Closures to all fishing are specified for the shoreline along the peri-meter of Dworshak National Fish Hatchery on the Clearwater. In open areas, all fish must be released immediately and only single, barbless hooks on artificial flies or lures are allowed.

John Coon, anadromous fishery manager for the Department of Fish and Game said the count of group "A" fish at Bonneville Dam on the Columbia River totaled more than 120,000 this year, compared to 85,-000 in 1980,

"Group A fish are those that return to the Salmon River and the in-Young people plan to be with us a longer season and more liberal licreased numbers in the run allow mits," he added.

Variations in limits on the Salmon Coon explained are designed to encourage fishing for what are predominantly hatchery steelhead above the mouth of the Middle Fork and reduce pressure on wild stocks that return to the Middle Fork.

"We urge anglers to release any wild steelhead taken from the Salmon. Catches will be closely monitored and restrictions will be ordered if we see too many wild steelhead taken and kept" Coon said.



flour tortillas instead of bread for a different sandwich, says Sunset Magazine. Moisten both sides of tortilla. On one side spread mamustard and yonnaise, hinchmea or whatever filling you desire) and roll up in jelly-roll fashion. For brown-bagging it first wrap in damp paper towel, then in plastic wrap.


