Idaho Governor John Evans will visit and conduct town meetings in Kendrick, Juliaetta and Genesee Friday afternoon, November 13. These visits are part of the Governor's continuing "Capitol for a Day" series, designed to give Idaho residents an opportunity to meet and exchange views with their governor.

The schedule from the Governor's office indicates he will arrive in Kendrick shortly before noon on Friday. He will make some office calls and tour the town before having lunch with Kendrick and Juliaetta Senior citizens at the Kendrick Senior Citizens Center from 12 noon to 1:15.

There will be a Town Meeting at the Kendrick Fire Hall from 1:30 to 2:30 p. m. with Kendrick Mayor Wayne G. Harris also present.

From Kendrick Governor Evans and his staff will go to Juliaetta to be present at a town meeting at the Rebekah Lodge Hall from 2:45 to 3:45 p. m. Juliaetta Mayor Clark Woods will also be present at this session for all Juliaetta residents.

Genesee will be the next stop for Governor Evans who will be present at a town meeting at the Genesee Fire Hall from 4:15 to 5:15 p. m. Walt Moden, Jr., president of the Genesee City Council will be host at the Genesee meeting.

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## Auto Accident Claims Fred Cope

Fred Lee Onal Cope, 33, Kendrick, was killed Saturday afternoon, Nov. 7, when the 1980 Chevrolet pickup he was driving rolled down an embankment six-tenths of a mile north of Arrow Junction on Highway 3.

Fred died of head injuries after apparently being thrown from the vehicle. There were no witnesses to the accident.

He was born October 1, 1948 at Lewiston to Onal and Donna Cope. He was raised at Juliaetta and attended school at Juliaetta and Kendrick, graduating from Kendrick High School in 1966. He attended Lewis-Clark State College and worked from 1967-1968 at Boeing Corp. in Seattle.

Cope was stationed at Whidbey Island Naval Air Base from 1968 to 1972 while in the U. S. Navy. In 1972, he returned to Juliaetta where he lived until 1977.

He and Judy Porter were married at Juliaetta in June of 1973, and were later divorced. He moved to Kendrick in 1977, and on June 9, 1979, married Cynthia Ann Caswell at St. Maries.

Cope was a member of the Kendrick Trull Riders Motor Cycle Club, and worked as a millwright at Gem State Lumber Co. at Juliaetta.

He is survived by his wife, at the family home in Kendrick; two sons, Justin Fred and Micah James at home in Juliaetta; his parents, Onal and Donna Cope at Juliaetta; a sister, Debbie Ackerman of Juliaetta; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. O. Cope, Aurora, Mo.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, Nov. 11 at 11:00 a. m. at the Juliaetta Community Church with Lonnie Williams of Moscow officiating. Burial will be at the Juliaetta City Cemetery. The family suggests memorials to the Juliaetta Community Church.

Frank P. Benschoter, a retired American Ridge farmer, died of natural causes Monday, November 9, at Crittman Memorial Hospital in Moscow. He had been a patient there for three weeks. Frankie had celebrated his 91st birthday with family and friends last September.

**READING BY POET-NOVELIST TO MARK MOSCOW COMMUNITY CENTER OPENING**  
Moscow—One of the first programs at the new Moscow Community Center will be a reading by Seattle poet and novelist, David Waggoner, at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, November 11.  
His appearance is sponsored jointly by the University of Idaho English Department, the Moscow Arts Commission and the Idaho Commission on the Arts.  
Waggoner has taught at the University of Washington since 1954, and has written a dozen books of poetry and 10 novels. He is an associate of Theodore Roethke and previously worked at Pennsylvania State University.  
Dr. Ron McFarland, UI professor of English, says of Waggoner's work: "His poems show a powerful sense of place, and some, like 'A Guide to Dungeness Spit,' reflect upon specific locales. Always in Waggoner's poetry, the reader senses a reaching beyond the literal statement."  
McFarland says that Waggoner's poem "Travelling Light" takes the reader on a journey through rough country that spans the seasons and can be compared to a journey through life and the search for meaning and self-understanding.  
Waggoner's poems, some of which will be included in a special issue of "The Slackwater Review," also include such titles as "A Valedictory to Standard Oil of Indiana," "The Bad Fisherman," "Being Shot" and humorous poems like "My Physics Teacher."  
Waggoner was born in Massillon, Ohio. Last spring he was UI College of Law commencement speaker. He has been editor of "Poetry Northwest" since 1966.  
His novel, "The Escape Artist" has been made into a movie with the same name which will be released soon.  
The afternoon before the reading, Waggoner will hold an informal discussion from 3:30 to 4:40 p. m. in the Faculty Lounge of the UI Faculty Office Complex. It is free and open to the public.

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**Stephanie Kambitsch, 1981 'Miss Idaho', Tells of Experiences**

Genesee—Holding the Miss Idaho title for 1981 is "not taking a year of my life, it's adding a year to my life," Stephanie Kambitsch said.

The University of Idaho alumna from Genesee said she believes the experiences she is having during her reign are adding to the opportunities she may find when she is ready to begin her anticipated career as a concert pianist. She graduated from UI in May with a bachelor of music degree in piano performance.

The experience of competing in the Miss America Pageant in September was valuable in many ways, she said. The \$2,000 non-finalist talent scholarship she received makes her choice of schools to attend for her master's degree wider, she said, adding that the national attention is valuable to anyone seeking a performance career.

"I will always value the friendships I was able to make during the pageant," she said. "There was very little 'win at any cost' attitude. Most of the women wanted to make new friends and enjoy the experience. Of course, you go to win and do the very best you can, but not by putting others down."

She said she felt the judges were looking for a woman with well rounded interests and that they were interested in the girls competing and wanted to pick the best one for the spot. The pageant is working to change the image from a "beauty queen" orientation, she said, and this effort was reflected by contest officials and the women involved.

Kambitsch said the processes used for the Miss America competition may, in some cases, have a bearing on who ultimately wins the contest. "I happened to be competing in a group which was very strong in talent," she said.

The women are divided into three groups for preliminary competition and the chance strengths and weaknesses of the individuals who make up the groups naturally have a strong bearing on the people selected as finalists, she thinks.

She initially entered competition at the Miss Latah County level because she felt it was "a good way to get exposure for my piano playing." She never really expected to go as far as she did, but was pleased with winning the Miss Idaho crown and having the opportunities that are a part of the title, she said.

"We are trying to work out several Miss Idaho concert appearances. I am trying to coordinate my appearances so that I can continue to study with Dr. Neher monthly." Dr. Richard Neher is a UI associate professor of music.

She scheduled several Palouse area appearances, including one in the UI homecoming to allow a few days with her family, Mr. and Mrs. Del

Kambitsch, Rt. 2, Genesee, and a lesson with Neher. She said this was the first time she had visited with her family since July.

She lives in Boise during her reign as Miss Idaho and travels to most of her appearances from there.

One of the things that causes her some concern as Miss Idaho is that "so many people think I'm going to change. That's not for me. I


haven't really changed. I may be a little more glamorized and I part my hair on the side now instead of in the center, but I haven't really changed inside.

"My friends are still important to me and I want them to know I care about them," she said. "I still have a good time doing the things I have always done."

She said her preparation was good. "I wouldn't have changed anything even though she didn't make the finals. The contestants can't all win, she noted, and she was comfortable with her performance. "If I (the preparation) is overdone, you get so tired of it you just don't care. I didn't get to that point for me," in fact her naturalness may have been an asset, she thinks.

Kambitsch is looking forward to the remaining months of her reign and says after that she expects to enjoy her graduate music training.

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

## Most Social Security Taxes Paid Out in Benefits

If you pay into Social Security, how much of each tax dollar do you think goes for administrative costs rather than for paying benefits? A fourth? A half? Or even more?

A recent public opinion poll suggests that a majority of people believe it takes over half of each tax dollar to run the program. In fact, only 6 percent of those questioned said administrative costs are less than 20 percent. These responses indicate that many Americans feel there is inefficiency in this basic program that now pays retirement, disability, and survivors checks to some 36 million people.

The facts, however, prove otherwise: Last year, the Social Security Administration's total administrative costs were only 1.3 percent of benefit payments—an all-time low. This means that for every dollar you pay into Social Security, about 98.7c goes toward paying benefits for those who are now eligible.

Although operating costs have increased in actual dollars over the years as Social Security has grown in scope, the ratio of costs to benefits has steadily decreased. For example, costs were about 2 percent of benefits in 1970, and even higher in earlier years.

This increased efficiency (with a slight reduction in staff) is due to such factors as: use of the computer as a major working tool; simplification of many administrative procedures; and reduction of record-keeping requirements. Costs for operating Social Security per unit of work has increased more slowly than for service industries in general.

Administrative expenses include such items as salaries, rental of property and equipment, building operating expenses, and supplies. They also include payments to the U. S. Treasury Department for collecting Social Security taxes and issuing checks as well as costs incurred by States in making disability determinations.

This Social Security Administration is always looking for further streamlining which may result in additional administrative savings. However, overall the program is operated in a cost-efficient manner.

## CAP Callers are Reducing Fish and Game Violations

Department of Fish and Game officers are saying that poaching seems to have declined in some areas this year they believe the Citizens Against Poaching program is speaking would-be violators.

CAP president Dennis Gratton says he has received those encouraging reports from several of the department's regions particularly during big game seasons.

But the poachers are still out there. CAP rewards paid during October totaled \$4,200, most of them for arrests following big game violations, and a number of rewards are pending as a result of citations issued last month.

The \$4,200 represents almost half of the rewards paid since CAP was organized last January. Gratton said.

Persons with information about possible violations can dial a toll-free number, 1-800-632-5999. If their call brings an eventual arrest, they are eligible for a reward of from \$100 to \$500 and their identity will be protected, Gratton added.

Regular conservation enforcement efforts also continue to turn up violations and evidence of illegal activity.

An enforcement check station in Magic Valley produced 43 citations and more than \$3,000 in fines in one of the first days of the southern Idaho pheasant season opener.

Department personnel said one out-of-state hunting party posted \$575 in bonds for 19 pheasants over their limit hidden among potatoes in several large sacks. Another overlimit was discovered in the bottom

of a sack of dog food. Most of the bonds posted were for overlimits of pheasants, failure to leave a wing or head attached, illegal hens and transporting birds for other persons without proper documentation according to department officers.

In southwestern Idaho, conservation officers know of more than two dozen elk that were illegally shot, with little chance that violators will be detected. Most of the animals had been abandoned and officers were unable to salvage the meat.

CAP officials urged callers to provide as much information as they can such as license plate numbers, description of suspects and location and to dial the CAP number as soon as possible.
