

COLD AIR CAN BE UNHEALTHY

Exercise and hard physical work in subfreezing weather can bring illness and even death to people with chronic obstructive pulmonary di (emphysema, asthma, chronic bronchitis), according to E. Chandler Deal, Jr., M. D., of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

Dr. Deal is one of 47 recipients of research grants from the American Lung Association for 1981-82. is specifically studying "Effects Cold Air in Chronic Bronchitis."

Cold air causes contraction smooth muscle in the airway, thus narrowing the airway caliber, explains Dr. Deal. This can lead to obstruction in the breathing passages, he adds. Physical work or exercise brings on more rapid breathing and the inhaling of more cold air, thus exacerbating the threat. Dr. Deal's research will also examine the effects of the drug cro-molynu sodium, and other inhaled agents to determine if they can counteract the airway obstruction

caused by cold air. The principal behind research sponsored by lung associations is to give "seed money" 'to beginning investigators. Such research usually stimulates further work and oftentimes leads to additional funding

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
