Willard Schoeffler, Retired Area Farmer, Victim of Stroke

Fred Willard Schoeffler, a retired Kendrick farmer, died of a stroke Sunday night at St. Joseph's Hospital. He was 61.

Schoeffler was among the first group from Nez Perce County drafted in 1941 to serve in World War II, serving just after he graduated from the old Lewiston State Normal College.

Born May 30, 1919, to Ada and Fred Schoeffler in Cameron, he attended grade school there and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1937.

He married Muriel Kelley, Clarkston, Oct. 23, 1942. When he returned from the Army he worked a short time in a smelter at Kellogg. He then began farming near Southwick. Since 1978, he and his wife had lived just outside Juliaetta.

Survivors include his wife at the family home; two daughters, Fonda Wilson of Genesee and Marsha Schoeffler of Moscow; his mother, Ada Schoeffler of Juliaetta; two sisters, Irene Olson and Irene Edgar, both of Lewiston, and a grandson.

Services were held Wednesday at Malcolm's; Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel and burial followed at the Cameron Cemetery.

Accident Saturday Claims Life of Kendrick Woman

One Kendrick woman was killed and another critically injured in a one-car roll-over on a private road about mid-way between Kendrick and Juliaetta Saturday, Feb. 28.

According to the Idaho State Police, the accident occurred when the left wheel of the Jacobson car slid off the road leading up to the Johns' home. The car rolled off the embankment, throwing both women outside.

Mrs. Johns and Mrs. Jacobson were taken by J-K ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston where Mrs. Johns was pronounced dead on arrival.

Mrs. Jacobson, a registered nurse and a close personal friend of the family, had taken Mrs. Johns to the Juliaetta library that day and was returning her to her home when the accident occurred shortly before 12 noon.

Frank Jacobson, husband of the injured woman said Tuesday afternoon that Virginia suffered three broken bones in her upper right arm, a corticosteroid fracture of the upper left leg and pelvic fractures. She remains in the intensive care unit at St. Joseph's and her condition is still listed as critical although her husband said she shows some improvement.

Accident Claims Life Of Ruth A. Johns

Ruth A. Johns, who lived on a farm between Juliaetta and Kendrick for the past 40 years, died Saturday, Feb. 28, in a car accident just a few feet from her home. She was 74.

Mrs. Johns, who was a librarian after graduating from high school, was a housewife and an avid rockhound. She was born December 5, 1906, to Walter and Rosa Jones in Ellensburg, Wash.

Mrs. Johns is survived by her husband at the family home; a son, Donald of Olympia, Washington; a daughter, Phyllis Carlstrom of Lewiston; five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The body was cremated. A memorial service will be held Friday at the Kendrick Assembly of God Church at 1:30 p. m.

Kendrick Tops Genesee for Dist. Basketball Crown; Both Teams Go to State

The basketball teams from Kendrick and Genesee high schools are now in Idaho Falls awaiting the opening of the State Class A-3 tournament on Thursday afternoon.

Kendrick goes into the tournament wearing the crown of the District II champions which they gained last Wednesday night at Booth Hall in Lewiston by defeating Genesee 62-51.

Genesee, as runner-up in District II competition, earned its state berth Saturday night with a 53-40 victory over District 3 runner-up Melba in a game played at Cascade.

Kendrick's victorious Tigers will open the state tournament at Idaho Falls Bonneville high school as they meet Sugar-Salem High School at 12 noon, Kendrick time. The game will be broadcast over Orofino radio station KLER, (95 on the dial).

Genesee will play its first game at 6:00 p. m. Thursday night as they meet Teton High School.

Kendrick Wins It All In the Kendrick-Genesee game Saturday night at Lewiston, Genesee, who held two regular season wins over the Tigers, started out hot from the outside and by the middle of the second quarter led 23-16.

But Kendrick started to use the fast break and had closed the gap to 32-30 at the half.

Kendrick stole the ball on the opening tip of the second half, for a basket to tie the score and ran up six unanswered points for a 38-32 lead as the Tigers never looked back.

The Kendrick press began taking its toll of the weary Bulldogs, who had battled out of the loser's bracket to get to this game, and the Tigers pulled slowly ahead.

The scoring combination of Darren Clemenstagen and Terry Hudson cracked the Tigers with 39 points between them. Clemenstagen scored 17 of his game-high 23 points in the second half, much of it coming from the line where he was 9 for 11.

Hudson banged home 16 points and got the Tigers rolling with scoring outbursts in the second and third quarters.

Mrs. Susan C. Davidson, a former Kendrick nurse and resident who once estimated that she assisted Dr. D. A. Christensen in the delivery of over 400 babies, died in Spokane, Washington Saturday, Feb. 21 at the age of 84.

She was born in Geneseo, Illinois, October 31, 1896 and came West with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Johns in 1903.

They settled at Moscow for about 16 years before moving to Juliaetta. Educated at Moscow, she began her nursing career at Gritman Hospital.

She married Clifford Davidson October 16, 1920 and the couple first resided on a farm at American Ridge and later purchased a farm on Potlatch Ridge south of Kendrick. They lived there until 1937 when they purchased a home in Kendrick.

After the couple moved to Kendrick, Mrs. Davidson in 1941 turned part of their home into a nursing home. She continued its operation until 1961 when they moved to Spokane.

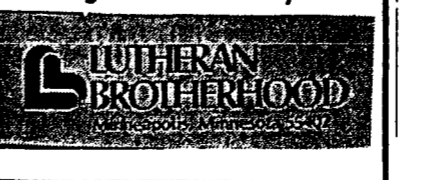

Dear Editor:
The Boise Statesman Sunday quoted me as wanting to up the sales tax. I'd like to explain why if you'll be so good as to print a reply for the suggestion was highly unpopular. Some of your readers listened in dismay.

Higher education needs more money than it seems possible to give it under our present tax structure. We are all sick and tired of taxes. Property owners feel that enough is enough so we voted in the 1%.

Why should we turn around now and up the sales tax?

Because we eat.
Because we shall need to produce ever more and more food just down the road a ways. Our children grow, marry, have families. We already know that many people over the earth go to bed hungry every night. We don't want our Idaho kids to join them.

Extreme? Well, let's see: the Dean of the College of Agriculture at the University of Idaho is a worried man. He sees food shortages ahead. Why? Because with reduced appropriations for higher education of which his division is, of course, a part, he sees losing research programs which will produce more food. I'll list three ways which are threatened by insufficient funds which need money from an upped sales tax:

1. Work must continue on increasing yields from better and better

seeds.
2. Work must continue to produce disease-resistant varieties.
3. The enormous spoilage which occurs between the field and the dinner table must be lessened.

These are just a few of the needs of continuing programs, not touching the education of our kids but readying to feed them and their families in the times ahead.

Our legislators are given just so much money to divide. They need more. OK, let's give them more. But not from the property owner. Rather from us all for we all eat.

The sales tax at 3% is a nuisance but it is necessary. Other states have larger sales tax not Oregon,

but Georgia, for example, had 5% way back 15 years ago. It is the only tax we decide how much of we shall pay. If we don't buy, we don't pay.

Personally, I'd like to see it upped with the exemptions we now have and spare food. Does that sound inconsistent? Not at all, for eating is one problem, now and later. Please join in thinking this through with me and talk it over with the legislators. They need to understand that we support higher education which addresses this problem. Thanks for printing this.
