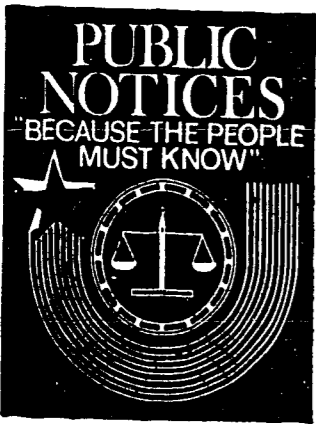

A posted area on McArthur Reservoir in Boundary County will open to year-round fishing March 16, following an order by the Fish & Game Commission.

Regulations were amended to allow anglers to fish from the dam and around the boat ramp. "This fishing opportunity would be a benefit to the public," the commission order stated.

Fishing in the posted area—from the shoreline only—runs from March 16 through June 30.

Elsewhere on the reservoir, the season is January 1-March 15 and June 1-December 31, so the amendment opens the posted areas to year-round fishing. The brook trout bonus limit does not apply.
