





Warning Sounded On **Tractor Tire Slippage**

Some tire slippage is expected with rubber tires, but most experts agree slippage greater than 15 percent can

However, a tractor weighed to hold slippage below 10 percent can overload the tractor's drive train and transmission.

transmission. The Ag Energy Management Pro-ject sponsored jointly by the Univer-sity of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service and the Idaho Office of En-ergy, urges farmers and ranchers to examine their operations critically for sound and proven fuel-saving practices. One methods of checking tire slippage involves: —Disconnecting the tractor from the

-Disconnecting the tractor from the load or pulling the implement from

the ground; —Placing a chalk mark or masking tape on the tire directly below the axle;

axie; --Setting a stake in the ground next to the chalk mark; --Driving the tractor straight ahead

until the tire makes exactly 10 rev-lutions with the tape or chalk mark directly under the axle as the tractor stops:

----Reasuring his distance, "A" and staking it for future reference; ----Reconnecting the tractor to the load or replacing the implement in the ground at the desired depth; —Repeating the first, second and third steps;

-Measuring the new distance, "B". Percent slip is the difference be-tween "A" and "B" divided by "A" and multiplied by 100.




