## Virus Disease Threatens Fall-Planted Grain Crops

Moscow - Chemical control of disease-causing aphids is not the only way to protect fall-planted wheat and barley from barley yellow dwarf virus, according to UI extension entomologist Hugh Homan.

The virus infection can be eliminated or kept to a low level if farmers will stop planting wheat and barley too early in the fall Homan said.

"Several really cold nights may come close to eliminating a fall aphid threat," he pointed out.

The recommended timetable for planting wheat and barley varies from one climatic zone to another. Homan said growers in northern and eastern Idaho should delay planting until after Oct. 1. Mid-October is the earliest time small grains should be planted in the Magic Valley and growers in southwestern Idaho should wait until late October or early November, he added.

Aphids may infect small grains with barley yellow dwarf virus (BYDV) if they feed on young plants that have not yet attained the boot stage of development, Homan warned.

"The oat birdcherry aphid is the most effective vector of BYDV but many other aphid species may carry and spread the virus organism," he said.

Because corn is a symptomless carrier of BYDV, aphids now present in corn fields are a potential threat to fall-planted wheat, Homan emphasized.

"Aphids that attack small grains are present in huge numbers in the Columbia Basin at this present time he said.

"If growers plant early—or if cold weather is delayed—the application of an in-furrow treatment of a systemic insecticide for control of grain aphids should be considered," the UI entomologist said.

County extension agents will explain the recommended procedures for in-furrow application of Di-Syston or Thimet, he said.

"Fall aphid populations in untreated grain should be controlled with the same treatment program we use on greenbugs. The insecticides registered for aphid control are Systox, Dimethoate, Di-Syston, Pennacp-M, parathion and methyl parathion," Homan said.

Prevention of BYDV is the main objective of aphid control in the fall Homan explained. He said aphid problems in the spring have different ramifications and different strategies are used to control them.

## Backcountry Units To Open For Deer and Elk Hunting

Seven of Idaho's backcountry game management units and portions of two others open September 16 for general deer and elk hunting.

but the hunter doesn't need plan on an easy weekend outing because the areas are generally accessible only by airplane, horseback or after a long hike.

Seasons are longer than usual, however, because hunting pressure is comparatively light.

Department of Fish and Game regulations show seasons in Units 18A, 17, 19, 20, 20A, 26 and 27 from September 16 through November 22. Unit 19 is for antlered deer and elk only, but the others are for either-sex deer and antlered elk.

That portion of Unit 12 south of U. S. Highway 12 and east of Forest Service roads 500 and 509 in the Lochsa River drainage has a season from September 16 through October 25 for either-sex deer and antlered elk hunting.

Part of Unit 19A in the area east of the French Creek drainage is open for either-sex deer and antlered elk only from September 16 through November 1.

State big game manager Jerry Thiessen said prospects look good, particularly for elk, because bulls only seasons have resulted in increased populations.

He cautioned hunters to go well prepared. "That means good maps are helpful, careful study of the regulations is advisable and warm clothing and good boots are a must. Snow can fall early in those units."

**Fall Steelhead Season To Open September 19**  
Fall steelhead fishing opens on the Salmon River September 19 about two weeks earlier than usual with bag and possession limits more liberal than last year.

The Fish and Game Commission during its special meeting in Pocatello September 2 also approved a sport fishery for part of the Snake River between Lewiston and Hells Canyon Dam.

On the Clearwater River however fishing will be restricted to catch-and-release only because of extremely low numbers of steelhead in this year's upstream return of group T1 fish.

All opening dates are September 19, but closing times vary. Any steelhead permit purchased for the spring season remains valid this fall.

The Salmon River season runs through December 31. From the mouth of the Salmon upstream to the mouth of the Middle Fork Salmon the daily bag and possession limit is two with a season limit of eight steelhead.

From the mouth of the Middle Fork upstream to the mouth of the East Fork Salmon regulations allow a daily bag limit of two, a possession limit of four and an eight-fish season limit.

The Snake River season is Sept. 19 through October 15 from the Lewiston-Clarkston bridge upstream to Three-Mile Inn on the Washington Shore.

From Three-Mile Inn upstream to 100 feet below Hells Canyon Dam, the season runs from September 19 through December 31.

The bag, possession and season limits are one, two and three from the Lewiston-Clarkston bridge to the mouth of the Salmon and two, two and eight steelhead from Dug Bar to 100 feet below Hells Canyon Bar.

Closures to all fishing are specified for the shoreline along the perimeter of Dworshak National Fish Hatchery on the Clearwater. In open areas, all fish must be released immediately and only single, barbless hooks on artificial flies or lures are allowed.

John Coon, anadromous fishery manager for the Department of Fish and Game said the count of group "A" fish at Bonneville Dam on the Columbia River totaled more than 120,000 this year, compared to 85,000 in 1980.

"Group A fish are those that return to the Salmon River and the increased numbers in the run allow a longer season and more liberal limits," he added.

Variations in limits on the Salmon Coon explained are designed to encourage fishing for what are predominantly hatchery steelhead above the mouth of the Middle Fork and reduce pressure on wild stocks that return to the Middle Fork.

"We urge anglers to release any wild steelhead taken from the Salmon. Catches will be closely monitored and restrictions will be ordered if we see too many wild steelhead taken and kept," Coon said.

**Bayleton-Treated Wheat Cleared for Harvesting**

Twin Falls, Idaho Wheat that is sprayed with Bayleton, fungicide, early this season may be harvested at the regular time, the Environmental Protection Agency has decided. Robert L. Forster, EPA plant pathologist, said the EPA permitted use of Bayleton on an emergency basis with the provision that wheat should be harvested no sooner than 60 days after treatment with the chemical. This restriction has now been lifted.

The 60-day restriction places some growers at a disadvantage. In many locations, there is a possibility of losses due to shattering of overripe grain in the field. Growers are pleased to have the restriction lifted, Forster said.

Bayleton was used to control stripe rust and leaf rust in Idaho wheat crops. In southern Idaho, the chemical was used primarily to combat infections of stripe rust in spring wheat, particularly the rust susceptible varieties Fielder and Fieldwin.





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

## FIRST SECURITY NEWS LETTER

Idaho's residential building permits increased in July above the previous month with most of the improvement centered in Coeur d'Alene and Boise said James Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson quoting the July Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation will be distributed this week.

Statewide, residential construction activity remains very depressed. For example, during the entire month of July, there was one residential building permit issued in Pocatello and two in Idaho Falls.

The level of interest rates in the nation's money markets, as well as the decontrolled rates paid for many depository instruments, have helped push mortgage rates to a range of 10-17 percent. As we look ahead, there is considerable uncertainty regarding the extent of improvement expected in the residential construction industry in 1982.

Total Construction Value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in July was \$38,058,583 or 2.9 percent above 1980.

New Residential Construction for 305 dwelling units totaled \$20,088,518, a decrease of 11.9 percent in number and a decrease of 7.2 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Non-Residential Construction valued at \$4,805,580 was down 39.7 percent from last year while Alterations and Repairs totaling \$13,104,485

### WOMEN'S LIFE IN ANCIENT TIMES IS TOPIC OF NEW COURSE

Moscow The widespread interest in the topic of the women's role in our present society has sparked similar interest in the woman's position in former times.

A new course in the Classical Studies department of the University of Idaho Department of Foreign Language and Literature will be "Women in Antiquity" and will be taught by Marie Menkes, assistant professor of foreign language and literature.

The course, taught in English, will begin with a discussion of the sources of our knowledge of women in the ancient Greek and Roman worlds. The rest of the semester will be spent studying the status of women throughout different periods in the history of these two ancient civilizations.

The period of time covered in Greece will be Prehistoric Greece, the Bronze Age, the Archaic Age, 5th and 4th Centuries B.C. in Athens, and the Hellenistic Age.

On Rome, the time to be covered will be the Republic and the Empire. Among the topics to be discussed will be Greek and Roman's political, legal and economic aspects of life, marriage, adultery, divorce, widowhood, inheritance, prostitution, role in religion, general status, lower and upper class women, occupations, dat-
