One Dead in Genesee Fire

The Genesee community was stunned into numbbed horror Tuesday morning in the aftermath of a wind-swept house fire that claimed one life shortly after midnight. Although positive identification could not be made by law enforcement officers or the Latah County coroner, the victim of the fire was believed to be Bill Magee, 37, a well-liked and respected member of the community.

Magee owned the small, three-room home and was the only known occupant at the time the fire occurred.

The house was located on Walnut Street (the main Genesee street) about two blocks east of the business district and Magee had made his home there for several years. Bill is unmarried.

Jay Roach, president of the Genesee Community Firemen, Inc., said Tuesday that the fire was first noticed by Roger Sinclair and his wife, who live next door to Magee in the old Albert Carbahn house. The Sinclairs were unable to reach the fire department number, apparently because of high winds which were intermittently interrupting phone communications. The Sinclairs then ran to another neighbor, Terry Geltz who is a member of the Fire Department, and Geltz ran the 1 1/2 blocks to the fire station and sounded the siren shortly after 1:30 a. m.

The first fire truck reached the scene within minutes of the alarm, but the old frame structure was already a blazing inferno. The house had been covered with artificial brick siding which served to confine the initial fire inside the building until it was out of control. The fire was whipped and fed by the strong winds and also threatened the Sinclair home.

It was not until almost 3:30 a. m. that the firemen were able to subdue the blaze enough to confirm that there had been someone in the house when the fire started, and a body was discovered in what had been the bedroom. Law enforcement officers and the county coroner were immediately notified and the coroner was on the scene approximately one hour later when it became possible to reach the victim.

The body was taken to Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow where positive identification was still lacking at 4:00 p. m. that afternoon. Latah County Sheriff Laune Odenborg told the Gazette-News an attempt is being made to secure dental records to identify the body positively.

The Genesee community is grief stricken as it awaits official word on the results of law enforcement and the coroner's investigation. Bill Magee was last seen downtown by his friends between 10 and 11 p. m. Monday night. The sorrow of all who know and love Bill is beyond description as word is awaited on this tragedy.

Highway, Fire, Cemetery District Elections Set for Monday, December 7

Six District taxing units will hold elections next Monday, Dec. 7, in the Genesee, Juliaetta and Kendrick areas. All six of the Districts will be electing commissioners for four-year terms and one district will be seeking voter approval to levy additional taxes for the purchase of a new fire truck.

Voters will be casting ballots for commissioners for the Nez-Tah Community Maintenance District; South Latah Highway District, Genesee Rural Protection District, Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District, Pottlatch Cemetery Maintenance District and the Southwick-Pottlatch Cemetery District.

Two commissioners for Nez-Tah Cemetery District will be elected Monday. Lewis G. Grosselose is unopposed on the ballot for Sub-District No. 1 (Juliaetta and Flx Ridge) and Darold Hazeltine is unopposed

for commissioner for Sub-District No. 2 (Bear Ridge). Both are for four year terms. Incumbent commissioners Floyd Helmgartner and Oscar Slind have declined to seek re-election. Voting will take place at the Fire Hall in Kendrick between the hours of 1 and 7 p. m.

South Latah Highway District
The election of a commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 of the South Latah Highway District is the only one of the six races that is contested in the Monday voting. The term of incumbent Jack Parsley expires this year. Parsley filed for re-election and also filing were Bill Wilson of Cedar Creek and Lester Holmes of Kendrick. Genesee area voters may vote at the Genesee Fire Hall and Kendrick area voters at the Kendrick Fire Hall between the hours of 1 and 7 p. m.

Genesee Rural Fire District
Kurt Blume is unopposed on the ballot as a candidate for commissioner from Sub-District 3 of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District. Kurt would replace outgoing long-time commissioner Phil Hermann, who has moved from the district.

At the same time they are selecting a new commissioner, taxpayers in the District are being asked to approve an additional tax levy designed to raise, for just one time, enough additional funds for the district to purchase a new \$50,000 fire truck.

Voting will be at the Genesee Fire Hall, 1 to 7 p. m.

Genesee Cemetery District
Commissioners from Sub-District 1 and Sub-District 2 of the Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District will be voted on at the Genesee Fire Hall Monday. Both are for four-year terms. Laverne (Andy) Anderson is the incumbent from Sub-District 1 and John Myers, Jr. is the incumbent from Sub-District 2.

Pottlatch Cemetery District
Taxpayers served by the Pottlatch Cemetery District will vote Monday at the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church basement for commissioners from Sub-District 1 and Sub-District 2 for terms of four years. Bill Thornton is the present commissioner from Sub-District 1 and Ted Meyer is the incumbent from Sub-District 2. Again the hours are from 1 to 7 p. m.

Southwick-Pottlatch Cemetery Dist.
The term of commissioner John Lettenmaier of Sub-District No. 3 of the Southwick-Pottlatch Cemetery District expires this year. Voting in this election will be at the Community Hall in Southwick between the hours of 1 and 5 p. m.

SEASON STARTS MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

Anglers can plan on the usual Memorial Day weekend opener for general fishing in Idaho next year. The season will run from May 29 thru November 30.

Statewide, there are no major changes in the regulations approved by the Fish and Game Commission during its meeting in Boise November 9-10. But the printed copies should be easier to read and the more durable paper won't be so apt to fall apart from folding and re-folding, according to state fisheries manager Herb Pollard, Department of Fish and Game.

"Exceptions to General Seasons & Regulations" have been simplified, Pollard added. In each of the department's six areas, those waters where exceptions apply are listed in alphabetical order.

Here are some of the changes approved within the areas:

Area 1—Close Priest Lake tributaries and place restricted limits on cutthroat and Dolly Varden in the lake. The change is designed to restore cutthroat and Dolly Varden populations, which are managed as wild trout fisheries.

Pollard said tributaries would be closed for the year to protect spawning fish and limits on the lake will be two cutthroat, none under 15 inches and two Dolly Varden, none under 20 inches.

Area 2—Extend seasons on the catch-and-release stretches of the Lochsa and Selway rivers to coincide with general season dates.

Open the water for 100 yards below Arrowrock Dam to kowance snagging August 16 through October 31 and change South Fork Boise River special regulations to three fish under 12 inches and one fish over 20 inches, instead of the 1981 limit of three fish over 13 inches.

Snake River and impoundments—The general trout limit of six fish will be in effect from Mansing down stream to Loviston, with no length restrictions. The same limit with no length restrictions will apply to American Falls Reservoir.

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LONG-RANGE MANAGEMENT PLANS REVIEWED FOR FISH AND GAME COMMISSION

Fish and game commissioners heard their first in-depth review of long-range management plans for elk and deer when they met in Boise November 9-10.

State big game manager Jerry Thiessen, Department of Fish and Game, told the Commission that the plans were a "landmark accomplishment." Such a project, he said, is the first of its kind in the 13 western states and probably in the nation.

The plans, for elk, mule deer and white-tailed deer, are designed to establish management guidelines thru 1985. Frameworks for opening dates and seasons are included.

Commissioners expect to study the plans in detail before they take final action at their meeting in Boise December 4.

Thiessen said the department had conducted 30 public meetings to gather comment and written testimony come from organizations and sportsmen's groups, industry, individuals, and federal and state agencies.

In summarizing public comment for the Commission, Thiessen listed seven "major concerns" that were expressed. They included:

Comments, principally from persons in the department's Region 1 in northern Idaho, that seasons have been opening when temperatures are too warm. The department will recommend slightly later opening dates.

"Widespread opposition" to opening Panhandle elk seasons on the first Wednesday in October. As a result, Thiessen said, the department is proposing that Panhandle elk seasons open the first Saturday in October.

Strong opposition to general buck hunting in management unit 45, "substantial opposition" to such hunting in unit 52 and "unanimous support" for general buck hunting in unit 56.

"We recommend that unit 45 remain a controlled hunt, but that un-

its 52 and 56 be changed to general hunters," Thiessen said.

1981 big game hunting seasons.

Both resident and nonresident hunters are included. Their answers, when compiled and analyzed, will establish valuable guidelines for the department's bureau of wildlife in recommending 1982 seasons and regulations for consideration by the Fish and Game Commission.

"We are not checking for possible violations," state big game manager Jerry Thiessen emphasized. "Our

survey team is seeking information that will help wise us the best possible estimate of big game harvests in 1981.

Response to the survey he said gives hunters an excellent opportunity to help the department. "If hunters truly enjoy their sport, we feel they owe it to themselves to give us the answers we need."

The calls will go to rifle hunters, hunters and muzzle loaders and the

callers will ask to talk only to those who had tags and permits. "Seasonal information tends to be distorted," Thiessen said.

Hunters will be asked: Whether or not they actually hunted.

What species of big game was harvested, what management unit it was taken in and when.

How many big game animals the hunter saw and, if possible, with deer



In a relatively few instances, persons may get more than one permit or tag, but our callers are trained for their jobs and they will take just a few minutes to ask the questions," Thiessen said.

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

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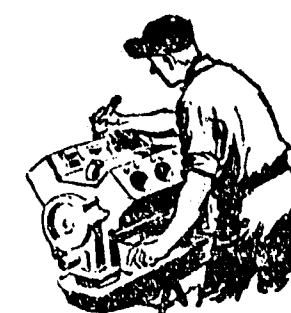

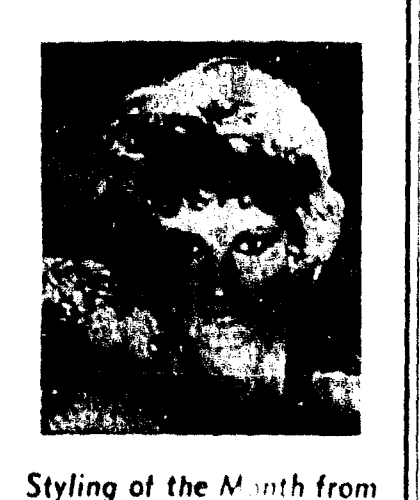
