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Ed Halseth, 86, Retired Bear Ridge Farmer Passes

Ed Halseth, 86, who farmed on Big Bear Ridge, north of Kendrick for most of his life, died Saturday night, Sept. 26, 1981 at the family home. He had been in failing health for several months. Ed retired from farming in 1970.

He was born November 19, 1894 at Genesee, Idaho to Lewis and Mary Halseth. He and brothers, Pete and John went to Montana to work on the "Survey Crew". Later Pete and Ed took up homesteading in Dutton, Montana and John returned to the farm on Bear Ridge.

Mattie and Olga Klette, from Norway, had adjoining homesteads. They had come to America to join two brothers in Fargo, North Dakota and were housemaids there until taking homesteads in Montana. These couples married, Ed and Olga were married September 22, 1916 in Great Falls, Mont., and they farmed until 1919 at Dutton, Mont. Ed returned to the Big Bear Ridge farm in 1919. Olga died in December of 1957 at the family home until his death. Arnold, a son, had lived with him.

Ed was fond of cats and dogs. A son, Harold, had given him a Samoyan pup and later Ed acquired another and they were his companions for years.

Ed is survived by five sons: Ervin, Arnold and Gerald of Kendrick; Orville of Lewiston and Harold of Seattle. Three daughters, Margaret Cox, Deary; Helen Leland, Clarkston and Betty Chisholm of Lewiston. A brother, John Halseth survives at his home in Auburn, Wash.; 12 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a brother, Pete of Deary, and sister, Tara Pearson of Spokane.

The funeral was held at the Bethany Memorial Chapel (Lutheran Church) on Big Bear Ridge, Thursday, October 1, 1981 at 2:00 p. m. Burial was in the Church cemetery.

He is a graduate of Genesee High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delos Odenborg, of rural Genesee.

Don't Let Your Weed Control Go to Seed After Harvest Says Expert

Idaho grain growers who worked hard on their crop all season shouldn't get sloppy with weed control after harvest, said Steven Dewey, University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service weed scientist.

The period between grain harvest and fall plowing gives weeds like kochia, redroot pigweed and field bindweed the opportunity to feast on soil moisture and nutrients without competition from the crop and to produce hundreds of thousands of seeds that will plague the grower for years to come, Dewey said.

"The most effective way to control weeds over the long term is to prevent seed production and introduction of seed into the ground," he said. "Tillage and chemicals applied during the cropping season can suppress the weed problem for the moment, but it will be right back on you if you don't keep the weeds from going into the ground after harvest."

Annual weeds commonly produce between 20,000 and 100,000 seeds per plant each year, he said—enough from one plant to reseed an entire acre. Weeds like kochia and redroot pigweed can flower and produce seed from spring through fall, even under the hot, dry conditions of late summer, so limiting their seed legacy before they die is essential.

Reducing or eliminating fall seed and distribution by perennials like field bindweed is also important, Dewey said. In addition, fall is the best time to chemically destroy the established perennial plant.

Dewey explained that in the fall, a perennial plant sends food reserves to the roots to aid overwintering. This is the opposite of what occurs in the spring, when the root reserves move up into the vegetative portion. A chemical that works by translocation, or moving through the plant, can best enter and destroy the roots when it is applied in the fall.

Dewey said growers may be reluctant to apply herbicides after harvest because of the cost, but he said the expense can be justified over the long run because weeds are prevented from going to seed.

You can buy trail mix at grocery stores and camping supply stores—premixed, weighed and packaged.

Or, you can buy the ingredients separately and mix them yourself. You'll find it's easy and inexpensive.

When choosing fruits, decide when you intend to use them. In some cases, you'll find it's wiser to buy bananas and tomatoes green. That way, they'll be at their peak of ripeness when you're ready to serve them.

By breaking tradition, now and then, you can use a food in various ways. This lets you buy that food in larger quantity when the price is right. It's not written in stone, for instance, that eggs can be served only at breakfast. What about an occasional omelette at a dinner entree?

Using cheese as a meat substitute once in a while is a thrifty way to serve your family a high-quality protein food rich in A and B vitamins. Furthermore, cheese is an excellent source of calcium.

Before driving to the grocery store to take advantage of a single food bargain, consider the hidden expenses. Consider, for instance, the climbing cost of gas. Ask yourself "Will the 19 cents I save per pound be worth the \$1.35 I spend

per gallon?" If the answer is "yes," then you have a food bargain. If it's "no," save yourself a trip—and the money.

Proper Care of Game Meat Essential to Good Hunt

Maybe reverse windage will work for elk hunters who are out during the first days of the season, get in some serious worrying about possible hot weather and autumn storms could be a welcome result.

Proper care of game meat is important when the snow flies, too, but not spoilage is a treacherous hot weather problem. Most of any such loss can be avoided, however, if the hunter is properly equipped and knows how to use the gear to take care of the animal.

Necessary equipment includes a sturdy, sharp knife and a whetstone to keep the blade sharp, plus a saw to cut through bones when the animal is quartered, meat sacks for covering the quarters and ropes to get the quarters off the ground.

All of the items should be in the hunter's backpack and not back in camp, because speed is critical. The animal must be skinned, washed out if possible, quartered and hung quickly. Meat sacks on each quarter help keep them clean, protect them from insects and make transport easier.

Nights are usually chilly in late September and an elk will cool out overnight if handled as recommended. Leave it hanging in the deepest shade possible and it should keep for several days. To gain a lot more time, hang the elk by a stream course rather than on a dry hillside.

Most hunters realize the need to keep meat both cool and clean, but there are always examples of other extremes.

An occasional hunter, of example, can be seen driving with a deer or elk draped over the hood of the car and the heat from the engine and the sun can just about finish off an animal intended for the dinner table.

Lack of cleanliness is another problem and it can be as damaging as heat. Department of Fish and Game personnel frequently see game meat that is very dirty.

Considerable effort and care is needed to keep the meat clean, but it improves the final product. In fact, initial care of game in the field largely determine how edible the meat will be.

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

Willis Burdette Clayton, a longtime resident of Rupert, died of infirmities of age Wednesday, Sept. 23 at Orchards Nursing Home. He was 87.

He was born Dec. 27, 1893, in Missouri to John and Dansey Clayton. The family lived there until 1900 when they moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado.
