The proof of immunization shall be a statement which gives the month, day and year of the immunization. The required immunizations are:

DPT-4 or more Polio: 4 or more Measles: 1 given after the child is 12 months of age

Mumps: 1 givens after the child is 12 months o age Rubella: 1 given after the child is

12 months of age Exceptions are available for personal, religious or health reasons. Parents may sign an exemption form
