Hannah Schultz, 90, Bear Ridge Pioneer, Dies March 6

Hanna Catherine Schultz, one of the oldest pioneers of the Kendrick area, died Friday at Paradise Villa Nursing Home of cancer. She was 90. She was born Sept. 1, 1890 near Big Bear Creek to John and Emma Gladden. She married Charley J. Schultz on Nov. 14, 1912 at Moscow. They farmed at Cameron until 1945, when they moved to Juliaetta. He died Nov. 5, 1966. She had been living at Paradise Villa since September, 1979.

Survivors include two daughters, Viola Schmidt of Kendrick and Wilma Steen of San Carlos, Ca.; 6 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. She was the last of her generation in the Gladden family, with four sisters and four brothers preceding her in death.

She was a member of the Juliaetta Methodist church. Services were held Monday at 10 a. m. at Short's Funeral Chapel with Rev. John O. Blom officiating. Burial in Juliaetta City Cemetery.

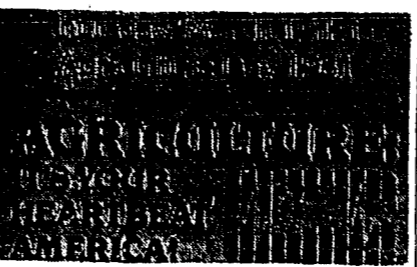

Genesee Wins Third Place at State Class A-3 Basketball Tournament; Kendrick Bows Out

Coach Ozzie Kamikieberg and his never-quit Bulldog basketball team came out of the State Class A-3 tournament with the third place trophy and they had to do it the hard way again, coming off of an early round loss to fight back into contention in the consolation bracket of the single elimination tournament. Kendrick's Tigers, wearing the District 2 crown into state competition, was forced out after two straight losses.

The Tigers couldn't find the range in the opening game against Sugar-Salem Thursday afternoon, then were

eliminated the next day by Kimberly 82-74.

Genesee edged by Teton in the first game then dropped a close 53-49 game to Glenns Ferry Thursday and ended any championship dreams. Genesee took an early lead in the battle for third place against Fruitland Saturday night, but then had to survive a rally in the final quarter to win 53-52.

Kendrick High, fresh off an impressive showing at the District tournament, traveled to Idaho Falls with hopes of winning state. But frigid shooting victimized the Tigers and they never got untracked in two games, both of which they lost.

In Kendrick's first game, probably the team's worst of the year, they could manage to make only 4 of their 24 shots. After that first quarter, things didn't get much better, and the Tigers went on to lose to Sugar-Salem 76-61.

Only in the 4th quarter did Kendrick get going. Behind the hot shooting of Terry Hudson, who drove for 22 points, K. H. S. out a 28-point Sugar-Salem lead to 8, before running out of steam.

Kendrick dropped into the consolation bracket with the loss, and were eliminated from play the following afternoon by Kimberly. The Bulldogs capitalized on Kendrick fouls in claiming an 82-74 win. The Tigers who made only 27-87 from the field against Sugar-Salem, made only 33 of 83 the second time around.

Darren Clemenhausen closed with a 26 point, 15 rebound showing, while Donnie Rice scored 17 points and grabbed 21 rebounds.

The Tigers final record was 17-7, the best mark by a Kendrick team since the school turned A-3 in 1969.

Ruth Leland, 90, Passes March 6

Pastor Ruth A. Leland, 90, minister of the United Brethren Church of Juliaetta the past 50 years, died Friday, March 6 at 8 a. m. at Lewiston Orchards Nursing Home. She had been a resident there for one month.

Miss Leland had lived at Juliaetta since 1906. She had worked as a seamstress for Lewiston Mattress and Upholstery Co. and Lewiston Tent and Awning. She cooked for a school at Albion, Wash., and worked at a cannery in Juliaetta in addition to her ministerial duties.

She was born July 30, 1890, at Cambria, Wyo., to Henry J. and Alice J. Leland. She left that state in 1906 to come to Idaho.

She never married, and she left no close relatives. Two brothers and three sisters preceded her in death.

Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home was in charge of cremation. At her request no services were held and any memorials in her name should be given to the Senior Citizens meal site program.

Idaho Obsidian Is Changing Ideas About Indian's Movements

Moscow—A landmark project to study obsidian, a glass-like volcanic rock highly prized by Northwestern Indians for its razor sharpness and

good flaking qualities, is giving anthropologists and historians some clues to Indian's movements in the Northwest over the last 10,000 years.

It's also disapproving a historical notion that Idaho Indians obtained the valuable rock only in Oregon and the Yellowstone Park vicinity, according to Lee Sappington, a graduate anthropology student at the

University of Idaho. The project is part of Sappington's thesis and is being done in conjunction with the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology at UI, and has received some support from the Idaho State Historical Society.

While obsidian is less abundant and less durable than basalt or chert, its flaked edges are sharper than those of most other readily available rocks and it is easily worked into fine cutting tools, Sappington said. Also because obsidian can survive centuries of wear, it is one of the only means anthropologists have of reconstruction the past.

Thinking it strange that Idaho Indians would travel hundreds of miles to Oregon or Yellowstone for the rock that they made knives and arrowheads from, Sappington began looking for evidence of Indians obtaining obsidian from local sources and found some.

Now he's chemically matching obsidian tools found at Indian camping and village sites with their volcanic sources, and is finding that Indians, more often than not, were obtaining obsidian from sources near home.

It disagrees with historic accounts, but by using x-ray fluorescence to analyze obsidian found at Lucky Peak Reservoir near Boise, I've found that most of it came from Timber Butte about 40 miles to the North," he said. He has analyzed more than 800 artifacts from Lucky Peak, more than any that have been analyzed from a single site anywhere in the world, he said.

He explained that, since the 19th century, historians have believed that the exclusive sources of obsidian found in this area were in Central Oregon and Yellowstone because those were the best known sources. But by using carbon dating methods and other chemical analysis Sappington and others have found that the Timber Butte area was the primary source of obsidian for Indians as far away as Lewiston and Kamiah, as long ago as 9,000 years.

Indians in other regions of Idaho had other sources of obsidian which also show something about their movements, Sappington continued. "The Sheepwater Indians on the Middle Fork of the Salmon River were always maligned for being isolated and primitive. But, contrary to popular belief, they were traveling from Western Idaho to Yellowstone to obtain obsidian at Big Southern Butte, Camas Prairie, Centennial Mountains and Timber Butte for more than 6,000 years," he said.

"This indicates a stable cultural condition among the Indians," Sappington's work is also showing that Idaho Indians, particularly in the southwest part of the state, were "stay-at-homes."

"We find very little Idaho obsidian at archaeological sites outside Idaho, but we find Oregon and Nevada obsidian at Lewiston and at Salmon Falls near Hagerman, respectively. While we know that Idaho's Indians did move around, this finding indi-

cates that Indians from other regions were coming here to trade obsidian for Idaho's abundant salmon," he said.

Also, he has analyzed six levels of occupation at Kettle Falls near Colville, Wash., by studying obsidian there. Kettle Falls was the second largest Indian fishery on the Columbia River and its history dates back over 10,000 years.

"The obsidian there indicates that Indians from British Columbia, Idaho, Montana and Oregon were coming there to fish," he said. While obsidian is used worldwide to reconstruct prehistory, Sappington's project is one of only three major obsidian projects in the U. S., and anthropologists send him their rocks to analyze.

He has also worked on tracing obsidian sources elsewhere in the Great Basin and the Northwest, and will deliver a paper on his work on obsidian sources in the Chaco Canyon in New Mexico at the upcoming National meeting of the society for American Archaeologists in San Diego.

Sappington said the project has the potential to add immensely to the knowledge of people's movements throughout the west in prehistoric times and he hopes to work on it for several more years, and to do a dissertation on it as well.

Controlled Hunt Harvests Up for Elk and Deer
Controlled hunt harvests for both deer and elk increased last year over 1979 seasons, according to results of the Department of Fish and Game's annual telephone survey of hunters.

Increase were also recorded for moose and antelope, but the number of bighorn sheep taken dropped from 42 in 1979 to 33 last year. Harvest of mountain goat was down, as expected, with 16 hunts closed and the number of permits closed by 87 in 1980. The Fish and Game Commission authorized the cutbacks until data can be gathered to determine the status of goat populations in some areas.

The survey showed a harvest of 3,332 deer in controlled hunts, compared to 2,746 the previous season. Hunter success was down about one percentage point, which state big game manager Jerry Theissen attributed to "nasty opening day" weather or a number of southern Idaho homes.

Elk hunters reported a harvest that totaled 1,319 animals, slightly more than double the number for 1979 and representing 33 percent success, compared to 27 percent in 1979. With 39 hunts and 140 permits available to residents early, the moose harvest was 120, for 86 percent success for those participating. There were 25,524 applicants however, or the 140 permits.

Other harvest results: antelope, 1,398—an increase of 80; and mountain goat 51—down 28 from 1979.

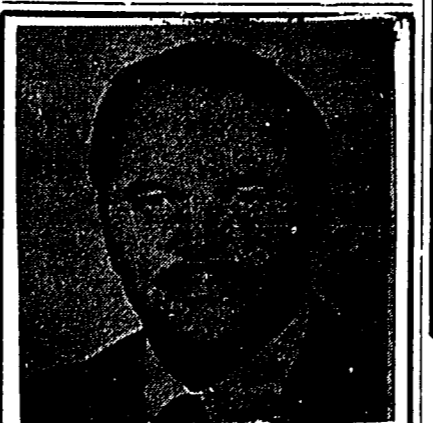

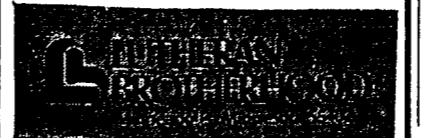

Record Spring Enrollment Seen of U. of Idaho

Moscow: A record spring enrollment has been recorded at the University of Idaho, according to Matt Teln, director of admissions and registrar at UI.
 The enrollment figure—8,750 for spring 1981—was forwarded for approval to the Idaho Board of Education/Board of Regents at its meeting this week in Boise.
 The enrollment figure compares to 8,406 recorded in spring 1980, for an increase of 344 or 4 percent, Teln said. The number includes students enrolled on the UI campus as well as those enrolled at off-campus sites.
 On-campus enrollment, including students taking courses by videotape, accounts for 7,910 of the enrollment.

At off-campus sites, 543 are registered at the Idaho Falls center for Higher Education, 182 in the Coeur d'Alene area graduate centers, and 106 in Continuing Education and at other graduate centers.

Undergraduates account for 6,350 of the total enrollment, while 287 are law students, 1,423 are graduate students and 710 are non-matriculated. The full-time equivalent enrollment (FTE) is 7,395.5, and students are generating 111,514 credit hours.
 Of the on-campus enrollment, 38 percent of the students are women, Teln said.

"With this increase in spring enrollment, we are seeing growth in numbers of new students, former students who are returning to school and in numbers of continuing students," Teln said.

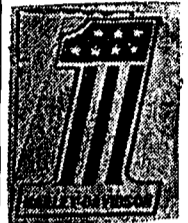

Special Collections Librarian Webbert To Retire In June

Moscow Nearly everyone who's been to the University of Idaho has asked Charles Webbert for a piece of information at one time or another.

Webbert, a librarian at UI for 33 years, 12 of them as head of Special Collections and Archives will retire in June. He and his wife Ruth plan to move to Hendersonville, N. C., soon after his retirement.

Webbert came to UI in 1948 and was reference librarian until 1957 and then social science and special

collections librarian until 1969 when he attained his present rank.

In the meantime, he's watched the library outgrow its quarters on two floors of the UI Administration Building's south wing and move to the present library building, which it is now outgrowing, he says.

The Special Collections, which range from first editions of the works of Sir Walter Scott to the famous Earnard-Stockbridge Photographic Collection, have also grown tremendously in his tenure, he said.

One of his favorite collections, the Day-Northwest Collection of Western Americana, was getting a start when he arrived at UI, and received its biggest boost in 1941 with the gift of the Western Americana library of Jerome J. Day, Webbert said.

"The problem is that it isn't being used enough," he said, explaining that the scope of the collection is broad, and could be of great interest to researchers besides historians.

It also may be one of the better Western Americana collections in the region, he said, but will cost a great deal of money to keep current.

"For example, a particular 20-volume set of books on North American Indians would cost \$100,000 if we had to buy it today," he said. The set was donated to the library several years ago.

He said he'd like to see the library keep building on the collections it has and that the role of the Library Associates, a group of library patrons, will be increasingly important in the library's growth in the next few years.

"We've had many good friends over the years and I hope to see the 'friends group' grow," he said.

Webbert obtained a bachelor's de-

gree from the University of Washington in 1937, a bachelor of science in library science from George Peabody College of Teachers in 1940 and a master's degree in library science from the University of Illinois in 1947.

He has been a librarian in South Dakota and Nebraska and was in the U. S. Army Air Force in 1942-45.

He is author of several bibliographies, guides, checklists and other scholarly activities for the library, and is Phi Beta Mu.
