## Winter Peas and Other Crops Spotlighted at UI Field Day

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor Grangeville—Research aimed at making Austrian winter pea production more profitable in northern Idaho will be on display July 7 at the UI agricultural field day near Grangeville. The field day will begin at 1 p. m. at the university's research plots four miles west of Grangeville adjacent to Highway 95.

University of Idaho researchers will report on attempts to increase the profitability of winter peas thru the development of improved cultural practices and through the breeding of high-yielding, winter-hardy varieties.

Chickpeas, a promising new crop for Idaho, will be viewed on the tour of the research plots. Visitors also will see variety trials of safflowers, wheat, barley spring peas and lentils.

Richard Ohms, UI extension crop management specialist, will explain trials of new varieties of spring barley. Clarence Peterson, Washington State University agronomist will comment on winter wheat variety trials.

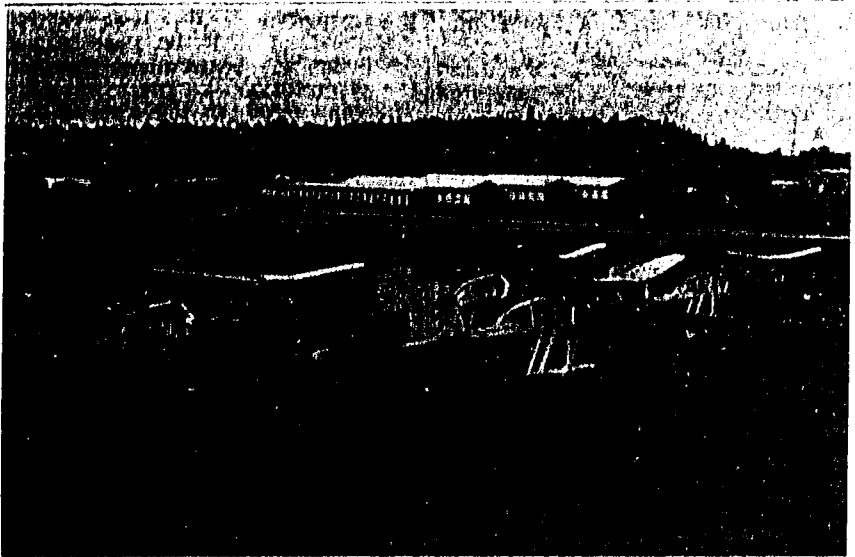

**Elk Season Correction Noted, For Northern Idaho Unit**  
 There will be 7 days of either-sex elk hunting in management unit 1 this year, even though the season was omitted in the Department of Fish and Game general regulations. Antlered elk only can be hunted in unit 1 from September 25 through October 4 as the regulations show, but the either-sex portion of the hunt, from October 5 through October 11, should be added.  
 And the general deer season in unit 1 should be corrected to read "November 4—December 6, either Sex."  
 There are two other corrections to be noted. The registration failed to include the general archery season for either sex deer and elk hunting in unit 32A, but bowmen can hunt both species from September 5 thru September 27.  
 Also under the regulation for predatory animals, some of the printed copies have been corrected, however, to designate the gray wolf—not the gray fox—as endangered.

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**Moscow Field Day Focuses on Agronomy & Horticulture**  
 Clifton Anderson  
 Associate Agricultural Editor  
 Moscow—New varieties of grain, winter peas and oilseed crops will be featured on the July 8 agronomy tour at the UI Plant Science Farm. The plant is located 1 1/2 miles east of the Moscow Mall on the Troy highway.  
 Also scheduled is a horticulture tour, reviewing UI research work with vegetables, turfgrass, ornamental shrubs and windbreaks.  
 Horticulture researcher Colin Norton will demonstrate the planting of pre-germinated seed. In his research Norton has found it is practical to plant sprouted seeds of tomatoes and other high-value crops. To avoid injuring the sprouts, he places the seeds in a gel mixture.  
 The July 8 field day begins at 10:30 a. m. with exhibits of farm machinery and equipment. Implement dealers will be displaying their new models.  
 Max Hanson, director of the Idaho Department of Agriculture will be the featured speaker at a luncheon barbeque at 12:30.  
 The agronomy and horticulture tour will begin at 1:30 p. m. The agronomy tour will survey weed and insect control as well as new variety trials. Researchers will report on a program to develop an improved selection of Idaho fescue and a study of the treatment of acid soils.  
 On Tuesday afternoon, July 7, the UI College of Agriculture will host a field day at its research plots near Grangeville. Farmers and other interested persons are invited to participate in the two field days.

**Summer School Enrollment At UI Nears 2,000 Students**  
 Moscow—A strong summer session enrollment at the UI is approaching 2,000 students two weeks after the official start of classes, despite an increase in fees.  
 "I think we're as good or maybe a little bit better than last year," said UI Registrar Matt Tolin.  
 He said enrollment on the Moscow campus totalled 1,970 students thru June 19 with an additional 198 enrolled in courses at Coeur d'Alene graduate centers. That's a total of 1,874.  
 A recent change in fee structure has put all fees on a per credit hour rate, which means resident undergraduates are charged \$27 per credit hour non resident undergraduates \$32 and graduates students \$34. Last summer an undergraduate could take up to 10 credit hours for \$136 as opposed to \$270 this summer.  
 Tolin said he and Summer Session Director Paul Kaus agree that there is no evidence the change in fee structure has affected enrollment.  
 Last summer 2,203 students enrolled at the UI and enrollment this summer is climbing towards that level.  
 "We're registering students every day," said Tolin. Many summer classes, workshops and institutes do not start with the first day of classes, so unlike the start of the fall and summer semester, registration takes place daily.  
 About 70 percent of the students enrolled this summer attended classes during the spring semester at the UI. Tolin said 10 years ago many of those attending the summer session were teachers, but in the past few years the trend has been that many students during the regular school years continue in the summer.  
 Just under 1,100 summer session students are undergraduates, he added.

**Controlled Hunt Applications Can Help Reward Fund**  
 Those who fail to draw a controlled hunt permit this year have an opportunity to come out a winner in another way by supporting Citizens Against Poaching.  
 Should they designate part or all of any refund for CAP, they can help in a citizen campaign against illegal hunting and fishing and improve the odds for hunters and anglers who

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obey the law said Dennis Gratton, Boise, president of the organization.  
 Each application card has a check-off box for CAP and any contribution indicated will be recorded and deducted from the refund to an ineligible or unsuccessful applicant, he explained.  
 "The latest reward paid was \$250 which was offered to a CAP caller for information that resulted in a citation for illegally killing big game," Gratton said. A toll-free number, 1-800-632-5999 is available to anyone who wishes to report illegal fish and game activity.  
 "CAP has paid \$1,350 in rewards during the first 6 months of 1981," Gratton added. "We need a steady flow of contributions which are tax deductible—to keep the reward fund stable."  
 Deadline for controlled hunt applications is 5 p. m., June 30, if they are delivered to the Department of Fish and Game headquarters office.

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**Idaho Recreation Sites Listed In UI Guide**

Moscow — Learning doesn't stop after the final school bell rings in June. It just moves outdoors, and a new book published by the University of Idaho's College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences may be able to add something to environmental education.

Also useful in planning vacations are 100 self-guiding nature trails, visitor centers, wildlife observation areas and environmental education camps. Some historical sites are also included. "People, natural resources and a rich, colorful history are three of the greatest attributes bestowed upon our State of Idaho," say authors James Pazio a UI wildland recreation management professor, and Diane Spott. "But as we grow, so does the danger that the charm of ignorance and unappreciation will separate the three, much as it has in some of our more populous states."

There is at least one nature education site in most of Idaho's counties according to the book. Also useful for planning vacations the guidebook includes a summary listing support facilities such as drinking water, picnic sites, restrooms and handicapped aids. It includes both publicly- and privately-owned sites throughout the state.

"The key elements of environmental education are that it is problem-oriented, is strongly interdisciplinary in understanding and attacking the problems and includes the aims of social values and functions that affect our natural and manmade environment," the authors say.

Environmental education programs in 4 school districts and at the UI are also described in the book which is available for \$3 from Editorial office, College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences UI, Moscow, Id. 83843.

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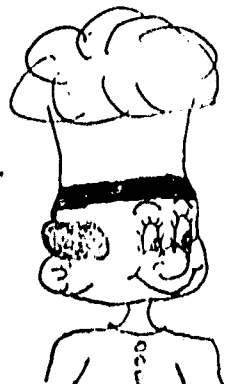
