Genesee Rural Fire Protection District To Seek Voter Approval for New Truck

Voters within the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District are being asked to approve or disapprove a special one time tax assessment to allow for the purchase of a new fire truck for the district at an election Monday, Dec. 7. If approved, the fire district would receive \$50,000 to purchase a 300-gallon "quick response" vehicle.

This issue is the result of the District's need for a small, fast, highly mobile unit designed to reach the scene of a fire or accident in the shortest possible time. If given ap-

proval, the directors will obtain a 1-ton, four-wheel drive vehicle with a 300-gallon water tank and storage space to carry all the extra gear for the ambulance and other fire trucks.

The truck would be the first one at the scene of a fire or accident and have the equipment on hand should it be needed by the other units.

The directors have decided that, if given taxpayer approval, to purchase a new unit, rather than a used one and have the equipment and installation made by a professional fire equipment firm, this accounts for what seems a large amount for a small rig, but the directors felt it would in the long run, give the best unit. The finance charge on the purchase amounts to \$6,000.

If the issue passes, property owners would be assessed \$7.89 for each \$10,000 of evaluation. The assessment would be 43c for each acre whose value is set at \$550 for tax purposes, which is the top current evaluation of land.

This is a one-time assessment. To be eligible to vote, a person must be a resident of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District and not live within the boundaries of a city. The balloting will be Monday, Dec. 7 in the City Room at the Genesee Fire Hall between the hours of 1 and 7.

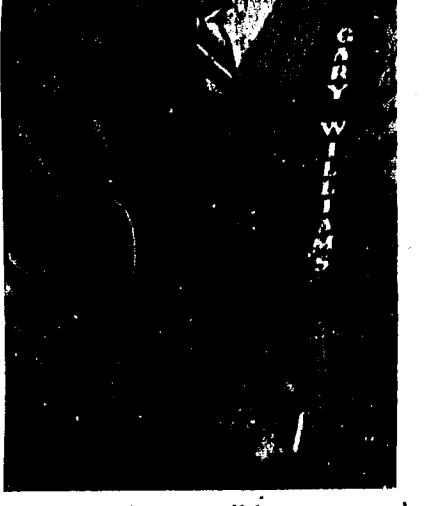

LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS WILL STUDY HEDGING

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor

Livestock Producers and feeders will study livestock hedging strategies during an all-day seminar set for December 10 at the Elks Club in Lewiston. The seminar is co-sponsored by the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

"The seminar program will present the basic facts people want to know concerning the hedging of hogs and slaughter and feeder cattle. Farm couples and agricultural lenders are urged to attend," said Dr. John Early, UI extension economist.

The educational meeting begins at 8:30 a. m. and adjourns at 3:40 p. m. The registration fee, including the cost of luncheon and a hedging notebook is \$10 per person in advance or \$15 at the door.

Advanced registration materials may be obtained from county offices of the UI Cooperative Extension Service. Registration and checks should be mailed to the Chicago Mercantile Exchange before Nov. 30.

John Carpenter, marketing associate of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, will explain hedging and futures markets, citing examples of the ways hedging is being used as a management tool in livestock operations.

University of Idaho extension livestock marketing specialists will lead a discussion of livestock marketing issues of the Pacific Northwest.

In the feeder cattle hedging workshop seminar participants will have the opportunity to create and implement a risk management plan.

An Idaho livestock producer and a state banker will take part in a panel discussion on livestock forward pricing.

The seminar program will be presented December 8 at the Elks Club in Salmon.

FISH AND WILDLIFE MITIGATION APPROVED FOR THOMPSON CREEK

Cyprus Mines Corporation will fund a four-year, \$158,000 fish and wildlife mitigation plan around the firm's open-pit molybdenum mine being developed in Custer County according to an agreement finalized by the Fish and Game Commission November 9.

Included in the plan for the Thompson Creek Project about 40 miles southwest of Challis are expenditures for:

- A full-time department of Fish and Game conservation officer based in Challis.
- Fishery mitigation, possibly in the Squaw Creek area. Squaw Creek is a Salmon River tributary.
- Studies to measure impacts on deer habitat and migration, along with determination of deer mortality on the road serving the project.

The agreement specifies funding totaling \$74,350 in the first year, \$29,350 each of two years and \$25,000 the fourth year.



1 T prepared horseradish	1 lb. round rye bread, unsliced
2 t dill weed	Assorted vegetable dippers
1 t Worcestershire sauce	Bread cubes

Combine all ingredients for dip in small mixing bowl. Cover and chill 2 to 3 hours to allow flavors to blend. Meanwhile, preheat oven to 400°F. Cut a thin slice from top of bread. Carefully hollow out center of bread, leaving a 1-inch shell on sides and bottom. Cut inside pieces into 1-inch cubes. Place bread shell and cubes on baking sheet. Bake about 10 minutes or until toasted. Cool completely on wire rack.

To serve, spoon sour cream mixture into bread shell. Serve with vegetables and bread cubes as dippers. As dip is consumed, slice top off bread shell and cut into cubes as additional dippers. Yields 3 1/4 cups.





LOCAL CO-OPP SHARES \$3.3 MILLION STOCK RETIREMENT

Co-op members save on their agricultural supplies first when they buy at their co-op; and secondly, they save through stock retirement when money is returned to local co-ops.


