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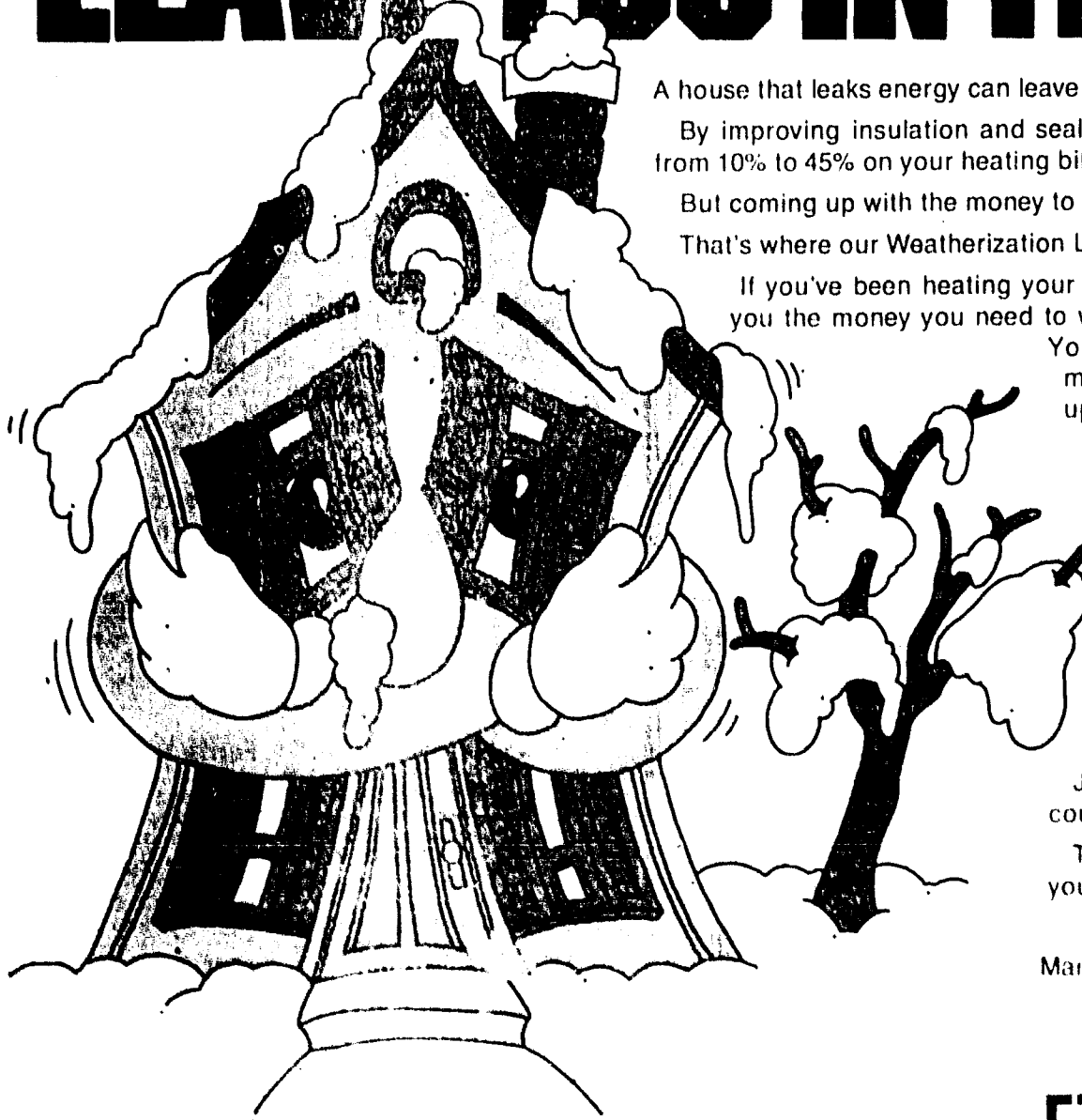

Building Industry Still Slumps Says Bank Newsletter

Building permits for new dwelling units tumbled in August, dropping 21 percent below the previous month and 45 percent below last year, said James Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson, managers, quoting the August Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, will be distributed this week.

For the first eight months of 1981 residential building permits were down 32 percent below the depressed year earlier levels. The dollars volume of total building permit construction in Idaho during the January-August period was \$247 million, down 14 percent.

Total Construction Value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in August was \$25,739,745 or 37.4 percent below 1980. New Residential Construction for 288 dwelling units totaled \$11,395,903, a decrease of 45.6 percent in number and a decrease of 44.6 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Non-Residential Construction valued at \$7,251,307 was down 45.6 percent from last year while alterations and repairs totaling \$7,092,535 were down 1.6 percent.

Advice About Flu

Do you need a flu shot?

You do if you are a member of one of the "high risk" groups pointed out by the American Lung Assn.

* Persons over 65 years of age.
* Individuals who suffer from chronic pulmonary, heart, or kidney disease.

* People with diabetes and severe anemia.

Some communities also vaccinate persons who provide essential community services, and medical care personnel who are at increased risk of exposure.

Pneumococcal pneumonia is another disease for which there is a vaccine. Some of the same persons who are apt to get flu also are at risk for pneumococcal pneumonia.

The one persons who can answer all questions about pneumonia and flu is your doctor. Ask him or her.

Influenza, or flu, can be a symptomatic—with no apparent symptoms. Or it can range from the mild upper respiratory infection to severe pneumonia and death. In the U. S., approximately one of every 100 persons with pneumonia is hospitalized. Thus, during an outbreak, if 20 percent of the population contract flu, more than a half-million persons would be hospitalized.

If you get the flu this winter, all is not lost. The drug, amantadine hydrochloride, helps fight the infection. The drug also helps prevent flu, but is not generally accepted as a substitute flu vaccine.

If you think you might be in a high-risk group, ask questions! And follow your doctor's advice.

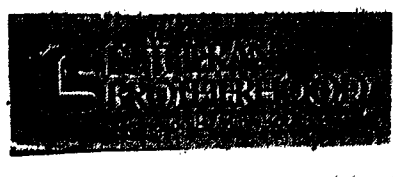

Part of Good Hunting Is Safe Zone of Fire

What a difference it makes in a
 day of hard hunting when spent shot
 keeps falling on your head.

Temperatures, to say the least.
 At another appropriate time a hun-
 ter can end up in a hospital emer-
 gency room.

Most of such problems can be
 avoided, says the National Shooting
 Sports Foundation, by observing safe
 zones of fire. Those areas in which
 a shot may be fired without endan-
 gering others or damaging property.
 Same zones are usually thought
 of in relation to other hunters, but
 they also must be considered in ar-
 eas where buildings, roads and live-
 stock can make shooting unsafe.

Off limits shooting areas should
 be pointed out to everyone in the
 hunting party, according to the Foun-
 dation. When hunting on someone
 else's land for the first time it is im-
 portant to ask for the location of
 off limits areas.

And on any hunting trip, the
 Foundation's release emphasizes,
 there are a number of points to re-
 member concerning safe zones of
 fire.

Know where hunting partners are

at all times. Wearing a hunter or-
 ange cap and vest helps keep every
 one in the group in sight.

When swinging on a bird, stay
 within a safe zone of fire.

Remember the safe zones of the
 which positioning hunters in a field
 or on a drive and don't stray from
 assigned positions.

Before shooting, always be aware
 of what is behind the target.

Shoot or don't shoot—it's almost
 a split-second decision in many hun-
 ting situations. Awareness of safe
 zones of fire allows one to hunt with
 the confidence that any shot will be
 a safe one.

NATURE FACTS
 Many species of birds prefer to
 bathe in dirt rather than water, ac-
 cording to National Wildlife maga-
 zine. Ruffed grouse, ring-necked
 pheasants, wild turkeys, larks, wrens
 and quail regularly get dirty in order
 to some clean by tossing dirt at
 themselves with their wings and
 beaks. Dirt removes excess oils,
 stops the spread of parasites, and
 improves the insulating quality of
 their plumage.
