New Mexico Institute of Technology. Researcher Etscorn advises young parents that their infants are particularly sensitive to cigarette smoke because:
* The brain's barrier to drugs (nicotine), as well as the liver's ability to detoxify nicotine is much less developed in newborns and infants.
* Nicotine very probably stays in the infant's body longer and is more active, and, as such is potentially more toxic.
Using laboratory mice for his experiments, Etscorn went on to postulate that even in small amounts nicotine can make infants nauseous. "If the nausea occurred at the time infant tried a new food—or even several hours afterward—the child may subconsciously associate the food with the feeling of nausea," the researcher continued.
The result: "The baby rejects this food in the future."
Etscorn further added, "Remember nicotine is a toxin—and just 5 micro-liters on the skin of a 40-gram mouse will kill the animal."

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Protect Your Baby's Health

Cigarette smoke can get into your baby's food—and possibly affect his or her future appetite, the American Lung Association cautions.
The usual research finding in support of this hypothesis is the work of psychologist Frank T. Etscorn of

ho and eastern Washington teenagers ages 13 to 16 who have not previously attended.

"Campers receive a full week of conservation training to help them better understand the use and management of our natural resources," said Paul L. Sunderland, Kootenai County agricultural agent for the University of Idaho Extension Service in Coeur d'Alene.
"The outdoor setting puts us closer to our natural resources as well as providing a chance to have fun and participate in different activities such as a tournament of the outdoors," said Sunderland who is camp chairman.
The camp emphasizes the study of soil, water, rangeland, forests, wildlife, recreation and conservation planning. Instructors are public agency professionals and specialists from universities and private industries in Idaho and Washington.
Although a camp fee of \$78 is charged, few campers pay it. Many camperships are available from sponsoring organizations in northern Idaho and eastern Washington.
Applications forms are available from Idaho and Washington county extension agents and vocational agriculture teachers, Soil Conservation Services district offices and USFS ranger stations in both states. They must be returned to local SCS district offices by May 22.
The Inland Empire Natural Resources Youth Camp is sponsored by Cooperative Extension Services of the University of Idaho and Washington State University, the Society for Range Management, the Society of American Foresters and the Soil Conservation Society of America.

KHS Girls Track Team Placed 3rd at District Meet

Two Kendrick relays, the Medley and 880 qualified for the regionals. Melva Gibbons anchored both teams, and she turned in excellent legs. The Medley time was 2:07 was good for second, while the 880 squad turned in a 1:55 for 3rd.
In the boys' meet, Bill Reid took 4th in the shot, and Richard Silflow 6th in the 100.

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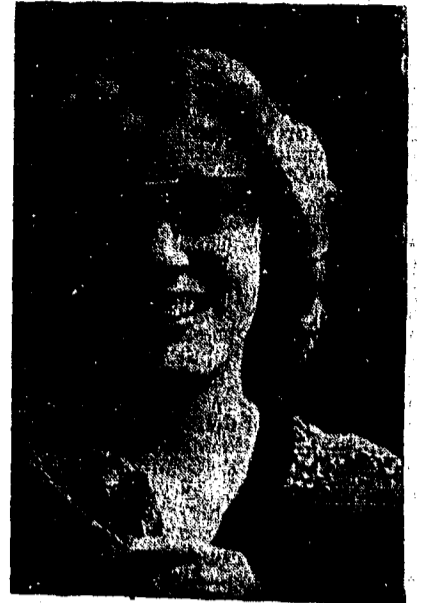
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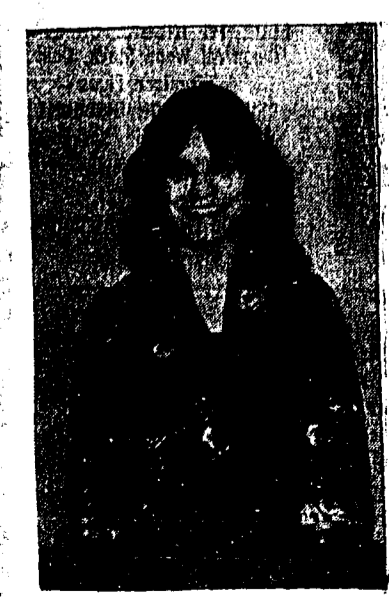
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Parents Play Important Role in Education

Reston (VA) Education is every one's business, but there's a special role for parents.

Education has been called the cornerstone of democracy and schools have a tremendous responsibility to help students develop the skills they will need to succeed as adults. That job can be done best if schools and parents work together. Parents can lay the foundation for their young child to have a successful school experience.

Here are nine tips:

- Help young children learn and use simple words. It's amazing how much vocabulary a 3-year-old can develop if given support. Identify familiar for children with their names. The sooner young children can communicate simple words and concepts, the sooner they can move to more difficult learning.
- Turn on television programs that teach. There are many that help young children learn to count, the alphabet, and even simple words.
- Listen to young children. This requires patience, but it also encourages youngsters to develop speaking skills.
- Read to children. Reading is so important to education, and parents can emphasize that importance by reading regularly to young children. It will also help them recognize letters and words.
- Take the family on trips that have educational value. Going to the zoo or to a museum can reinforce lessons taught at school. And it's fun for the family.
- Praise children for their success in school. Parents' feelings are important to their children. Students should understand that parents think it's as important to score well on a spelling test as it is to keep their room clean.
- Set aside 20 minutes each weekend when everyone in your home reads. Students will understand that reading is important if parents demonstrate that by their example. And keep plenty of reading materials around your home.
- Establish a quiet place for study in your home. Pollsters tell us that Americans have watched 18,000 hrs. of television by the time they reach 18 years of age. This compares to 15,000 hours in school. In front of the television is not the best place to do homework. Give your youngster a chance to absorb his or her lessons.

Let your youngster know that you believe education is important. Parents can do this by taking an interest in what their students are doing in school, by asking questions about what happens in the class and about school projects. They can also do this by attending school events such as back-to-school nights and open houses. Joining school support groups, such as music booster or PTAS, indicate the value you place on education.

The greater the cooperation between school and home, the better the learning experience for students. Working together we can provide the best possible education for students.

'UNSOLVABLE' TAX PROBLEM TACKLED BY IRS OFFICE

Taxpayers with an "unsolvable" federal tax problem should be aware that the Internal Revenue Service has a special office just to help them. It's called the Problem Resolution Program (PRP) office and it's designed to give personal attention to

taxpayers when previous contact through normal IRS channels hasn't helped, the IRS said.

For example, if a taxpayer's expected refund hasn't arrived after about 10 weeks, he or she should first contact IRS Taxpayer Service with the problem. If a few weeks after that initial contact, the refund still hasn't arrived, the taxpayer should contact the PRP office.

Once PRP takes the problem, the taxpayer usually deals with one person and is kept informed of the progress of the case.

District Director Frank R. Berria said the most common cases brought to Problem Resolution are complaints about missing refunds. Sometimes these are caused by incorrect or duplicated Social Security numbers, the IRS said, or by taxpayers who change their names (after marrying, for example) and fail to inform the Social Security Administration or the IRS.

Taxpayers who move after filing a return without providing a forwarding address may also lose their refunds.

Berria stressed that PRP is not a substitute for normal IRS channels. The PRP office usually takes complaints only after normal processing time and there have been two or more unsuccessful contacts with the IRS. PRP cannot change technical

decisions or interfere with an audit.

Taxpayers can reach the PRP office by either writing to their IRS district office or calling the IRS assistance number 1-800-632-5990 (339-1010 in Boise) and asking for Problem Resolution.
