Sudden Attack Claims Life of Dr. D. A. Christensen

Dr. D. A. Christensen, Kendrick's family physician for forty years, died at his home Sunday afternoon, May 3, after suffering a heart attack. The sudden passing of this loved and respected man cast a pall of sorrow over the community that was both deep and sincere, for during the time he faithfully practiced medicine in the area, few people had not had their lives touched by this gentle and dedicated man.



Dr. Christensen was born in Salt Lake City, Utah November 15, 1903, the son of Lorenzo and Hilma Christensen. He graduated from the University of Utah and the University of Pennsylvania and took his internship in Seattle before coming to practice in the Kendrick area in 1931. He was married to Irene Snowling September 18, 1928 in Salt Lake City. She survives at the family home.

Dr. Christensen was a naturalist and raised many varieties of birds on his beautiful ranch just outside of Kendrick. People from far and near enjoyed touring his bird aviary.

He retired from practice December 31, 1971, ending a forty year service, but he and his wife Irene had remained on the ranch and both took an active part in many community affairs.

He was a member of the Idaho Medical Association, The Whooping Crane Conservation Association, The American Museum of Natural History, the Kendrick Lions Club, the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens and the Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, James Roger of Yakima, Wash., and Charles Curtis of Lihue Kauai, Hawaii and a daughter, Janice Griffin of Yakima. A son Douglas preceded him in death in 1969. Also surviving are 12 grandchildren and one sister, Helen Christensen, of Salt Lake City, Utah.

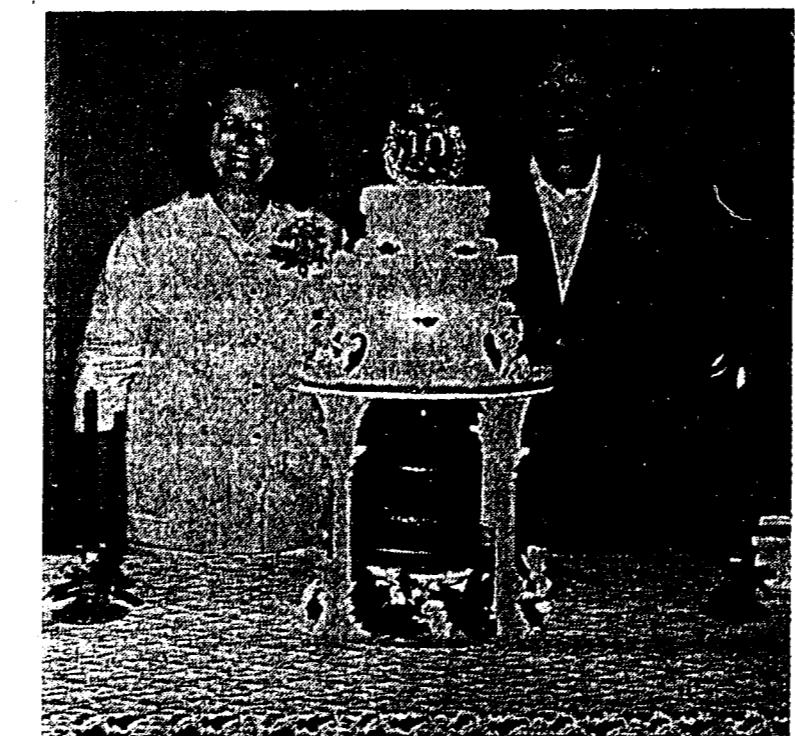

Thursday Storm Battered Area

A violent electrical storm accompanied by high winds and a deluge of rain swept across Whitman and southern Latah County last Thursday evening and left a path of destruction in its wake. Flash flooding occurred in the Aspendale-Lenaville area northeast of Genesee, a portion of bridge across the Little Potlatch in Pine Grove was washed out, power lines and telephone service was disrupted and millions of tons of top soil was washed out of the fields over a large area. Down in the valley, six miles west of Juliaetta, the flooding water swept across the Northern Pacific railroad and inundated a barn, outbuildings and came within inches of seeping into the home of Mrs. Eula Johnson. The Orville Rommell home approximately 12 miles southeast of Moscow appeared to have borne the brunt of worst damage. A truck was swept out of the Rommell yard and rolled a quarter of a mile, their garage collapsed and water was almost to the bottom of the house windows at one point of the storm and the resulting flooding.

Mark Dennler was going home during the height of the storm and had stopped in the middle of the Pine Grove bridge to glimpse at the raging water sweeping beneath the bridge when he felt the road beneath the pickup giving way. He still had the motor running and was able to pull out of the collapsing hole and reach firmer ground as about a five-foot semi-circle of the bridge's floor caved away.

Soil losses were reported to be tremendous in some of the harder hit fields in Whitman and Latah County. Estimates ranged from 100 up to 400 tons to the acre in some fields and many farmers completely lost recently seeded fields.

Telephone service in the Kendrick area to anything but local calls was lost until mid-afternoon Friday.

The regular monthly meeting of the Genesee City Council was held at City Hall, May 4th, 7:30 p. m., Mayor Wilson presiding and all members of the Council present.

Jay Rouch attended the meeting and requested a city beer license, to be issued for one day only, June 13th and a letter from the Council giving permission to the Firemen to sell beer in the Lower City Park during the afternoon of said day. License will be granted.

The grounds were tilled, hand tilled and seeded. Brocke Seed Co. donated the seed and fertilizer. Many hours were spent. The Grange sponsored and assisted in the hauling of fill dirt for the Athletic Field, and in the leveling and seeding. This school project received a first place award in the State Grange Community Service project.

In 1974-75, the Grange took the leadership in renovating the old store which occupied the first floor of the Fraternal Temple Building. It now serves as an attractive meeting room for the Grange, Masonic and Eastern Star lodges. This was a two year project, involving many hours of volunteer labor by members of the respective organizations, and hundreds of dollars to complete. This project also won a 1st place in the state grant and a 2nd place award from National Community Service. All concerned we are happy not to have to climb the stairs to the old meeting rooms.

A new furnace type stove was installed in January 1981. This was also a joint project of the Grange, Masons and Eastern Star.

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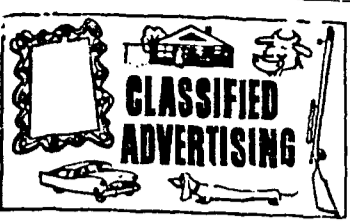

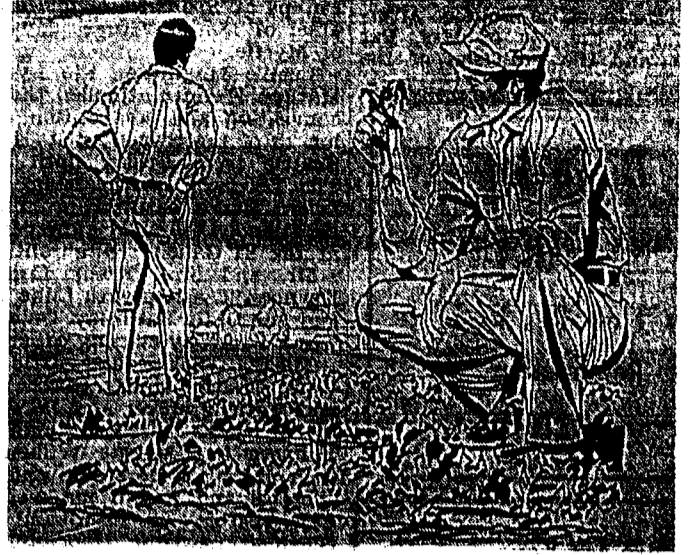
