The apportionment to the Department of Fish & Clame is the larger of two installments to be distributed during the federal fiseal year, which started October 1. To qualify for the funds, the department matches the amount on a 25-75 basis and department projects involving P-R and D-1 money must be approved by the U.S. Fight and
