Area crop yields reported average to good

Idaho County crops were
average, according to Ed
Mink, Idaho County

Mink, Idaho (Agriculture agent.

The spring barley was better than the fall seeded wheat. The wheat averaged about 50 bushels and the barley averaged 2,600 pounds an acre.

Mink stressed that these were averages and there was a very wide range of yields from 3,500 pounds to 2,200 on the barley and 85 bushels to 22 bushels on the wheat. The county-wide yields weren't uniform at all this year, he said.

Last week, they seeded the Austrian Winter peas in the research plots west of Grangeville. He said the farmers also have their Austrian peas in the ground. There isn't as many being seeded as there used to be.

Yields were 1,500 to 2,200 pounds on the better sites. With a price of 13 cents and the input costs for the peas, the people like them.

The farming conditions were dry, dry, dry, Mink said. The farmers are starting to seed the summer inllow after the first of the month, "But we need rains."

Garbanzo beans or chick peas look favorable as a potential crop for the area, Mink said. They have been tried in the area the past several years.

Mink is recommending Daws and Hyslop wheats for Idaho county. These are the same as in the past, but they continue to do the best here.

Prices are the universal problem for agriculture here. The prices are low on cattle, wheat and barley considering the input costs, Mink said,

Nex Perce County

Nez Perce County crops turned out good this year, according to Larry Smith, Nez Perce County Agriculture agent.

They were better at the lower elevations and poorer

at the higher elevations like Reubens. They did well at Reubens, but better at lower elevations.

The barley was good, but not as good as last year's crop.

"In our demonstration trials, Stephens and Daws were the top producers in the plots at low, medium and higher elevations in the county.

"They are the best of the commercial varieties and do real good," Smith said.

An Oregon Variety 797 yielded number one in most of the trials, but it is the first year it has been tried in the county.

Oregon 680073 did well too and it is expected to be released in the next couple years under the name of Hill.

Idaho 5318 will go to breeder seed next year and it will be two to three more years before it gets to the farmers, Smith said.

"Oregon 67237 looked real good, but it did have stripe rust problems."

Kamiak and Boyer winter barleys were the highest yielders for barley.

The winter triticales look good with the Washington

State variety Palouse doing the best.

In the Reubens area, disease was a problem. Weston, a U of I hard red winter wheat, did better. It is resistant to smut, snow mold and somewhat to stripe rust.

"The trials are a very important part of our work. If the grower raises the wrong variety, they can lose a lot of dollars.

"We try to find which variety will make the most dollars for them," Smith

In general, the crop year started dry last fall with the moisture levels picking up in 1981 and from February to mid-July there was above average precipitation.

It was a good year for wheat production and also good for wheat diseases.

'Dwarf smut and snow mold were about the only wheat diseases we didn't have this year," Smith said. A new problem on the

A new problem on the horizon is barley yellow dwarf virus which is transmitted by aphids.

It is a University of Idaho research concern and they

are suggesting growers treat grain with systemic insecticides when they plant or keep a close eye on it when it comes up.

If they have one to five

green bugs or aphids per row foot when the plant is in the one leaf stage, they need to spray. The spraying level is five to 20 bugs in the two leaf stage.

Smith recommended that farmers consult their county agriculture extension agent for more specific insecticide information on the aphid problems.

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Test plot shows need for herbicides, fertilizer

Fiber's work with herbicide and fertilizer use is being recognized beyond the local level.

When the group's test plot west of Criagmont was harvested this fall, DuPont Chemical Company sent a writer-photographer to document the results, according to Wayne Zenner, Citizens for Food and Fiber president.

"It is the largest test plot of this sort," Zenner said of the seven acre field. DuPont is interested in the plots for press releases to national publications.

Zenner said the photographer took photographs of both the treated and untreated side of the field as the grain came into the combine header and there was a quite noticeable difference between the two.

The traditionally farmed side had 100 percent more grain than the side which did not receive fertilizer or herbicide treatments.

"We expected a 30 percent decrease in yields on the side which did not receive herbicide and chemical treatment, but the herbicides and fertilizer made a 100 percent greater yield," he said.

"That would mean half the jobs in the elevators, half the truck drivers and all other jobs involving agriculture

The statistics on yields for this year's tests on the two 31/2 acre fields are:

Untreated: yield, 29.25 bushels per acre, value if sold at \$4 per bushel, \$115.96; rent which was one-third of gross, \$38.60; total costs, \$85.20; return, \$31.76, and gross net, \$111.02.

Treated: yield, 59.5 bushels; value if sold at \$4 per bushel, \$237.92; fertilizer costs, \$26.28; pesticide costs, \$25.95; aerial application and dry fertilizer costs, \$15.82; rent, one third of gross, \$78.48; total cost, \$193.13; return, \$44.79, and gross net, \$156.77.

Costs were the same for both sides on several items. Harvesting each acre cost \$22; plowing, cultivating and seeding costs were \$15.60 and seed costs were \$9.

Zenner thought the test plots should answer the environmentalists' claims that chemicals and fertilizer do not help food and fiber

Last year, there was a 17 percent reduction in yield from the treated to untreated "It would also affect the side. Part of the reason the yield was closer last year was that soil reserves of nutrients had not been depleted.

> The 1980 yields were 44 bushels per acre for the conventionally farmed side and 37 for the untreated side.

"We plan to run the test plots for three more years," Zenner said. "We're expecting a greater difference in future year's yields."

Zenner noted he wouldn't be in the farming business very long if "I returned \$38 to the landowner when he. knew I could return \$78.

"Also when I get more money in my pocket, it is used to buy newer equipment, which helps the economy," Zenner said.

Last year, the Citizens for Food and Fibers' main critics were the Lewiston-Clarkston Valley based Citizens Against Toxic Herbicides (CATH). CATH is now defunct.

Computerized farming has a promising future in Idaho. according to Anna Davis. management information specialist for the University of Idaho Cooperative Ex-

tension Service. The University of Idaho specialist said farmers can save valuable time by streamlining their calculations whenever possible. She said it is now practical to seek computer answers to the following questions:

-How much money can a farmer afford to pay for additional cropland? Will the crops he plans to raise produce sufficient income to justify the land purchase? Would it be preferable to rent rather than buy land?

-Will a farmer benefit from investing in a new machine or would it be advantageous for him to buy used equipment? Would he save money by customhiring some or all of his crop production operations?

-How much fertilizer should be applied to grow a particular crop on a certain field? What would be the economic consequences of varying rates of fertilizer applications?

What cash-flow problems may arise in a designated crop or livestock enterprise? How may possible income-tax breaks be identified and evaluated?

Davis said Extension Service offices throughout Idaho are gearing up for the computer era.

Throughout Idaho, people are investigating the computer programs offered by extension specialists. agricultural agents and home economists. Rationplanning programs for livestock have been especially well received.

"From the standpoint of the busy farmer, it would be a great time-saver to have essential facts about the farmer's various enterprises stored permanently in the computer's memory.

"Then, the facts could be retrieved or added to at any time. The farmer's recordkeeping duties would be eased because the computer would keep the records in order," he said.

As an example, Hillman

pointed to possible ways of streamlining record-keeping for livestock producers. "It should be possible for the producer to inform the computer one time only the essential facts about a cowher identification number. birthdate and production

"If this information were stored for easy retrieval, the producer could try new computer programs with little bother," he said.

"When farmers ask the

county agent how to control the green peach aphid or some other pest, they want up-to-date information. Printed materials may not include the latest or most reliable information. Computerized information files can be corrected daily if need be," Hillman said.

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
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
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
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
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
By Susan Tiede The Hillcrest Farms operation northwest of Grangeville raises beef and dairy cattle, hogs, baby calves and chickens.

Chickens are the least common of the Jessup

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family's enterprises and greatly differ from many people's recollection of a few chickens in the barnyard to provide the family's egg needs.

Hillcrest Farms produce 12,000-15,000 eggs per day. Those are marketed mostly in Lewiston grocery stores, plus Riggins, Whitebird and Grangeville. Some are also sold to schools and restaurants.

Jessups have a 10,000 bird house and a 6,000 bird one. The larger of the two was built two years ago.

All the chickens are grouped in cages of seven birds. The eggs roll out from the cages and are hand gathered usually by June Parker and Cammie Crabtree.

Teresa and Lynn Jessup or occassionally Lori Jessup fill in as egg gatherers. The eggs are gathered in the evening and processed in the morning.

The Jessups believe in a family farming operation with Jim and Donna Jessup, current operators, being the third generation.

Their children and grandchildren are also involved with the farm, making it a five generation operation.

Jim Jessup and Tom Rielley feed the chickens. The birds are fed with automatic feeders. They receive a 17 percent proteinhigh calcium ration based on

high calcium ration based on corn, soybean meal and some wheat, Jim said.

"The corn gives the yolks the yellow color that the public demands and the wheat doesn't. It's a competitive thing. Nationally, egg producers use o said.





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

percent per month death loss in the industry, so the chickens aren't usually kept to molt for three times as there aren't many birds left in the cages, Jessup said.

Chickens are relatively short-lived with an industry average of two to three years

Jessups have decided not to remolt their laying flock. The 10,000 bird portion of the flock will be picked up by Campbell's Soup early in November.

They only take the larger flocks. Previously, Jessups had to sell their non-laying chickens locally or otherwise despose of them.

The 10,000 bird flock will be replaced by the purchase of 20 week old pullets from a commercial poultry raiser on the coast. They just raise the baby chicks to laying age.

Jessups have H and N P-Gl Leghorns.

"There are a lot of strains of laying birds which are controlled by the people who own the strains," he said.

The substrains do different things. P-Gl are middle class layers which lay a certain percentage of large eggs.

P-Gl fits our market area with a medium to large egg. There isn't much demand for extra large or jumbo eggs as recipes call for a large egg, Jessup said. Some area food

service businesses use the other sizes.

A good hen will lay 275 eggs per year, but some do a little better. They can't lay more than one egg every 24 hours as it takes that long to form and pass through the egg tract, Jim said.

"Our new layers will arrive by truck, and we'll stuff the cages ourselves," Deawn said.

Once the "layer" part of the egg operation does its part of the work, the eggs are gathered, put into flats, and taken into the egg processing house.

The eggs are picked up in groups of 30 by a suction machine they refer to as the "sucker" and are put into the egg processing operation.

Any extra dirty eggs must be washed by hand before going onto the conveyor chain. Candling the eggs is the first step on the conveyer chain.

The eggs cross a flourescent light for candling. June Parker has been their egg candler for 19 months.

She said the eggs are checked for cracks, holes, freshness and blood spots.

It takes a lot less time for an egg to cross the candling light on the ever moving chain than it does to say what the eggs are checked for.

The large end of the egg has a bubble spot. Its size shows if the egg is fresh or

A mirror across the candling machine from the operator gives the candler a view of both ends of the egg to check for defects.

The yolk floats in the egg like a shadow, but blood spots show up very dark. Eggs with blood spots are thrown out.

The blood spots show up when the chickens are disturbed or excited, June noted.

After the eggs are candled, they go into a machine for washing and drying then to the sorter.

Eggs are "kicked" off the chain by the sorter according to size. The egg's weight determines what size they will be—small, medium, large, extra large or jumbo.

A "kicker" puts the eggs onto a wire rack which rolls the eggs to the person for packaging.

Some of the eggs are put into flats and cardboard boxes for restaurants, nursing homes or schools.


Here's a plan for a planter table built of Wolmanized ® pressure-treated wood, the top choice of builders throughout the U.S. and Canada.


For the table top, place in position thirteen 2x4's with 1/4" spacing and long enough to allow a 48" diameter circle (with slight overhang just to make sure). Use a compass to mark the circular outline and, from the same center, mark a 15" diameter circle. Cut these two circles with a jigsaw and Here you'll end up with a large for a doughnut-shaped table.

The table legs are made by cutting four pieces of 4×4 's 16-1/2" long. Clamp them in position at the inner corners of the center square of the substructure. Then drill two 3/8" diameter holes through each leg. These holes should be at right angles to one another and at slightly different heights so that the bolts will be able to pass each other.



Good Ideas From JCPenney TIPS TO HELP YOU

Question: All the jackets that I make for myself are too long. How can I shorten them?

Answer: Hold the pattern up to you. If it looks too long, adjust the pattern before cutting your fabric. This season's jackets are shorter so many of the new patterns may work better for you.



Question: What does it mean when my pants wrinkle at the crotch?

Answer: If your pants curve up at the crotch when you are standing, they are too tight. If they crease down, they are too long in the crotch area. They may crease up in front and down in back, or vice-versa. This is caused by incorrect crotch depth, length or curve. You may find that you need to adjust your pattern piece. Using the lengthen/shorten line, located just above the crotch area, measure the distance necessary to lengthen or shorten crotch depth, and draw a line parallel to the existing line. Don't forget to adjust your cutting lines. To change the shape of the curve, redraw it, adding fullness where needed. Remember: hollowing out a curve lengthens the crotch; filling in a curve shortens it. Baste the seams and try on for other minor adjustments.
