Everett Fleshman, 92, an early day resident of Leland, who still spent his summers here, died Monday, March 23 at 9:30 p. m. at Gritman Memorial Hospital, Moscow. Death was due to cancer.



Fleshman was a retired farmer and carpenter who homesteaded at Dutton, Mont. in 1909. He lived at Leland from 1906 to 1909.

This past summer, Fleshman and his wife stayed with their granddaughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Rollins at Kendrick. They spent their winters in Mesa, Arizona where he managed a shuffleboard court and called bingo games for 25 years.

He was born May 28, 1888 at Savannah, Mo., to Frank and Sarah Fleshman. He retired from active farming and carpentering in 1947.

He married Ida Robbins at Moscow, March 16, 1910.

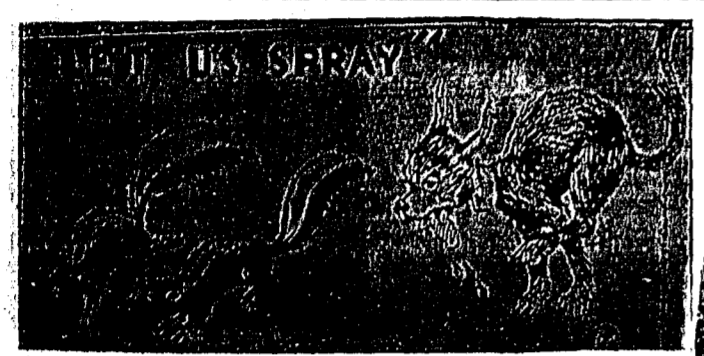

**Warning Sounded On Tractor Tire Slippage**

Boise—As spring tillage gains momentum across the Gem State, farmers are cautioned by the Ag Energy Management Project to watch for excessive tractor tire slippage as they plow and chisel their ground. Some tire slippage is expected with rubber tires, but most experts agree slippage greater than 15 percent can be costly. Excessive tire slippage causes rapid tire wear, wastes fuel and prolongs field time. However, a tractor weighed to hold slippage below 10 percent can overload the tractor's drive train and transmission. The Ag Energy Management Project sponsored jointly by the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service and the Idaho Office of Energy, urges farmers and ranchers to examine their operations critically for sound and proven fuel-saving practices. One method of checking tire slippage involves: —Disconnecting the tractor from the load or pulling the implement from the ground; —Placing a chalk mark or masking tape on the tire directly below the axle; —Setting a stake in the ground next to the chalk mark; —Driving the tractor straight ahead until the tire makes exactly 10 revolutions with the tape or chalk mark directly under the axle as the tractor stops; —Measuring the distance, "A," and staking it for future reference; —Reconnecting the tractor to the load or replacing the implement in the ground at the desired depth; —Repeating the first, second and third steps; —Measuring the new distance, "B." Percent slip is the difference between "A" and "B" divided by "A" and multiplied by 100.

**More Returns Needed In Ird Hunter Survey**

More returns are needed in the Department of Fish and Game's annual survey of upland game and waterfowl hunters, according to state game bird manager Dick Norell. "The more answers we get, the better prepared we will be when we make 1981 season recommendations to the Fish and Game Commission," he said. The cutoff date must be established soon, however, to allow time for compiling returns by late April, he added. Some 14,000 questionnaires were mailed about a month ago to a 5 percent sample of hunters who held licenses in 1980. The forms ask how many of each species were harvested, how many hunting trips were made and the counties where persons hunted. "Our senior citizen license holders are leading, as usual, in the percentage of questionnaires returned so far," Norell said.

County agricultural agents for the UI Cooperative Extension Service can provide assistance with this and other energy-saving practices on the farm.

**IDAHO DAIRYMEN FAIL TO GET SCHEDULED MILK PRICE BOOST**

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor Moscow—A UI economist predicts belt-tightening will be necessary for Idaho dairy producers now that a scheduled increase of more than \$1 million a month in milk prices will not be paid to the state's dairymen. Neil Meyer, extension economist in the UI College of Agriculture, said the price support level for milk had been scheduled to increase 88 cents per 100 pounds on April 1. The increase was canceled by legislation which Congress approved this week. "During the next six months, Idaho will fail to receive nearly \$3 million that would have come into the state if the April 1 increase in milk support prices had become a reality," Meyer said. A cost-price squeeze brought on by inflated costs of production may reduce the net income of many dairy operations during the months ahead, Meyer said. "All producers will be attempting to increase the efficiency of their dairy enterprises in 1981. When production costs rise more rapidly than milk prices, increased efficiency becomes the dairymen's principal means of economic survival," the University of Idaho economist added. Cancellation of the scheduled rise in milk support prices will provide substantial savings to consumers. Meyer said the anticipated April 1 price boosts would have increased the retail prices of milk by 7.5 cents per gallon while adding 9 cents a pound to cheese prices and 10 cents a pound to butter prices.

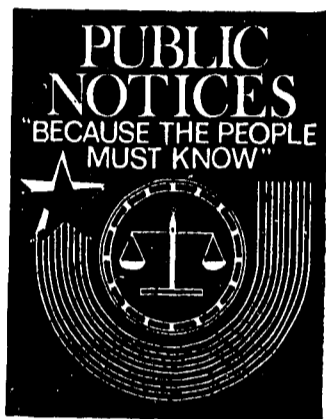

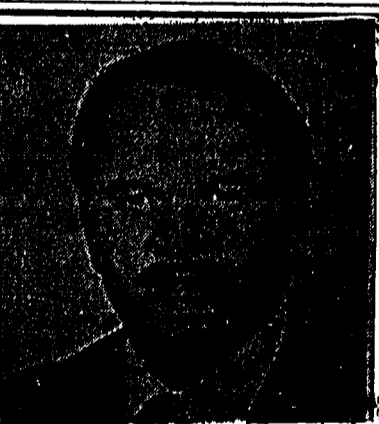

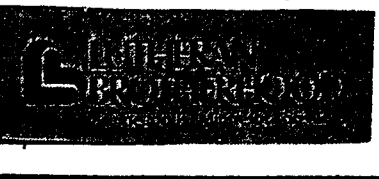
