### Residential Construction Remains Weak Says Bank Newsletter

Residential construction activity in Idaho remained exceptionally weak in June, while nonresidential or commercial construction valuation increased, said James Hoogland, Jr., and Roselee Robinson, managers, quoting the June Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, will be distributed this week.

During the entire month of June, there were 16 residential building permits issued in Boise, five residential permits in Pocatello, and one in Idaho Falls. The major nonresidential construction projects were centered in Boise, Ada County and Idaho Falls.

Mortgage rates for residential construction remain generally above 16 percent and the near-term outlook does not suggest any significant improvement. Variable-rate mortgage programs are now being developed which will provide an additional source of mortgage credit.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in June was \$36,065 or 6.7 percent above 1981. New residential construction for 265 dwelling units totaled \$13,353,447, a decrease of 48.6 percent in number and a decrease of 25.3 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$12,428,593 was up 36.9 percent from last year while alterations and repairs totaling \$11,072,025 were up 45.9 percent.

### Rev. Thomas A. McCurdy Installed As New Pastor Of Genesee Lutheran Parish

Rev. Thomas A. McCurdy will be installed as pastor of St. John's and Genesee Valley Lutheran Churches on Sunday, July 26 at 9:00 a. m. at the Genesee Valley Church. Rev. Richard Nieman, assistant to the Bishop of the North Pacific District will officiate at the installation, assisted by Rev. Carl Carlson, interim pastor of the parish.

Pastor McCurdy was born in New Castle, Pennsylvania, on December 16, 1943 and attended schools in New Wilmington, Pa. He holds an associate degree from Penn Technical Institute, a Bachelor's degree from Capitol University and a Masters of Divinity from Trinity Seminary, both of Columbus, Ohio. His seminary training also included a Ministry-in-Context study, and a 2-year internship served at Grace Lutheran Church in Columbus. He was ordained June 21st at Christ Lutheran Church, Columbus, Ohio.

On Feb. 14, 1964 Tom married DeLores Boyer. They are parents of two daughters, Wendie, 13, who will be in the 8th grade, and Kristen 11, who will be in the 6th.

McCurdy worked for Bell Telephone Laboratories for 11 years before entering the seminary and during this time he secured a joint United States Patent on a switching apparatus. He was also listed in Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities while a student at Capitol University.

### Vera Ameling Howell, 73, Passes In California

Mrs. Nell Crocker received word on Sunday that her sister, Vera Ameling Howell, of San Diego, Calif., had died that morning from a massive stroke which she had suffered on July 13th. She was 73 years of age.

Vera Loretta Howell was born January 19, 1908 on American Ridge, one of twin daughters, to Charles and Liddie Ameling. She attended grade school on American Ridge, graduated from high school in Kendrick and from the University of Idaho in the Class of 1929. She was married on August 8, 1930 to Ward K. Howell, after both had taught school at Ferdinand, Idaho the previous year. After spending several years in California, the family lived at LeLand, Craigmont and Bellevue, Idaho where Ward taught school. After going into Red cross work during World War II, they lived at Farragut, Idaho and at Vancouver, Wash. For ten years before Ward's death in March of 1965, they lived in Bremerton, Wash. where he was executive director of the Kilsap Co. Good Neighbor Fund. Mrs. Howell left Bremerton two years ago to live near her sons in San Diego.

Although it had been many years since Vera lived in this area she was well known here and always maintained a great love for her family and many friends here. She will be greatly missed by those who knew and loved her.

Survivors are her three sons: James of Los Angeles, Phillip and Tony of San Diego and two daughters, Gracie Knaeble of Sierra Vista, Arizona and Ardit Heape of St. Louis, Mo.; a sister Nell Crocker of Kendrick; thirteen grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Two sisters, a brother and a grandson preceded her in death.

Private memorial services were held at the home of her son Tony and Kathy Howell, with cremation following and interment at Bremerton, Washington beside her husband.

Teresa Ann Smolt, 91, a Uniontown native and former Clarkston Manor, Seal Beach, California, Friday afternoon, July 17th.

Mrs. Smolt was born at Uniontown June 4, 1890 to John P. and Catherine Wittman. She lived there until 1916. She married Edwin F. Smolt, the son of a pioneer Genesee family, on October 18, 1916, at Uniontown. The couple and his parents operated Smolt's Store at Genesee.



When her husband died in 1937, Mrs. Smolt moved to Lewiston, where she owned and operated two neighborhood grocery stores in the Seventh Avenue and 8th Street area of Normal Hill.

In 1948, she moved to Clarkston, where she lived with and cared for her older brother, William. In 1953, she moved to West Covina, California to help her daughter raise four children after their father died. In the 1960's, she moved back to Clarkston to care for her brother for four years.

When he died she returned to Seal Beach, California to live with her daughter.

She was a graduate of St. Scholastica Academy at Colton and attended Holy Names Academy of Spokane. She was a member of the Catholic Church and St. Mary's Altar Society at Genesee. She was a painter and an accomplished pianist.

Mrs. Smolt is survived by four daughters, Mercedes Roach of Genesee; Nadine Gibson of Madison, Wisconsin; Betty Richards of Seal Beach, California; and Naoma Underwood of Ursina, Pennsylvania; a son, Edwin Smolt of Anaheim, California; 24 grandchildren, and 17 great grandchildren. A son, Clifford, 11 brothers and sisters, and a grandson preceded her in death.

### Weed Control Efforts Still Vitrally Important

Weed control by plane, by machines and by hand still is not keeping weeds under control but every effort is necessary.

Now that winter wheat is in the dough stage, thistles may be sprayed with 1 to 1½ lbs. of 2,4-D per acre and usually stops thistle growth, blooming and seed formation. Some thistle down will form and cause concern but seed does not always mature into a viable condition. Some are using swathers to clip thistles in peas and lentils, spot spraying is showing up too and a few are going to use a wick to catch weeds above lentils especially.

The Latah County Weed Control Department encourages every effort to be placed on the many weeds which are a menace to agriculture and rural living. After harvest, treating in stubble is a good practice to control thistle and morning glory.

### First Grain of Season Arrived In Juliaetta

The first small amounts of the 1981 small grain harvest came into the Juliaetta warehouse of Lewiston Grain Growers Monday, July 20, as warm weather began to hasten the ripening of wheat and barley fields in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area.

Dick and Fred Lohman cut and delivered the first wheat of the season to Juliaetta Monday morning, from their fields west of that town. In the afternoon, Walter Wolf brought in the first of the fall barley. Warehouse employees reported that the grain looked to be of good quality.

While all appearances seem to indicate the harvest this year will be later than last season, Ada Westendahl of the Lewiston Grain Growers warehouse in Kendrick, said Tuesday afternoon that the firm did not receive its first deliveries of grain until July 25 in 1980.

Most warehouses in the lower Palouse and Potlatch Valley were not expecting any grain or peas deliveries until later in the week or the first of next week. Mike Martinez, assistant manager of Genesee Union Warehouse, said Tuesday afternoon that the Genesee coop probably would not be taking in grain or peas until "at least the latter part of the week." Martinez said warehouse records showed the first peas of the season came in July 10, last year.

Dean Brocke, of Brocke and Sons in Kendrick, said he didn't expect to begin taking in seed peas until "the weekend or the first part of next week." Marion Rowden of the Kendrick Roehdale said that firm had not taken any deliveries yet, "we're just getting all ready for them," he said.

### Idaho Among Top 10

In Mallard Duck Harvest Idaho ranks among the top 10 states in the nation in the number of mallard ducks harvested in recent years, according to "Wildfowling," a copyrighted publication distributed by General Ducks, Inc. The newsletter lists the states according to the average number of mallards harvested each year during the past three hunting seasons and Idaho is ninth with 164,722. Arkansas tops the list with 494,697. A comparison of the percentage of mallards in the total state harvest rates Idaho second only to Arkansas with 65 percent. Other western states with mallard harvest in the top 10 include Washington and California.

### Test for Both Heart-Lung Disease

Can you blow out the candles on the birthday cake with one breath? If your answer is no, then beware of heart—as well as lung—disease. This advice comes from the American Lung Association, oldest voluntary health agency in the U. S. The good news is that lung tests can forecast heart problems. One common lung test is for Forced Vital Capacity (FVC)—the amount of air forcibly exhaled after maximum inspiration. If you fail, or get a low FVC, then heart problems may also be in your future.

This new warning is based on a 20-year study of more than 5,000 people in Framingham, MA. Persons who had the lowest scores while puffing into a spirometer (a machine used in lung tests) had the highest cardiovascular death rates. This was true even when there was no other sign of heart or lung disability according to Dr. William B. Kannel of Boston University, overseer of the survey.

For nonsmoking men with no pulmonary disease or history of heart failure—but with very low FVCs—the death rate from cardiovascular disease was 11 per 10,000. This compared to only 3.4 per 10,000 for men with high FVCs.

Mortality statistics for women were lower, but the same ration held true.

Congestive heart failure was closely associated with low FVC. The relationship was "striking at all ages and for both sexes," said Dr. Kannel. He explained: "Even after adjustment for cigarettes and for all the other risk factors, this was the case." Men with low FVCs had 8.2 incidents of cardiac failure per 1,000 while those with better tests had just under 2 per 1,000.

Low FVC "unequivocally the most powerful predictor" of potential heart problems in women and is divided only by high blood pressure in men, said Dr. Kannel. Finally, the data underlined that lung tests are a good way to spot patients without symptoms but with an above average risk of heart and lung disease.



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**Mount St. Helens: Looking for Clues For Next Time**

Moscow—"I liken our experience to death and resurrection," said Jeremy Anderson. "We were literally buried Sunday evening and didn't start digging out until Tuesday."

The eruption of Mount St. Helens on May 18, 1980 surprised most Pacific Northwest residents. The activity of the mountain and of people near it continues to be examined so that "next time" everybody will know what to do.

Anderson, a geography professor at Eastern Washington University; Charles R. Knowles, an associate professor of geochemistry at the UI; William Smith, Moscow City supervisor, and Robert Quinn, a geography professor at Eastern Washington University, each made presentations of the Cascade volcano at the 44th annual conference of the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers meeting here this week.

"The key to understanding our reaction to the mountain is to recognize the ashfall was unanticipated," said Anderson. "We were stressed and immobilized, but not entirely so."

Anderson said after the ashfall on Sunday people began to develop cabin fever Monday, and Tuesday began to come out and start cleaning up. Smith said the reaction towards cleaning up varied in each community.

In Moscow, he said, the city began cleanup operations Sunday evening rounding up volunteers and equipment from wherever they could get it.

"The fact that Northern Idaho is mostly rural and isolated limits what you can do," he added.

Smith said the eruption, whose full impact he did not realize until several days afterwards, is a lesson for local leaders solving major civil defense problems.

The direction of the wind may be an important factor in determining which areas receive ash from a similar eruption again, said Quinn. The winds generally blow east and north of the mountain, but change frequently.

"The course of the May 18 and July 22 eruptions would be what we would expect," said Quinn, but it's not unusual for wind direction to change 30 to 60 degrees in an hour. Another important factor will be the type of weather systems in the area at the time of the eruptions.

**Parents May be Source Of Some Poor Communication Skills**

Moscow—Snap judgments and bad listening habits are two causes of misunderstanding between people, and we often learn these poor communication skills from our primary role models—our parents.

Paul Miles a University of Idaho professor who teaches a course of interpersonal communication, says that when parents raise their voices in arguments or make quick but inaccurate judgments they are reinforcing the same behavior in their children.

"People often have poor interpersonal communication skills because they've been following the wrong model," Miles said. "Learning communication skills is like learning

any other skills. You have to build on them."

Communication skills can be improved by personal observation of oneself, trial and error or by reading books of self-improvement. In his interpersonal communication class, Miles instructs students to increase their own personal awareness, and gives them instruction in relating to others and in how relationships are formulated and dissolved. The students have reading assignments and apply their newly learned skill in role-playing and through out-of-class assignments.

People also make incorrect assumptions to only part of the message, he continued. He stresses that communication skills must be practiced or the tendency will be to slip back into bad habits.

Also, while people can choose their words carefully, they don't always control the accompanying nonverbal communication, or "body language" he added.

"Verbal or nonverbal clues can be misread them. For example you can say 'I love you' to your spouse, but your nonverbal communication may say something else," he said.

When you are unsure of someone's nonverbal message, Miles recommends using a perception check, for example saying, "When I think you are saying is that you're angry with me, am I right?" This will help to avoid unwanted misunderstandings, he said.

Taking a course in interpersonal communication will refresh the memory on good communication skills, but Miles says there must also be the motivation to improve or bad habits will surface again.

Another Black Mark For Alcohol

Alcohol can worsen most respiratory symptoms, according to the American Lung Association. Therefore, if you have a cough or sore throat, forgo the screwdriver and opt for straight orange juice.

Even when a person has no respiratory symptoms, alcohol consumption can have its poor effects and we don't mean hangovers. Alcohol users are more prone to infections, often smoke heavily and inhale more frequently.

Approximately 3,800 persons in Tucson took part in the study reported in a recent issue of the American review of Respiratory Disease, an A.L.A. publication. Trained nurse interviewers administered questionnaires covering such information as respiratory history, alcohol consumption, smoking habits and education.

Only 5.7 percent of the women were heavy drinkers, compared with 20.1 percent of the men.

In the men, alcohol consumption increased consistently with smoking, whereas in women, increased consumption was noted only in present heavy smokers.

## Every 'Crib Death' Is a Tragedy

No disease tragedy is more heart-wrenching than the crib death of an infant. One minute there is life and breath; the next minute the child is lifeless. Known as Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) the anomaly is just one of the pediatric illnesses fought by the American Lung Association. The ALA supports research in search of a cause for SIDS.

Theories about SIDS abound, but no single cause has been discovered. Theories are sometimes labeled "definite maybes."

The newest "definite maybe" is reported to be a liver deficiency of biotin, a member of the vitamin B complex. Two doctors, one from Australia and the other from England, report that thirty-five SIDS victims had significantly lower biotin levels than 169 infants who died of other problems.

These researchers believe biotin insufficiency may leave an infant in a weakened condition where SIDS can be triggered by mild stress—an infection, a missed meal or even excessive heat or cold. Diet supplements might provide the needed biotin, but by no means is biotin insufficiency theory accepted by all scientists studying SIDS.

- Other causes cited are:
  - Suffocation
  - Allergic reaction to cow's milk
  - Metabolic disorders
  - Spasm or closure of the larynx
  - Whatever the cause or causes—medical scientists care and are studying and theorizing over this infant threat which takes the lives of some ten thousand children a year in the U. S.

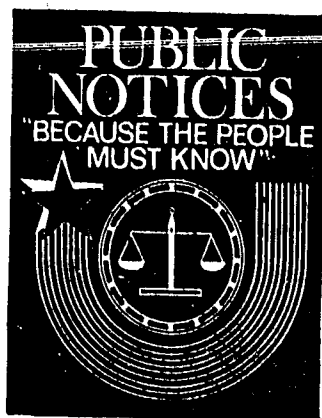

### IDAHO FEEDLOT INVENTORY DECLINES

As of July 1, Idaho feedlots held 213,000 head of cattle and calves being fed for slaughter, according to the Idaho Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This was 20,000 fewer than the number on feed a year earlier. Placements of cattle into feedlots during the April-June quarter numbered 142,000 head, compared with 141,000 during the same period a year ago. Marketings during the quarter totaled 120,000 head a 10 percent decline from 1980. Of those cattle in lots on July 1, an estimated 104,000 will be shipped to market during the July-September quarter. The expected marketings, if realized, will fall 32 percent below the same period in 1980. The July inventory was comprised of 74 percent steers, 23 percent heifers, and 3 percent other classes.

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
