent increase. All categories of operating expense showed increases.

Interest paid on time deposits increased 25.91 percent from \$126.9 million in 1979 to \$159.8 million in 1980. A total of \$68 million was reported for 1979 salaries and employee benefits. This figure represents a 103.7 percent increase over the figure reported in 1979.

Eccles reported that as of December 31, 1980, First Security banks and subsidiaries had loans outstanding including leases, totaling \$2.17 billion, compared to \$2.15 billion the previous year. Mortgage loans of \$250.8 million were sold during 1980 to outside markets in order to stimulate mortgage money available in the Intermountain region.

In addition to real estate loans totaling \$1.04 billion on December 31, 1980, First Security Corporation banks and subsidiaries, Utah Mortgage Loan Corporation and Securities Intermountain, Inc. (SIMCO), were servicing loans owned and serviced at year-end amounted to \$2.8 billion.

Chairman Eccles told directors that extreme volatility continued to characterize the national economy thru the end of the year. Wide swings in interest rates clearly reflect the international uncertainty regarding the availability and cost of energy, the deep-rooted forces of inflation and the many areas of political tension.

"Nevertheless," he said, I believe the groundwork is being laid to influence the American economy along a course of improved stability in the months and year ahead.

According to the financial executive, record high interest rates reached in December will undoubtedly dampen the pace of economic activity during the first part of the year. Weakness centered in the housing and automobile industries is expected to spread generally throughout all segments of the economy. The place of consumer spending clearly evident in early December improved in the week prior to Christmas.

"It seems likely, however, that during the early part of 1981, consumer confidence will weaken and spending will be reduced," he said. "Because of this, reductions in inventories, production, employment and income will develop."

"Certainly the policies advanced by the Reagan Administration will greatly influence the economic outlook this year," he said. A tax cut, which should correspond with budget cuts, is likely. However, Eccles feels that a tax cut should be delayed until reduction in budgetary expenditures is achieved. "This will be difficult because of the many items frozen into the budget." A smaller federal budget deficit would contribute significantly to a reduction in infla-

tionary psychology and may ease interest rate pressure in the credit markets, he said.

"We anticipate that the new Administration will make major efforts to dampen inflation," he said, "and to eliminate many stifling regulations which will increase profits of private industry."

Eccles said that unless there is improvement in the economy and the inflation rate, any easing in interest rates will be temporary and they will tend to increase again and remain averagely high.

"With the possibility for further increases in oil and food prices the decline of the gross national product, and ever-growing regulatory burdens the year 1981 will be a most challenging one for the new Administration and bank management."

The Annual meeting of First Security Corporation stockholders will be held Monday, April 27, in Salt Lake, City, Utah.

In the latest Latah Legacy, the quarterly publication of the Latah Co. Historical Society, the story of "National Williamson, 1903-1920" by M. Alexis Rippel and the story of "The Settlement of Dry Ridge, Troy-Deary, Idaho" by Ray E. Osterberg was featured. Both articles concern Latah County and its people in the early settlement years. Mr. Osterberg tells the story of the people from the Dry Ridge area which includes the towns of Troy and Deary, while Ms. Rippel deals with the history of National Williamson's store. His store carried out in the

present Cox and Nelson's building, then moved to what is now the Thaina Apartments and Brown's Furniture which is currently being remodeled. Williamson was one of this area's most flamboyant merchants and was responsible for originating the Latah County Fair. Both articles are accompanied by many historical photographs, including unique interior and exterior views of Williamson's and National Williamson himself. There are also photographs of the O. K. Olson Sawmill in Troy, various families that settled on the ridge and maps showing locations of family homesteads on Dry Ridge.

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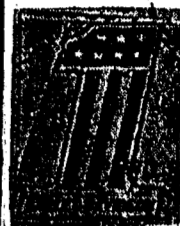
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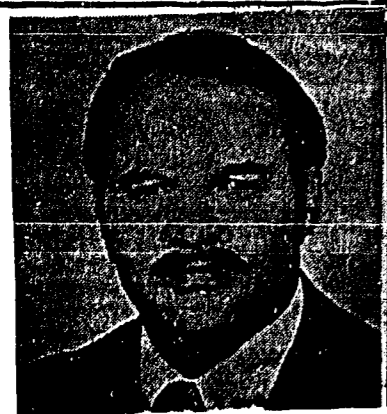
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Relatives Attended Baumgartner Funeral

Change in Policy Statement for Free and Reduced Price Meals in School Dist. 283

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 this week announced its policy for determining eligibility of children who may receive free and reduced-price meals and free milk served under the National School Lunch Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk.

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, then should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy L. Eldon Taylor, Superintendent, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal

basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Luther Parks, Chairman, Board of Trustees, Kendrick, 289-3431 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced-price meals or for addition benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown on the income schedule.

In the operation of school nutrition program no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Project "WILD" To Teach Concepts of Wildlife

The Department of Fish and Game is taking part in a cooperative effort to develop wildlife teaching materials for schools in the 13 western states, according to regional conservation educator Stu Murrell.

Project WILD (Wildlife in Learning Design) is intended to increase the student's awareness and understanding of wildlife, Murrell said. He and Karen Underwood, Department of Education represent Idaho on the planning team. Jerry Tucker, Boise State University, is an advisor.

"This is the first time an education project for wildlife is being prepared for such a large geographic area," he said.

Idaho is one of five states whose representatives have been selected to develop lesson plans under a number of basic wildlife concepts.

Among the concepts, Murrell said, are those stating that wildlife is a renewable resource, each habitat has a carrying capacity for wildlife and an increasing human population is affecting wildlife.

Material from workshops in Idaho, California, Colorado, Arizona and Alaska will be incorporated in a pilot textbook for testing in selected schools by September 1981 and the final version should be available in 1983.

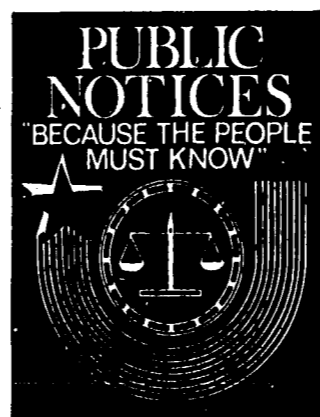

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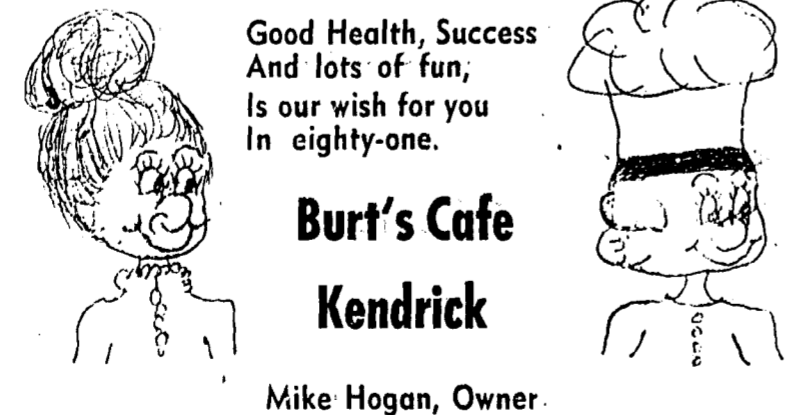

A notice to the postal customers by the Postmaster of Genesee, Leslie Wilson, in your January 8 newspaper and a subsequent article in the January 22 issue triggered sufficient public concern to precipitate two petitions from the postal customers of Genesee. I would be very appreciative if you would publish my letter to dispell any fears of your, and our, customers. It would save me writing identical letters to all the signers of the petition. The petition requested that the schedule of the carriers be returned to the old schedule which was earlier.

We had studied and compared the Genesee operation to other post offices in the area and it appeared that Postmaster Wilson was using more clerical hours than many others. In order to be equitable and fair, we suggested that she make some changes in the carriers schedule. They had been reporting to the office before the mail arrived. After it arrives it has to be broken down to the box section and to the routes. Although the non-productive time, in this case, did not affect their salaries, it was not a proper schedule. Under the Fair Labor Standards Act, we, the Postal Service, cannot permit employees to work outside their schedule without payment and if we suffer and permit them to do so, we could be held liable. We anticipated that by scheduling the carriers one hour later it might cause them to be approximately 30 minutes later in effecting delivery. Mrs. Wilson responded to our suggestion with a counter suggestion that she alter the office operation two hours. We missed that in the communication, and by not responding Leslie assumed that we had no quarrel and so altered the office hours.

We did not feel that a little later delivery would cause a hardship on the customers. Because the routes at Genesee are short routes, all the customers received their mail at noon or before. There are few placed in this territory, or the nation, where this happens. A heavier or longer route might not complete delivery until 3 or 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

We did find out that Leslie has been spending a great deal of time in and out of the office on our Women's Program for which we were giving her sufficient credit. We have met with Leslie and we now have a better understanding, both of us. Adjustments were made in her clerical hours and we trust that she can work such that the service, other than a little later delivery, will be relatively the same as before.

If any of your customers or our customers have further concerns, they should not hesitate to discuss them with Leslie Wilson or contact my office for answers or explanations.
