## Incumbent Mayors Returned in Genesee, Kendrick, Juliaetta; Councils to Change

Voters in Kendrick, Juliaetta and Genesee went to the polls Tuesday, November 3 and returned their present city mayors for a term of four years, but the City Councils of each of the three towns will change as a result of the Tuesday balloting.

Confusion over registration by potential voters in Kendrick and Juliaetta resulted in smaller number of votes cast in those two towns. Many otherwise qualified voters found they were not properly registered to vote in municipal elections. Even though a person registered and voted in the last General Election (for president), they must have either voted in the last city election

or have registered for the city election, to be eligible to vote in the Tuesday election.

**Good Turn-out in Genesee**  
Registration, or the lack of it, wasn't a problem in Genesee, which uses a joint registration system as voters turned out in force Tuesday to elect George Wilson mayor for a term of four years. Wilson was named mayor following the resignation of Larry Sorenson two years ago. Wilson received 169 votes and was unopposed on the ballot. Former Genesee mayor J. Wayne Roach received 8 write-in votes.

## Kendrick 7th Graders Plan "Garbage-Athon" Nov. 14

The seventh grade class at Kendrick is sponsoring a garbage-athon on Saturday, Nov. 14. Class members will be trying to get sponsors for each pound of garbage they collect. Sponsors may pledge anything from 1c per pound and up or just make a donation regardless of the amount collected. The garbage will be dumped and recyclable items will be turned into the appropriate centers.

Former Genesee councilman Mike Martinez was the big vote-getter in the contest for the two council seats Tuesday. The Gazette erroneously listed Martinez as an incumbent in a story last week. While he has been a councilman, he is not presently so, but the mistake didn't hurt his popularity as he received 138 votes to win one of the vacant seats. Incumbent Mike Johnson was returned for a term of four years with 83 votes. Other strong contenders for the council were Pamela Tennant and Randy Hall, whose names appeared on the ballot. Bob Jacobs, running as a write-in candidate, also drew excellent support.

The class will meet at the Kendrick Park at 8:30. Each pair of students will be assigned a certain part of town. At 10:30 they will meet back at the park and sort and dump their collections. They then plan a short R&R (rest and refreshments), and spend another two hours picking up garbage. They might also have lunch at the Pizza Bank.

Steve Rishling and David Curtis were also on the ballot.

**COLD AIR CAN BE UNHEALTHY**

Exercise and hard physical work in subfreezing weather can bring illness and even death to people with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (emphysema, asthma, and chronic bronchitis), according to E. Chandler Deal, Jr., M. D., of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

Dr. Deal is one of 47 recipients of research grants from the American Lung Association for 1981-82. He is specifically studying "Effects of Cold Air in Chronic Bronchitis."

Cold air causes contraction of smooth muscle in the airway, thus narrowing the airway caliber, explains Dr. Deal. This can lead to obstruction in the breathing passages, he adds. Physical work or exercise brings on more rapid breathing and the inhaling of more cold air, thus exacerbating the threat.

Dr. Deal's research will also examine the effects of the drug, cromolyn sodium, and other inhaled agents to determine if they can counteract the airway obstruction caused by cold air.

The principal behind research sponsored by lung associations is to give "seed money" to beginning investigators. Such research usually stimulates further work and often times leads to additional funding.

**WHY FOUR FOOD GROUPS?**

In nutrition circles, they're the Four Pillars of Truth: Milk, Meat, Fruits, Vegetables, Grains.

But why four? And why these four? There are, after all, many other ways to classify foods. For instance, we could think of foods in terms of two major groups instead: plant and animal foods.

Or we could classify foods by color. Or by texture.

Or shape.

So why those four?

The divisions, actually, are far from arbitrary. In fact, they're based on years of research.

Your body requires as many as 50 different nutrients for a wide range of purposes. These nutrients fall into six classes: protein, carbohydrates, fat, vitamins, minerals and water.

Each of the four food groups is constructed upon key, or "leader" nutrients from several of these classes. For instance, the meat group has its foundation protein, niacin and thiamin (both vitamins) and iron (a mineral).

Combined, the four food groups thus complement each other, providing you with all the leader nutrients as well as the trace nutrients your body requires in minute amounts only: you need for good health.

Eating well-balanced meals from the four food groups also gives you these nutrients in their right portions. This is something the folks who skip meals in favor of nutrient supplement pills sometimes fail to realize. As a result, they often shortchange themselves of a particular nutrient and end up malnourished. Or, in some cases, they over-dose—usually on a vitamin or mineral—and end up extremely ill.

An example of the latter is "hypervitaminosis A," a condition that results from taking too much—you guessed it—vitamin A. It can cause severe headaches, loss of body hair and joint pain.

In the long run, the four food groups approach to nutrition is more than just a safe, sound and sensible one.

It's also a natural one.

**FOOD DOLLARS AND SENSE**

The closer you can buy foods to their original forms, the greater the savings. Smart shoppers look for ways to bypass the processing and distribution steps—steps that are reflected in the price of the food item.

Sometimes that means buying vegetables and fruits fresh instead of canned or frozen. Other times, it means buying whole cuts of meat and doing the butchering yourself.

A University of Arizona study has revealed where nine percent of the groceries we buy end up: in the garbage or down the disposal.

One way of eliminating food waste in the home is by dividing and storing from government and other institutions. All research projects from lung associations must be reviewed and approved by a committee of scientists. The money spent by lung associations on scientific research totals more than one million dollars.

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In the long run, the four food groups approach to nutrition is more than just a safe, sound and sensible one.

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ing foods in serving portions. Hamburger patties, for instance, can be made from a package of ground beef and then wrapped and put in the freezer. That way, you can defrost them as you need them—and only as many as you need.

Balanced nutrition means eating every day from the four food groups—milk, meat, fruits and vegetables, grains. But that means you have to serve four different dishes at every meal to make certain that you—and your family—are adequately nourished?

Not at all. There are plenty of ways to combine the four food groups in single-dish meals. For instance, there's casserole and stew. Even pizzas can be a complete-nutrition meals. Use your imagination and experiment.

### FISH AND GAME COMMISSION TO MEET NOVEMBER 9-10

Fishing regulations for 1982 top the agenda for the Fish and Game Commission meeting in Boise Nov. 9-10, with sessions to be conducted

Editor: There has been two bills introduced in Congress that could solve the problem of the Federal Reserve System and put the country back under the Constitution in that respect.

One, House Joint Resolution 23, known as the Liberty Amendment in relation to abolishing personal income taxes and estate and gift taxes. The other one is House Resolution 2322, which would authorize and direct the General Accounting Office to audit the Federal Reserve System.

Copies of these bills are available at the local office of Senator Symms, Senator McClure, and Rep. Larry Craig.

Anyone who is seriously concerned about the economy and the future of this country should get a copy of these bills and write our legislators in Washington, D. C. urging them to make every effort to get these bills made into law.

### PROPOSED FISHING REGULATIONS SHOW FEW CHANGES FROM '80

Proposed statewide fishing regulations for next year remain virtually unchanged from 1981 but they will be printed on sturdier paper and they should be easier to read.

If the Fish and Game Commission approves during its meeting in Boise November 9-10, those regulations including exceptions to general seasons and regulations will be listed following the water's name in alphabetical order.

That will eliminate such subheadings as "No Motors Waters" or "Waters Open to Year-round Fishing," said Herb Pollard, state fisheries manager for the Department of Fish and Game.

As an example, a check of the alphabetical list in Area 5 would show "Crane Falls Lake Open entire year. No Motors" as an exception to general regulations.

Commission sessions will be conducted in the department's headquarters building, 600 South Walnut Street, with a public meeting scheduled for 7:30 p. m., November 9.

The department will recommend the traditional Memorial Day week end opener, which falls on May 29 next year, and the general season would run November 30. Although there are no substantial changes proposed in statewide seasons, limits or regulations, there are some possible revisions within the six fishing areas in the state. They include:

Area 1 Close Priest Lake tributaries and place restricted limits on cutthroat and Dolly Varden in the lake.

The recommendation is designed to restore cutthroat and Dolly Varden populations which are managed as wild trout fisheries, Pollard said. Tributaries would be closed for the year to protect spawning fish and limits on the lake would be two cutthroat, none under 15 inches, and

one Dolly Varden, none under 20 inches.

Area 2 Seasons on those catch-and-release stretches on the Lochs and other rivers would be expanded to take in general season dates.

Area 4 Open the water below Arrowrock Dam to Kokanee snagging from August 16 through October 31 and change South Fork Boise River special regulations to three fish under 12 inches and one fish over 12 inches. The limit in 1981 is three fish over 12 inches.

Snake River and Impoundments The general trout limit of six fish, with no length restrictions would be in effect from Marsing downstream to Lewiston, including reservoirs in that stretch. The general trout limit, with no length restrictions, also would apply on American Falls Reservoir.

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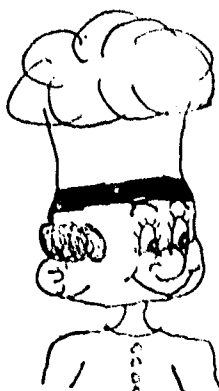
