Missionaries to Speak March 24 at Kendrick Assembly of God Church



"As a mission organization, we believe we can accomplish much for the cause of Jesus Christ by training national Christians for ministry," says the Rev. Bill Johnston.

Mr. Johnston, as Assemblies of God missionary to Ghana, West Africa will be guest speaker for a missions encounter Tuesday, March 24, 7:30 p. m. at Kendrick Assembly of God the Rev. Maddicks pastor, has announced.

Mr. Johnston and his wife, Sharon recently completed their first four-year term of missionary service in Ghana. They taught at the Northern Ghana Bible Institute in Kum-bungu, Ghana and also worked along with national Christians in establishing new churches. They supervised the operation of two medical clinics and Mrs. Johnston provided religious instruction for public school.

Ghana is about the size of Illinois and Indiana combined and has a population of more than 11 million. There are 100 different tribes and language groups in the country.

Prior to missionary appointment, the Johnstons pastored a church in Warrenton, Ore. and were associate pastors in Hermiston, Ore. Johnston worked 4 years in several countries with "Youth With a Mission," an evangelism organization. He earned a B. A. Degree from Northwest College in Kirkland, Wa. and also studied at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska. He is taking post-graduate studies at the Assemblies of God Graduate School in Springfield, Missouri.

In their next term in Ghana, the Johnstons plan to continue in Bible school work and will conduct pastors' seminars. In addition they will resume supervision of the medical clinics.

A professionally-prepared multimedia presentation about Ghana will be featured in this special missions service. Pastor Maddicks invites the public to attend.

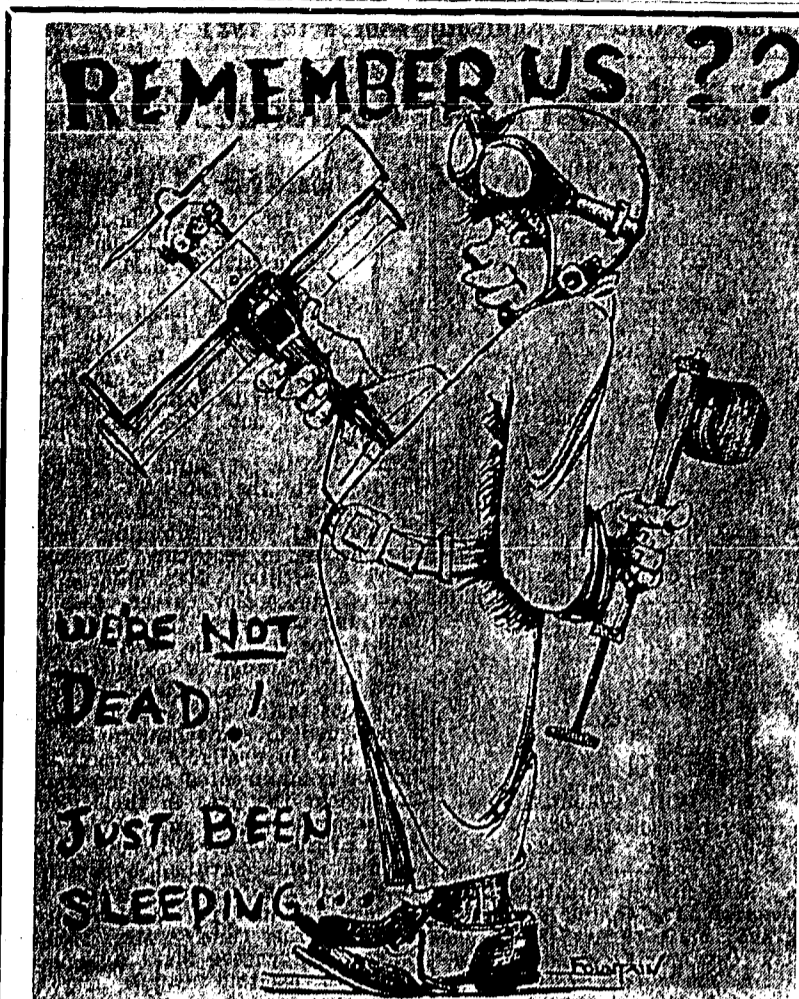

Nine California Bighorns Relocated In Nevada

Some deft helicopter maneuvers, expert marksmanship with tranquilizer darts and careful handling have resulted in the promise of a new herd of California bighorn sheep just south of the Idaho-Nevada border.

Three rams and nine ewes were captured and relocated during a week long operation in Owyhee Co. carried out by the Department of Fish and Game.

"All but one were young animals and all were healthy, spirited bighorns," said Jerry Thiessen, state big game manager.

But it was painstaking work, Thiessen added. The helicopter, flying in precipitous country along Little Jack's Creek, first coaxed the animals close to the canyon wall to avoid long, harmful falls.

Senior wildlife research biologist Bill Hickey then used a dart gun to immobilize the sheep until they could be carefully moved by helicopter to trucks for a three-hour drive and another helicopter ride to the Jarbridge Mountains in Nevada.

"If the animals prosper on this new range—and we are confident that they will—the herd should eventually benefit both Idaho and Nevada," Thiessen said.

The Nevada Department of Wildlife originally planned to move Rocky Mountain bighorns to northern Nevada but the agency accepted Idaho's advice that it would be better not to mix the two species.

In return, the Idaho department offered to transport some of the California bighorns from Owyhee Co. Thiessen explained.

The Owyhee County population, estimated at more than 350 head, was started in 1963 with some animals from British Columbia. Worldwide, the California bighorn population numbers less than 4,000 according to Thiessen.

He said this year's relocation program was financed largely by a grant from the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep.

CAP Program Produces First Conviction; Fine

The Citizens Against Poaching—CAP—program has produced its first conviction and fine less than two months after the organization was formed.

A \$50 fine, plus \$10 court costs, was levied against a Payette County resident for illegal possession of a game bird. The citation was issued by a Department of Fish and Game conservation officer following an investigation that started with information telephoned to CAP's toll-free number, 1-800-632-5999.

Dale Baird, chief enforcement, said the citizen who supplied the information received a \$100 reward. "And our job was made easier because the person who telephoned gave us very complete and accurate facts," he added.

Minimum rewards range from \$100 to \$500, based on the species of fish or wildlife involved in the violation. "We are following up on several other possible cases resulting from calls to CAP, and we have noted that some of the callers don't expect a reward," Baird said.

"They just don't want to see fish and game thieves go untouched."

CAP is a nonprofit corporation similar to anti-poaching organizations established in other states that include New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.

It is funded entirely by private contributions and administered by citizens outside the department, although a representative of the agency handles payment of rewards, Baird said.

"Persons who want to provide information can dial the toll-free number and their identity will be protected if that is their wish," he emphasized.

Contributions to CAP can be addressed to Citizens Against Poaching, P. O. Box 7533, Boise, Id. 83707.

The CAP fund is separate from the reward fund that was established last January after the fatal shooting of senior conservation officers Bill Pogue and Conley Elms.

Totalling more than \$8,000, the reward is for "information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible" for the deaths of Pogue and Elms.

Contributions to the fund may be made payable to the Fish and Game Reward Fund, Idaho First National Bank, P. O. Box 157, Homedale, ID 83828.

College Students May Lose Thousands of Dollars In Financial Aid

Moscow—Hundreds of UI students, and others throughout the nation, may be ineligible for financial aid to attend the university next year if the Reagan Administration's proposed cuts of federal student loan programs and social security payments become law, according to Harry Davey, UI Student Financial Aid Director.

Others may be eligible to receive only a portion of the money they received this year under such programs as the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (BEOG) and the National Direct Student Loan program (NDSL), he said.

Most of the cuts, proposed by President Reagan and U. S. Budget Director David Stockman would be alterations in the 1980 Education Amendment signed by President Carter last October. The cuts would amount to \$9.2 billion out of student financial aid nationwide over the next 5 years.

A statement this week by Rep. John N. Erlenborn, R. Ill., indicates that the Senate and House Education committees may be ordered to find ways to save money in the fi-

Residential Construction Activity Still at Low Level

Residential construction activity in February as measured by new building permits was generally unchanged from the previous month continuing at a very low level according to James Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson, managers quoting the February Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, which will be distributed this week, is edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, regional bank holding company.

A major jump occurred in nonresidential permit valuation reflecting primarily a \$14 million dollar hospital expansion project in Twin Falls.

Regarding the outlook for residential construction and mortgage rates there is very little basis for optimism in the near term. Mortgage rates remain stuck near 15 percent and there is no indication of any significant easing.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in February 2 as \$27,348,032 or 9.8 percent above 1980. New Residential Construction for 191 dwelling units totaled \$7,657,985 a decrease of 27.9 in number and a decrease of 18.6 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential Construction valued at \$16,282,520 was up 115.9 percent from last year while Alterations and Repairs totaling \$3,407,527 was down 57.2 percent.

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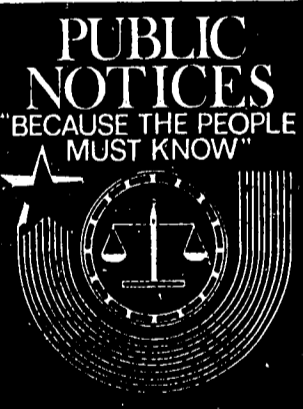

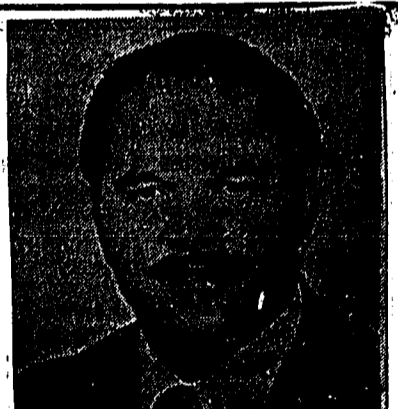

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Tax Hints for Filing Season

The following hints are offered by Internal Revenue Service to help taxpayers in filing their tax returns:
 *Use the peel-off label and pre-addressed envelope that come in the tax package. They speed the processing of the return.
 *Pay tax due with check or money order. Cash can be lost and there would be no proof of payment.
 *File early—especially for a refund. Refund returns are usually processed first. It takes approximately ten weeks from the date of receipt to process a return.
 *Check your figures. Mistakes in math are the most common errors on returns. They can delay the processing, as can...
 *Illegible writing on returns. It

cannot be scanned by a computer and must be read and processed manually.

*Be sure the address label is correct. If corrections need to be made, they can be made on the label.

*On a joint return, the husband's social security number should be entered first, even if the wife prepares the return. Returns are filed under the husband's social security number.

*Be sure to sign and date the return. Joint returns must be signed by both husband and wife.

*Be sure all W-2's have been attached to the return and be sure that the correct total has been entered on the return. The amount entered must have been taken from the "wages, salaries and tips" block on the W-2. NOT from the FICA wages block.

*Schedules and forms are attached in alphabetical and then numerical

order to the 1040. If they are not, the return must be taken apart at the service center and the attachments reordered. This delays the processing time.
 *Women who marry and assume their husband's surname (or men who change their name) should notify the Social Security Administration of the name change. If the name and social security number do not match on the return, the computer will reject it and service center personnel must contact the taxpayer to verify the number.

Anglers Advised to Keep '81 Steelhead Permits

Don't discard those 1981 steelhead permits when spring seasons close in Idaho—they are valid for the full year and chances are good for more fishing next fall.
 The favorable prediction comes from Dave Ortmann, anadromous fisheries supervisor, Department of Fish and Game. It appears that enough fish will be available in the upstream run to allow the department to recommend a full season, he said.

Members of the Fish and Game Commission, if they follow customary procedure, would consider such

a proposal about mid-August. Fall seasons normally open in late September or early the following month.

Ortmann said the 1980 fall steelhead season was one of the best in several years, producing an estimated harvest of as many as 7,000 fish along the main Salmon River.
 Current spring seasons run thru Apr. 12 for waters open on the Clearwater and Snake river and the main Salmon above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi. Regulations describe the boundaries.

Steelhead fishing was scheduled to close March 15, however, on the main Salmon from its mouth upstream to Mackay Bar bridge. From Mackay Bar bridge upstream to 400 yds. be-

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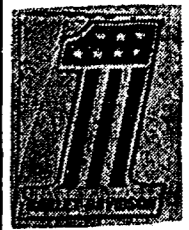
