Genesee Approves M & O Levy; Rejects **Plant Facility Issue**

Genesee voters gave approval for a maintenance and operation levy for Joint School District No. 282 Tuesday afternoon but failed to muster enough support to pass a 10-year plant facility levy of \$50,000 by the required two-thirds majority.

The maintenance and operation

levy of \$50,000.00 was approved by a vote of 176 in favor with 148 op-posed. A simple majority was all that was required to pass this over-ride issue. The money is marked for an addition to the vocational agriculture building, replacement of the district van and supplementing other district funds for purchase of equipment and supplies

The plant facilities levy was favored by 167 voters in the district, but opposed by 157; this is far short of the necessary two-thirds required to pass an issue such as this. The money would have been used to improve the actual physical facilities Proclaimed by Mayor of the school.

In other voting Tuesday, Jack Spangler was returned for another term of three years as Trustee from zone 4 with 64 votes and Glen Baumgartner was returned for a similar term from zone 2 with 55 votes. Neither had opposition on the ballot.







Although there have been no reports of deaths, there are reports annually of mushroom poisonings. Those ailments can occur almost spontaneously after a person eats toxic mushrooms or can spring up

as much as 2 or 3 days later. Tylutki said the toxins have different effects on humans. Some toxins will affect the liver and kidney, while others affect the nervous systems or the gastrointestinal system. Some mushrooms may be poisonous only to some people and not cause any side affects to others. Mushrooms that aren't poisonous to animals such as deer and rabbits may be poisonous to people who do not have the enzymes to handle them.

'Mushrooms are not really toxic until you eat them," said Tyluki. Mushrooms found outside Idaho have been known to cause skin irritations. Experts are not always certain if a mushroom has toxins or not.

"We have a large number of fungi that we believe have toxins, but we don't seem to have any people who want to test these hings out," said

He suggest that amateur gatherers be absolutely certain of an identification before they attempt to eat a mushrooms that they've found. The first time they eat one of the mushrooms, they should eat only a fragment to that the possibility of serious poisoning is reduced.
"Usually it turns out they ate it all
