National Wildlife Federation Requests Watts Dismissal Statement by Dr. Jay D. Hair, Executive Vice President,

National Wildlife Federation There is an old Latin proverb that says "patience is the best remedy for every trouble,". This was the posi-tion the National Wildlife Federation took last December when we learned that James G. Watt was going to be named Secretary of In-

We were troubled by Mr. Watt's record as the head of a legal foundation that had spent years fighting against environmental protection laws and regulations. But we decided to be patient

cided to be patient.

We felt, first of all, that as the nation's largest citizens conservation group, we should try to cooperate with the man who was to become steward of the nation's natural resources and custodian of about a fifth of its land, including most of its parks, wildnerness areas and wild life refuges.

As an organization that deals in issues rather than personalities, we held our fire when other environmental groups denounced Secretary Watt. We tried to maintain a dialog with him. We shared the Reagan Administration's desire to cut federal spending—a good conserva-tionist position—and we thought we could wean its Secretary of the Interior away from error through patience and reason.

Today I am here to report that our patience has not been rewarded. In our dealings with the Secretary, including two meetings that I had with him, we have found that he places a much higher priority on development and exploitation than

on conservation.

We have found that while he pays lip service to environmental protection, he is working to undermine or circumvent many of our basic environmental protection laws.

we have found that he is inflexible and unresponsive to ideas and entreaties from the conservation move-

And finally, through a poll of our membership, we have found that Mr. Watt is out of step, not only with the views of conservation leaders who have called on him, but with the mainstream of American thought on conservation issues. He has lost the confidence of Americans who are concerned about our environment and about the conservation of natural resources Mr. Watt was appointed to protect.

And so today we are calling on President Reagan to remove Mr. Watt from his job as Secretary of the Interior.

We waited this long to make this request on grounds that delay is preferable to error. But after 6 months, the evidence of Mr. Watt's unsuitability for the job he holds has become so overwhelming we are convinced that the sooner he is re-lieved of his duties the better it will be for our country and its resources. There is no way, in our judgment that Mr. Hart can be rehabilitated by lecturing him and setting him on a new course. Sad to say, we



New Case of Botulism Demonstrates Need for Careful Home Canning

Moscow With the victim of Idaho's first documented case of botulism since 1977 still in critical condition at St. Alphonsus Hospital in Boise, a food and nutrition specialist with the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service warns home canners to be very careful in preparing fish.

Thomas Marlow, 31, of Ketchun, first reported feeling ill on June 27 after eating home-canned trout prepared by friends. He was hospitalized several days later. On July 3, the Center of Disease Control in Atlanta confirmed that he was suffering from Type A botulism and that samples of the trout contained the toxin.

According to the UI's Marilyn Swanson, the bacterium that causes botulism, Clostridium botulinum, can grow under oxygenless conditions in low-acid foods such as vegetables, meats, poultry and fish. To prevent problems with these low-acid foods, they must be canned in a pressure canner, which allows food to reach the high temperatures (240 degrees Fahrenheit) that will destroy the organisms.

Swanson said fish is a particularly dense food that should be processed in no larger than pint jars to ensure that all the contents are thoroughly heated and the botulism bacteria de-

"Make certain the pressure cooker is in good working condition and that adjustments are made for higher elevations,' 'she said.

For an extra margin of safety, she recommends that home-canned fish also be heated before being served by boiling them for 10 to 20 minutes on the stove. Cooperative Extension researchers at Oregon State University recently developed a method for heating home-canned fish in the oven.

Swanson said home canners should contact their UI Cooperative Extension home economics agent for information-on proper canning heating of fish prior to serving.

Signs of botulism usually start within 12 to 36 hours after contaminated food has been eaten, Swanson said. Symptoms include double vision, inability to swallow, speech difficulty, and progressive paralysis of the respiratory system.
