The first, and least expansive attempts the strength of the pensive alternative, is an "Emergency Insect-Sting Treatment Kit" which contains premeasured doses of epinephrine in disposable syringes. These kits are prescribed by doctors and some are good for up to three years. Total cost \$6.50. Potential victims are advised to keep the emergency kit close by when they are in the outdoors. According to the doctor this means in a pocket on the allergic person. The emergency kit is of little use two or three miles away in a glove compartment or on a cabin shelf.

sting immunization treatment. It is recommended for those who are in real danger of death as a result of insect stings. It involves gradually larger doses of venom until the po-tential victim creates enough natural antibody to stop the allergic re-action. The treatments take from three years to indefinitely depending on the patient. The total cost for the three year treatments is about by qualified physicians under the name "pharmalgen" by Parmacia Diagnostics. 



Gebhards said Idaho Power Company's Palisimerol-Niagara Springs steelhead hatchery was highly succonful in producing surplus steelhead available for harvest by anglers on the Salmon River.

"In contrast, wild runs have been severely depleted by losses that occur at dams on the lower Snake and Columbia Rivers. Hatchery steel-head suffer the same mortalities at the dams, but they can compensate for the losses by their greater number" Gobhards explained.

The adult steelhead, hatchery and wild, return at the same time and are intermingled. Sizes, color and shape can be the same, but there usually is a difference in the appear-

ance of the fins, Gebhards said.
Wild fish fin rays are straight,
but the hatcheny cousin will have bent or wavy fin rays or the fin may have a clipped appearance, is especially true with the fin in the middle of the back, although deformitles are often seen in the side fins," he pointed out. The measure is simple, but ur-


