Lentil Crop Under Attack by Aphids

Moscow—University of Idaho entomologist Larry O'Keefe reports a large build-up of aphid populations in lentil fields throughout northern Idaho and eastern Washington.

"This year's aphid population explosion has the potential for reducing lentil yields drastically. The cool, wet weather has been ideal for aphid development. As for the predators that are the aphid's natural enemies, their numbers are way down—maybe as a result of the Mount St. Helen's eruption a year ago," O'Keefe said.

When samples are taken to assess aphid populations in blooming lentil fields this year, counts of 30 to 60 aphids per sweep are common, O'Keefe said.

"Normally, we expect to capture only a few aphids per sweep this time of year. We're finding the normal levels of aphids at some locations this year, but for the most part there will be 30 to 60 aphids per sweep. Occasionally, the count is as high as 200 aphids per sweep," he said.

Growers have to "watch-and-see" attitude regarding the aphid infestation, O'Keefe said. When spraying is done to protect lentil fields, malathion and parathion are the chemicals used.

Unfortunately, no one knows how to tell for sure when spraying lentils is economically justified. Research is needed to identify an economic injury level in lentils. Then we'd have a "trigger"—a count of aphids at a certain development stage of the lentil that would indicate when treatment was needed," the University of Idaho scientist said.

Lentils are susceptible to injury from aphids during bloom, pod set and later. This year, pea aphids appear to be the major threat, but cowpea aphids also are present, often in lower population levels, at most locations.

Ladybug beetles and syrphid flies are the principal predators of aphids in the Palouse. Their numbers are down this year, probably as a result of the disruptions insect populations in the area suffered after the May 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens.

"Predator and parasite populations could develop and provide control in some fields. However, chemical control decisions will need to be made on a field-to-field basis," O'Keefe said.

American Geography In Jeopardy?

Moscow - American geographers need to map a new direction for themselves, according to the president of the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers.

David Lantis, a professor at California State University at Chico, said commitment in geography courses at U. S. universities declined from 743,000 in 1970 to 530,000 in 1980. At the same time, membership in historical societies grew dramatically, as did interest in regional authors such as Willa Cather who specialize in historic periods.

"Should not the future and present be more interesting than the past," asked Lantis during a presidential address to the APGG's 44th annual conference Tuesday night in Moscow. Sponsored by the University of Idaho's College of Mines and Earth Resources, the conference continues through Friday at Cavanaugh's Motor Inn.

Lantis, who has written a book on California geography and titled his comments, "American Geography: A Discipline in Jeopardy?" said there has been no complete geography written about the United States, or for most states and counties. "We have ignored the people who live in

There are not enough geography teachers at the college and university level, he continued. They tend not to have enough training and are scattered too widely. Some geographers also spend too much time dealing with trivia.

Lantis presented more than 200 slides in Alaska and its changing geography to the conference's annual banquet. He said there is a decline in the number of farming areas in south central Alaska where he said Alaska's future seems to be.

He also said that many people move to Alaska because they have a spirit of adventure, are hoping to get rich, want to escape civilization, answer the call of the wild, and for other reasons.

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Fat? Hypertension? The Two May Go Together

How much more do you weigh now than you did when you were 18? How much has your blood pressure reading risen in recent years? The two things may be related.

May Morton, Fort Collins, Colo., told participants in a Public Utilities Executives Conference under way at the University of Idaho that "as body fat increases, disease problems increase" for both men and women.

He said that taking a body fat percentage estimate, subtracting 15 percent for men and 20 percent for women, leaves the percent of excess of body fat. This percentage of an individual's present weight gives pounds of excess body fat which can then be subtracted from the present weight. The resultant figure, plus or minus 10 pounds should be close to the same as the individual weighed at age 18 unless he or she was significantly overweight then.

Morton told the executives that as "body fat increases, there is an increase in disease factors, high blood pressure, high blood lipids, an increase in heart disease and there is now some evidence that perhaps cancer enters into that, too."

He emphasized that the body fat percentage figures he uses are estimates. "We do know that for most people, what they weighed at age 18 is probably pretty close to their ideal body weight unless they were obese or overly fat."

"There is no such thing as a little hypertension," he said, "you are either hypertensive or you aren't."

When a person has a blood pressure reading, he said, there are two numbers given, a high one and a low one. The low number is the one the heart has to work against to push blood through the arteries each time it beats. If this number becomes too high, the heart is overworked and can be damaged fairly rapidly, he noted.

He said that blood pressure reading taken immediately after exercise should show an increase in the high number but the low one should remain constant.

High blood pressure also causes plaque, a fatty substance, to be deposited more rapidly in arteries, restricting blood flow or resulting in clots which may break free and travel through the circulatory system to cause problems elsewhere in the body.

In discussing exercise, Morton said he recommends regular rhythmic exercise to condition the heart and keep it healthy. He said 3 sessions a week will maintain a level of conditioning, four will increase it slowly and some slight additional benefit may be gained from a fifth session.

"Give yourself a two-day exercise vacation each week," he said, "there are no benefits from a six- to seven-day program over a five-day one." he said in order to benefit, an exercise heart rate must be maintained for 30 to 40 minutes.

In order to calculate a beneficial heart rate, he told the conference participants to subtract their age from 220, multiply the result by .9 for a maximum rate which should not be exceeded by .7 for a minimum which must be reached or exceeded for benefit. A person's heart rate decreases with age, he said and the reason is not known.

In order to check the heart rate, he said to count the pulse for six seconds only and multiply by 10.

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Trees Need Watering Now, UI Forester Says

Moscow—With a wet June behind us, it's time for homeowners who include trees in their landscaping scheme to take over where nature left off.

How often to water depends heavily on soil type, with trees planted in sandier soils requiring more frequent irrigation, says Donald Hanley, UI Cooperative Extension Service forester. Regardless of soil type, water your trees deeply rather than lightly, but don't overdo it, Hanley says. If you can squeeze water from the soil by hand, you've oversaturated it.

Apply 1 to 2 gallons of water to your seedling trees about every five days during its first two growing seasons. Your established trees need to be irrigated about once a week.

Hanley says you should allow soil to dry between waterings to prevent root rot, particularly if it is a tight clay or is underlain with hardpan.

Relying on sprinkling your lawn to take care of your trees' moisture needs is not a safe bet, Hanley says. Because tree roots run deeper, they need additional water.

Ideally, you should encircle your trees with mounds of soil 3 to 4 ft. in diameter to hold water until it can soak down and saturate the roots. Trickle—don't pour—water into these mounds or tree walls for two or three hours until the root zone is deeply saturated.

Keeping these walls weed-free ensures that they will do the best job for your trees. Not only do tree wells aid in watering, but they protect the tree's bark from lawn mower damage.

Hanley says you should water older deciduous trees beginning now through leaf fall. Start watering your evergreens now, too, but taper off towards the end of August to allow the trees to go dormant and set buds. Once the evergreen buds are set—about the middle of September—until the soil freezes, you should water to minimize winter burn.

Hanley says newly planted evergreens should be misted in the early morning or late afternoon at frequent intervals. This will minimize the possibility of spider mite damage to the needles.

He notes that trees near the south west side of the buildings—especially white or brick structures—need much more water than those standing in the open because of the heat

"The rate declines very rapidly once the exercise is stopped and counting a longer time will introduce an error because of this."

He said swimming, walking, running, jogging, bicycle riding, and similar activities are all good forms of conditioning exercise. He warned the executives not to consider a weight-lifting program alone adequate exercise. "Three of 10 heavy-weight lifters have high blood pressure, compared to one of 10 people on the street," he said.

For those who are obese or have a joint problem, he recommends swimming and bicycling to begin a program, noting that walking is also good. "Running, jogging and rope jumping are just too painful," he said.

Morton also said to consider the exercise environment. Exercise or physical activity in conditions of cold or heat must be considered in clothing selection. He also warned against vigorous exercise in direct hot sun. "Find some shade or wait until the cool part of the day," he said. When you're tired, stop and rest. This isn't a contest.

For those who do need to lose weight, he recommended seeking a plan that produces a steady one- to two-pound per month weight loss. "Taking it off slowly produces the best results in terms of keeping it off," he said.

"We can't guarantee you more years of life, but we can guarantee more life in your years" he said.

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Farming Most Hazardous Occupation Nationally, UI Safety Specialist Says

Moscow—A preliminary report released by the National Safety Council on the eve of the 38th annual National Farm Safety Week shows that agriculture was 1980's most hazardous industry nationwide. In Idaho, it ranked No. 2 for the 2nd year in a row.

According to the NSC report, about 1900 of the 13,000 work-related deaths occurring in 1980 were due to agricultural accidents. Farm workers suffered 61 deaths per 100,000 workers compared with 13 per 100,000 for all industries. Another 100,000 agricultural workers were disabled in 1980.

While in 1980 agricultural death rate was 13 percent higher than 1979's, it was 12 percent below 1970's.

Governor John Evans has proclaimed July 25-31 Idaho Farm Safety Week.

Statistics compiled by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare show 11 agriculture-related deaths occurring in Idaho in the 1980 calendar year.

According to Thomas Karsky, UI Cooperative Extension Service safety specialist, tractors figured in 8 of the 17 farm deaths reported in Idaho newspapers between June of 1980 and June 1981. Three of those deaths were caused by overturns.

Another three persons were electrocuted when power lines contacted irrigation pipe. Hay mowers, grain augers, post-hole diggers, potato conveyors and sliding hay bales were involved in still other deaths.

Karsky noted that almost half of Idaho's farm deaths occurred among persons 16 years old or younger, with three fatalities among 4- to 6-year-old boys.

Karsky, who returned recently from the National Institute for Farm Safety meetings in Rock Island, Ill., suggested that other industries have lower death rates than farming because they are subjected to stricter governmental safety regulations and more control over the working environment.

"Many farmers still use equipment that is over 20 years old," said Karsky. "We're designing safer farm equipment today, but it will take several years before it is widely used on the farm."

Karsky reminded agricultural workers that while National Farm Safety Week lasts only 7 days farm safety should be practiced 365 days a year.

New Members Added To Kayak Patrol

The Department of Fish and Game has added some backup strength to its Kayak Patrol, a group that specializes in conservation enforcement in remote areas.

Five days of training, including about 30 hours in the boats produced some kayakers who are "definitely

ly above the novice category," according to their instructor, Stacy Gebhardt.

Gebhardt, fisheries bureau chief and a licensed kayak guide and instructor, trained the first patrol members last year after his project received official approval.

In making his proposal, Gebhardt

pointed out that Idaho has about 1,000 miles of stream water special fishing regulations to protect and enhance wild trout fisheries.

Fishing in those waters has produced more and larger trout but it also has added to the temptation to ignore regulations, particularly on wilderness rivers like the Selway, Middle Fork Salmon and the Snake in Hell Canyon National Monument.

Kayakers are ideally suited for such

water and the highly mobile patrol is available where needed. Each boat can carry enough gear and supplies for periods of as long as five days.

Gebhardt started this year's class on that water, where they learned paddling skills and basic maneuvers, including the Eskimo roll that returns the kayaker to an upright position from a head-down dunking.

They polished their skills on fast-

er waters and ended up with a run down a "Class 3" river with strong currents and waves as high as five feet.

"Any of the new kayakers could run a more difficult Class 4 river, such as the Selway, if he were accompanied by one of our experienced boaters," Gebhardt said.

A camera crew from Glen Lau Productions filmed the training ses-

sions for possible use in the weekly "Western Outdoorsman" television program.
