"Is there enough interest among the patrons of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District about purchasing a replacement vehicle for the old pumper trucks for the directors to make further inquiries?" That's what Jerry Johnson, Phil Hermann and Ralph Blenbergh would like to find out in the next few weeks.

Another matter of concern is the increasing cost of maintenance the 30-year-old truck is requiring to keep it in operational condition. This is a condition that will not improve or even remain stable. The directors have roughly estimated that the cost of a vehicle such as type suggested would be between 25 and 30 thousand dollars and would require an extra tax levy. Seventy-five percent of the district is in Latah County and 25 percent in Nez Perce County.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWO, SECTION TWO, BY REMOVING THE TERM BUILDING PERMIT AND THE DEFINITION THEREOF AND BY ADDING THE TERM ZONING PERMIT AND PROVIDING A DEFINITION THEREOF; AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER EIGHT, SECTIONS ONE (H) AND FIVE (B) BY REMOVING THE WORD BUILDING AND REPLACING IT WITH THE WORD ZONING; AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER TWELVE, SECTION TEN BY REMOVING THE WORD BUILDING AND REPLACING IT WITH THE WORD ZONING, AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FOURTEEN, SECTION TWO (A) BY PROVIDING THAT NO BUILDING OR STRUCTURE SHALL BE ERRECTED, ADDED TO, OR STRUCTURALLY ALTERED UNLESS A ZONING PERMIT HAS BEEN ISSUED AND BY PROVIDING FOR AN APPLICATION AND FEE FOR A ZONING PERMIT; AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FOURTEEN, SECTION TWO (B) BY PROVIDING THAT THE APPLICANT SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR LOCATING AND ESTABLISHING ALL PROPERTY LINES TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE ADMINISTRATOR AND THAT THE ADMINISTRATOR MAY OBTAIN THE ADVICE OF THE COUNCIL AND MAY REQUIRE A SURVEY; AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FOURTEEN, SECTION SIX BY REMOVING THE WORD BUILDING AND REPLACING IT WITH THE WORD ZONING; AMENDING TITLE TEN, CHAPTER FIFTEEN, SECTION TWO BY REMOVING THEREFROM THE PROCEDURE FOR APPEALING A DECISION OF THE ADMINISTRATOR TO THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT; CREATING A NEW SECTION THREE, CHAPTER FIFTEEN, TITLE TEN, PROVIDING FOR AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT A DENIAL OF A ZONING PERMIT BY THE ADMINISTRATOR WITHIN FIFTEEN (15) DAYS AND PROVIDING THAT THE NOTICE OF APPEAL MUST BE IN WRITING, ACCOMPANIED BY A FEE AND STATE THE BASIS OF THE APPEAL, PROVIDING FOR NOTICE HEARING AND A DECISION BY THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT AND LIMITING THE MATTERS TO BE CONSIDERED AT THE HEARING; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 1. That Section 10-2-2 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by removing therefrom the term "Building Permit" and the definition thereof immediately following said term.

SECTION 2. That Section 10-2-2 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by adding at the end of said Section 10-2 the following:  
**ZONING PERMIT:** A permit issued by the Administrator authorizing the construction, erection, remodeling, movement, structural alteration or similar work on a building or structure when such work is not in violation of any provision of this Title or other applicable ordinances and regulations of the City of Genesee.

SECTION 3. That Section 10-8-1 (H) of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by removing therefrom the word "building" and placing in its stead the word "zoning."

SECTION 4. That Section 10-8-5 (B) of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by removing therefrom the word "building" and placing in its stead the word "zoning."

SECTION 5. That Section 10-12-10 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by removing therefrom the word "building" and placing in its stead the word "zoning."

SECTION 6. That Section 10-14-2 (A) and (B) of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby are, amended to read as follows:  
**A. ZONING PERMIT.** No building or structure shall be erected, added to or structurally altered unless a Zoning Permit has been issued by the Administrator or his authorized representative. Any person desiring to obtain such a permit shall file with the Administrator a Zoning Permit Application describing fully the premises whereon such work is proposed and setting out in detail the location of all such proposed work on the premises. The fee for a Zoning Permit shall be as specified under the schedule of fees adopted by the City of Genesee.  
**B. RESPONSIBILITY OF APPLICANT.** It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to locate and establish all property lines to the reasonable satisfaction of the Administrator. The Administrator may obtain the advice of the Council regarding the location and establishment of property lines and may require a survey of the premises.

SECTION 7. That Section 10-14-6 (A) of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended by removing therefrom the word "building" and placing in its stead the word "zoning."

SECTION 8. That Section 10-15-2 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:  
**POWERS OF THE BOARD.** The board hear and decide appeals from any decision or requirement made by the Administrator. Every decision made by the Board shall be based upon findings of fact and must be supported in the records of the Board.

SECTION 9. That Section 10-15-3 of the City of Genesee read as follows:  
**APPEAL PROCEDURE.** Any person denied a Zoning Permit under this title shall have the right to appeal within fifteen (15) days after being notified of the action of the Administrator.  
 The Notice of Appeal must be in writing and filed with the Administrator and must be accompanied by a fee adopted by the City of Genesee. The Notice of Appeal shall state specifically the basis of the appeal. As soon as practicable after receiving the Notice of Appeal, the Board shall fix a date, time and place for hearing the appeal by the Board.  
 Written notice of the time and place of the hearing shall be given at least fifteen (15) days prior to the date of the hearing to each appellant. The Board must render a decision within thirty (30) days of the date of the hearing.  
 Only those matters or issues specified by the Notice of Appeal shall be considered in the hearing of the appeal.

SECTION 10. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publications as required by law of the State of Idaho.

**FIVE HUNTING FATALITIES RECORDED FOR 1980**  
 Hunting accidents caused five fatalities and injured 10 persons in Idaho last year, according to reports compiled by the Department of Fish and Game.

The toll compares to six fatalities and 10 injuries in 1979. The safest hunting year in the department's 26 years of record-keeping was 1978, when 4 deaths and 11 injuries were listed.

The worst year for fatalities was 1960, when 17 were recorded.

The reports also describe the cause of the accidents. In 1979, four victims were hit while they were removing or placing a gun in a vehicle or boat. Two persons were mistaken for game and another two accidents occurred when firearms fell from insecure rests.

Other mishaps were the result of a victim covered by a shooter swinging on game and a victim out of sight of a shooter.

One accident was caused when an individual stumbled or fell and another took place while a person was riding in a vehicle with a loaded gun. Three accidents were listed as "other" or "unknown."

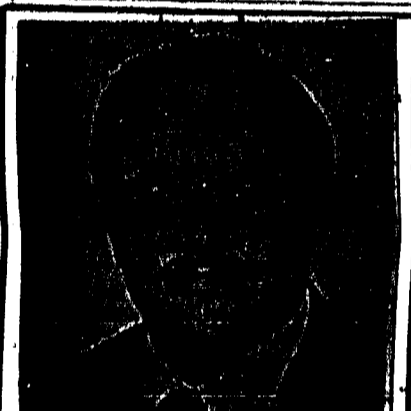

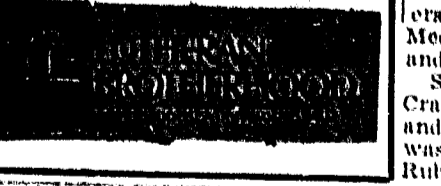

### Idaho Mushroom Fatality Record Clean

Moscow There has not been a fatality to the consumption of mushrooms in Idaho but the existence of toxic mushrooms in the state makes a death a continuing threat, according to a University of Idaho professor of botany. Dr. Edmund Tytlutki, author of a book on mushrooms in Idaho and the Pacific Northwest said the cautious attitude of most people towards mushrooms and the lack of highly toxic mushrooms has probably contributed to Idaho's clean record.

"There are a good number of very toxic mushrooms in deciduous forests and not in our predominantly coniferous forests," he said. "The deadly amanitas are not found here." The prime spring mushroom gathering season will begin in many parts of Idaho this month as snowpacks melt. The fall mushroom season usually starts after autumn rains begin, although mushrooms can be found virtually the year round in forests, lawns, golf courses. More than 2,500 species of mushrooms are found in Idaho, some appearing only every 5 or 10 years.

Although there have been no reports of deaths, there are reports annually of mushroom poisonings. Those ailments can occur almost spontaneously after a person eats toxic mushrooms or can spring up as much as 2 or 3 days later. Tytlutki said the toxins have different effects on humans. Some toxins will affect the liver and kidney, while others affect the nervous system or the gastrointestinal system. Some mushrooms may be poisonous only to some people and not cause any side affects to others. Mushrooms that aren't poisonous to animals such as deer and rabbits may be poisonous to people who do not have the enzymes to handle them.

"Mushrooms are not really toxic until you eat them," said Tytlutki. Mushrooms found outside Idaho have been known to cause skin irritations. Experts are not always certain if a mushroom has toxins or not. "We have a large number of fungi that we believe have toxins, but we don't seem to have any people who want to test these things out," said Tytlutki. He suggests that amateur gatherers be absolutely certain of an identification before they attempt to eat a mushroom that they've found. The first time they eat one of the mushrooms, they should eat only a fragment to that the possibility of serious poisoning is reduced. "Usually it turns out they ate it all so we don't get a sample," Tytlutki said of known poisonings. That makes it difficult for physicians who should be called immediately after a poisoning, to select the proper treatment or antidote for scientists to continue research on mushrooms.

Amateur mycologists should also not eat mushrooms infested by larvae and should be careful about eating mushrooms in immature or "button" stages as many species are hard to differentiate at that stage. Mycologists should also learn to recognize the amanita variety of mushroom and to stay away from it, said Tytlutki. Although they are not a conspicuous part of the Idaho flora, they are frequently poisonous. Mycologists recommend categorically avoiding all amanita species. People should also thoroughly cook mushrooms before eating them, he said.
