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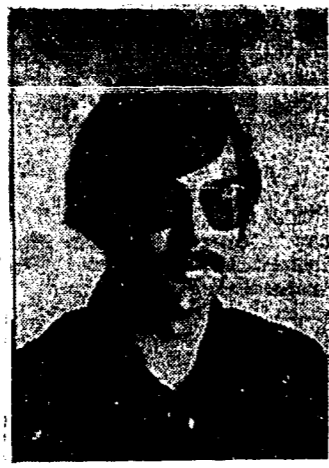

Genesee School Board Met Monday

The Genesee Board of Trustees held their regular December meeting in the Superintendent's office Dec. 14, 1981 at 7:30 p. m.

The district asked for bids on the district's annual audit and 650 form. The accounting firm of Hayden and Ross was awarded the bid for an amount of \$1,500.00.

The Board authorized a contract with the University of Idaho to allow a student teacher in the school for the spring semester in the office practice classes.

The addition of a third basketball program was discussed and since no action was taken on the request the present basketball program will be maintained without the addition of a third team.

Approval was granted for the scheduling of additional volleyball games for the 1982-83 school year. A-B to A-4 classification of sports the additional games are necessary for the district's participation in the league.

Dates of graduation and last day of attendance for seniors were approved. The last day for senior students attending regular classes will be May 21, 1982. Graduation is set for May 28, 1982.

A contract for services from the District II Regional Health Office was approved. This provides the services of a public health nurse one day a week.

During the Superintendent's Report the following was discussed:

1. Ray Barker, a local attorney, discussed the possibility of providing legal services to the district on a need-to-basis. Presently the district does not have an attorney and the convenience of utilizing Mr. Barker's services was discussed. Formal action was put off until the January meeting.

2. The district's Corporal Punishment Policy was reviewed. Interested patrons were allowed comment and input. Supt. Crawford explained the surrounding districts position on the use of corporal punishment, as well as the State Board of Education's stand. This will be reviewed and discussed at the January meeting.

3. A review of the elementary student evaluation was given. No action was taken.

4. The results of a hot lunch survey taken by another local district was discussed. The Genesee hot lunch program appeared to be very favorable when compared to some of the other districts in the survey.

5. The problem of tuition tax credits was discussed. This is a prime concern to the public schools and the available funding.

6. The superintendent briefed the board on the meeting held in Boise on December 1, 1981. The State Department of Education called the meeting to discuss funding for the 1982-83 school year, proposed changes in school transportation, Federal Block grants and proposed legislative changes that will be sought during the upcoming legislative session.

7. The Winter Program was discussed. It will be held in the school gym on Thursday, December 17, at 7:00 p. m. The elementary students, elementary band, high school chorus, junior high and high school band will perform during the hour program. Through the cooperation of the Civic Association, the Jayceettes, Senior Citizens and the Firemen, Santa Claus will appear at the end of the program to pass out treats to all school children, grades K-6 as well as preschool children.

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SNACK, BUT SNACK SENSIBLY

Editor:

Many of us can gauge how well we enjoyed the holidays by our waist lines. With fond recollections of hearty family feasts still dancing in our heads we may find it necessary to lessen the belt a few notches. Or we may notice that our clothes seem to fit a bit more snugly.

Of course, it's probably wise to shed those unwanted extra pounds. And some of us, perhaps the most Spartan, might believe that this calls for starting the new year with a "no more snacking resolution."

Actually, such a drastic measure isn't necessary. In fact, people who suddenly eliminate snacking from their lives are prone to pick up a "starve and stuff" eating habit. Thus they wind up gorging themselves at mealtime, rendering their diets useless.

You can still snack while losing weight. But you have to be a smart snacker. That means, first of all, snacking only when you're hungry—not merely out of habit. Second, it means choosing snacks that are low in calories.

And, third it means eating snacks that are nutritious. That's because your body requires a daily source of many nutrients—diet or no diet.

By choosing low-calorie snacks from the four food groups—milk, meat, fruits, vegetables, grains—you can keep within your diet and provide your body with the nourishment it needs. Furthermore, you can put to rest those hunger pangs that plague dieters between meals (and that often lead to the "starve and stuff" syndrome).

So next time you get the urge to snack, try an apple instead of chocolate cake. Or a glass of orange juice instead of a soft drink. You'll get more nutrients—and fewer calories. (And you'll find you can still satisfy your sweet tooth).

Carrots, celery and cucumbers are also refreshing low-calorie snacks. The same goes for yogurt and cottage cheese. Whole wheat crackers make light, nutritious snacks, too.

Losing weight takes time and discipline. But it doesn't have to be a grueling test of your stamina. If you want to snack, snack. But snack sensibly.

First, the Latah County Commissioners attempted to force a mandatory garbage collection ordinance on all citizens of Latah County. Evidently, because they were encountering so much opposition or for whatever reason they put it on the ballot as a user fee, knowing the voters would accept it at face value.

After it passed overwhelmingly, the commissioners attempted to convince the voters that they, the voters did not know the meaning of a simple phrase like USER FEE!

Now they come out with a Special Code No. 51 and No. 53 without any explanation of what these codes mean. But which oddly enough adds up to what our garbage bill would be for a year IF we paid it.

This type of maneuvering is going on in many branches of government. It is gradually adding up to people control which eventually will add up to a one world government. If more of our elected officials and citizens do not get their heads out of the sand and become better informed about what is actually going on. Then to have the courage to stand up for what they think is right.

This not idle alarmist talk! There is plenty of documented information available that will bear this out.

Anyone can say this or that is or is not constitutional, the only way it can be settled is in the courts.

Most people are aware that the news media of all forms too often slant the news to suit themselves, however, it can also be used by our elected officials to cloud an issue!

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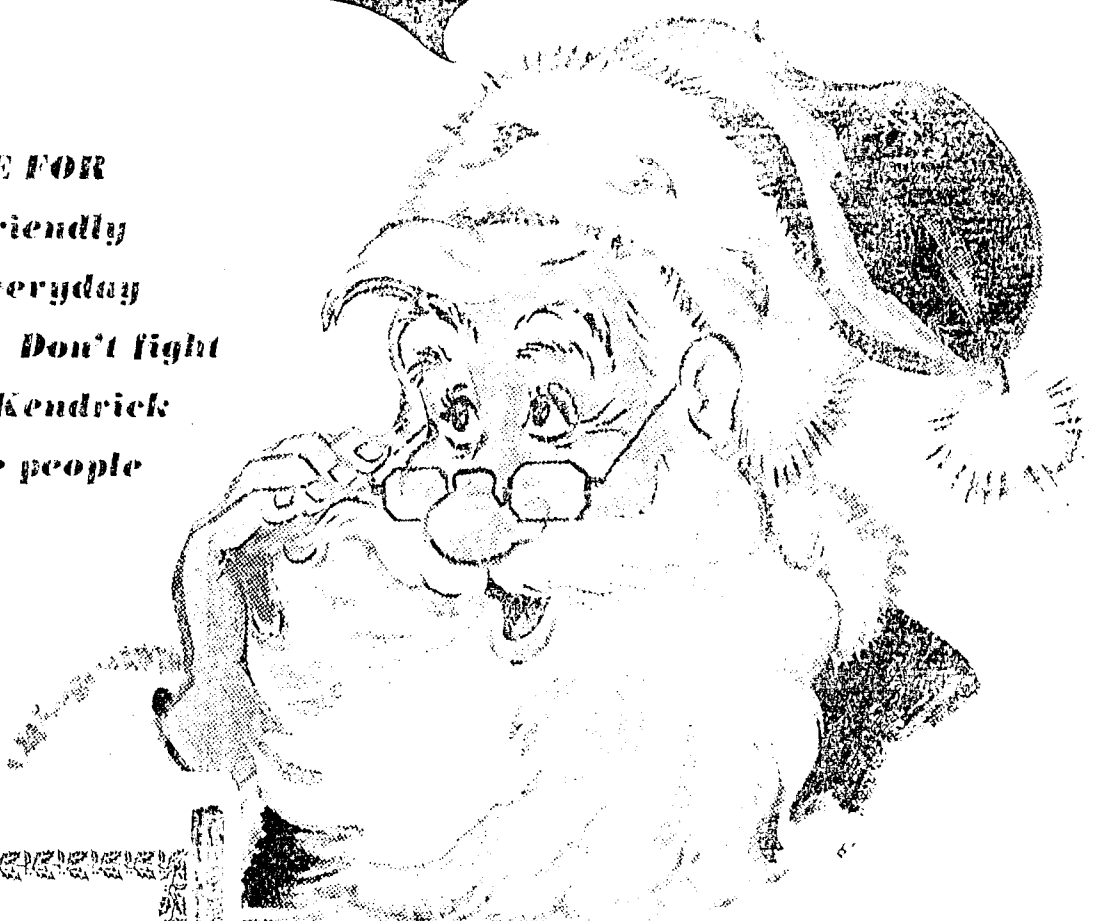

CHRISTMAS CAROLS AREN'T ALWAYS WHAT WE THINK

Moscow Many of what we may think are traditional "Christmas carols" aren't carols at all, but simply well-loved Christmas music.

Mary DuPree, assistant professor of music, said that originally "carols" was a French word meaning a group dance. "The term carol, referring to music, emerged in England in the 15th Century," she said. "Carols appeared in large manuscripts about then."

She said they were "musically 'part' songs with two or three individual melodic lines. They were songs and were meant to be sung with a physical activity, such as professionals in churches."

Part songs have the melody supported by accompanying chords. DuPree said most carols, because of their association with movement, have a strong rhythmic nature. "Even though they were quite sophisticated musically, they were meant to be sung by large groups, not just by professional choirs."

The words were mostly written in what is called Middle English and some combined Middle English and Latin. In most cases, "We would understand the lyrics, but some of the words would be archaic," she said.

Early carols were written not only for Christmas but also with political themes, and many were written in praise of the Virgin Mary.

Very few of these early carols are still sung today. One which is still popular is "The Carol of the Boar's Head."

Along with most other forms of pleasure, the singing of carols was repressed during the era of Puritanism in England, in the 16th and 17th centuries. This may be one reason why the early carols aren't sung any more. DuPree said the most likely reason, though, is that musical styles changed and the early carols simply went out of fashion.

The fact that the early carols mention the Virgin and not other religious figures may be another reason they fell into disuse. "As theological styles changed, the music would change, too." While at one time the Virgin was an object of worship, beliefs about the Virgin in later times could bring persecution to those who expressed them, she added.

It is very difficult to differentiate between liturgical and secular songs dated from the Middle Ages since "all life was religious life," DuPree said.

There was little separation between "church music and street music."

Among the songs we consider carols now are many Lutheran hymns and some music which pre-dates the true carol. "O Come All Ye Faithful" is based on a Geogorian chant, DuPree said, which "predates carols by probably five centuries."

Another song from Geogorian days is "Good Christian Men Rejoice."

In Contrast "Deck the Halls" is more of a madrigal with the style of a carol, she said. It is from the Renaissance period.

"Silent Night," is considered a carol but is really a modern work, being only about 150 years old. "The First Noel" is a carol, she said.

Even though the Christmas songs we sing may not be true carols, they are rich in tradition and history, and no less meaningful or enjoyable, she concluded.

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SPRING STEELHEAD SEASON TO OPEN JANUARY 1

Spring steelhead seasons open in Idaho January 1 on the Salmon and Snake Rivers - the day after fall seasons close December 31.

The Fish and Game Commission agreed during its recent meeting in Boise, however, that the Clearwater River would be closed even for catch-and-release fishing next spring.

John Coon, anadromous fishery manager for the Department of Fish and Game, told commissioners that all of the 3,000 steelhead expected to return to the Clearwater will be needed for spawn-taking at Dworak National Hatchery.

On the Salmon River, the season will run from January 1 through March 14 from the mouth of the river upstream to Mackay Bar bridge.

From the mouth of the Pahsimeroi below the season is January 1 thru March 28. From 100 yards above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi to the mouth of the East Fork of the Salmon River, the season runs from January 1 through April 11.

The stretch from 400 yards below the Pahsimeroi to 100 yards above its mouth is closed.

A special gear restriction will be in force on the Salmon from its mouth upstream to Long Tom Creek where barbless hooks only will be allowed. The limits are one steelhead daily, one in possession and 3 for the season.

From Long Tom Creek to the mouth of the East Fork Salmon the limits are two per day, four in possession and six per person.

Limits are two daily, four in possession and six per person from Dug Bar up to 150 yards below Hells Canyon Dam and one, one and three from Three-Mile Inn up to the Anahone Gauge Station.
